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SEVERAL SEVERE SCORCHERS.

How Actor Joe Jefferson's "Crow's Nest" Was Destroyed. Fatal Fire at Belleville, Ill.—Big Blaze at Cumberland, Md.

CUMBERLAND, Md., April 4.—About 6:30 o'clock fire started in a shed in the rear of the Businessmen's block. A fresh wind was blowing and in an incredibly short time the whole block was in flames.

BELLEVILLE, Ill., April 4.—The office of the Arbitration Court was burned out yesterday by August Stuer, a street vendor, who was cremated.

CAROLTON, Ga., April 4.—At midnight fire destroyed the entire business portion of the town. Eighteen buildings were destroyed, entailing a loss of \$21,000.

NEW YORK, April 4.—From Wallhalla Hall this evening went forth the edict of the United States Garment Workers to the Clothing Manufacturers' Association that the organization proposed to stand by the locked-out clothing cutters until the manufacturers were better, and that so-called labor unions not concerned in the dispute would better keep their hands off.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 4.—The steamship King James, coal laden, from Newcastle, England, to San Francisco, was burned at sea, 200 miles off San Francisco.

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, April 5.—The conference of the Church of Latter Day Saints preliminary to the dedication of the Salt Lake Temple began this morning at the Tabernacle, which was crowded with 10,000 people.

PHILIPPS BROOKS' SUCCESSOR. BOSTON, April 5.—More than 1,100 of the clergy and laity of the Massachusetts Episcopal diocese met in Trinity Church yesterday and practically decided in favor of Dr. Greer, of New York, as successor to Phillips Brooks for bishop of Massachusetts.

CHICAGO, April 4.—Carter H. Harrison was to-day chosen mayor of Chicago by a majority of 19,000 and the entire Democratic ticket elected by majorities ranging from 16,000 to 19,000. The contest for the World's Fair mayorality was one of extreme bitterness. The Democratic newspapers, excepting only the Times, which is owned by Mr. Harrison, were in favor of Mr. Hesing. Samuel Wallerton was the Republican candidate. The People's Party, representing the laboring classes, nominated Dewitt C. Cregier for mayor, while the Socialists had for their candidate Henry Ehrenpreis.

Causes a Good Deal of Discussion—A New Janitor Appointed—Condemnatory Remarks Regarding Colborne Street School—Change in the South London Kindergarten—A Midnight Session.

The Board of Education met last evening, Chairman Dewar, Trustees Cook, Jeffrey, Martyn, Stephenson, Alexander, Griffin, Powell, Craig, Anderson, Sanders, R. J. Blackwell, D. W. Blackwell, Love, Turner and McRobert and Secretary McElheran being present.

Miss Henderson—For transfer from Askin street to Rectory street kindergarten. No. 1. J. M. Nichol, W. E. Slaght and J. O'Higgins—For grant of \$10 per month to aid in publication of a monthly journal in connection with the Collegiate Institute. No. 1.

George Hampton—To be allowed to send his children to city schools free of charge. No. 1. Maggie B. Harrison—For position as teacher. No. 1.

Ex-Trustee J. C. Brady—Applying for position as inspector of works. No. 2. Charles Deely, janitor at Talbot street school—Asking additional pay. No. 2.

Dr. Beemer—Complaining of unsatisfactory system of heating and ventilation at Colborne street school, insufficient lighting in some of the rooms, and inadequate seating.

James F. Smale, Thos. Edwards, W. M. Finch, H. Harshorn, Wm. Thompson, Francis Faulkner, Mrs. Tait, Eli Day and Geo. Harris—For position of janitor. REPORT OF NUMBER TWO COMMITTEE.

No. 2 committee by D. W. Blackwell, chairman, recommended: 1. That the salary of R. McBride, janitor at Hamilton road school be increased \$40 per annum. 2. That three new blackboards be placed in Hamilton road school. 3. That A. Dewar be janitor at St. George's school in place of Mrs. Neil, discharged. 4. That Janitor McDonald, of Princess avenue school, receive \$78 for extra work. 5. That no action be taken on Janitor O'Brien's request for more salary, and also on Assistant Janitor Bailey's (Collegiate Institute). 6. That as \$225 extra had been expended on the addition to the Collegiate Institute for work which had not come before No. 2 committee, no alterations be allowed in future without the sanction of the board. 7. That \$750 be placed in the estimates for salary of superintendent of works. 8. That offices for Inspector Carson and secretary be obtained in the Ontario Loan and Debenture building at an expenditure of \$150 per year.

Considerable discussion followed the reading of clause 6, but it was finally adopted. Clause 7 was laid over until the estimates were taken up. Clause 8 was struck out and No. 2 committee was instructed to fit up offices in the City Hotel. The other clauses were adopted, as was also the report as amended.

The other clauses defined the boundaries of each school district. The report, with the exception of clause 2, was referred to No. 1 committee.

Principal Merchant reported 516 on the roll, and an average attendance of 423 at the Collegiate Institute. Inspector of Works Perry recommended a minor repairs at various schools. Referred to No. 2 committee.

REPORT OF NUMBER ONE COMMITTEE. No. 1 committee, by Mr. McRobert, chairman, recommended: 1. That application of Mr. Dunlap for permission to have his children attend city schools free of charge be granted, and those of Messrs. Wilson, Hampton and Tozer be not allowed. 2. That Misses Walton, McMechan, Mabel Smith and Carrie Fleming be placed on the permanent teaching staff of the school. 3. That Collegiate Institute chemicals be purchased from Anderson & Nelles. 4. That applications of Mr. Waters and Miss Fairbairne for increase of salary be not entertained.

Regarding clause 1, R. J. Blackwell's amendment to allow Messrs. Tozer and Wilson to send their children to city schools carried. The motion to adopt the clause as amended was lost and the clause was, therefore, struck out. In connection with clause 2, on motion of Mr. Craig, Miss Bradburn's name was added to the list. An amendment to clause 4, Mr. Waters' salary was increased by \$50.

On the motion to adopt the report as amended, Mr. Love moved in amendment that Messrs. Dunlop, Wilson, Tozer and Hampton be allowed to send their children to city schools. Carried. The report was then adopted as amended.

News of the Day Without Note or Comment.

A gale prevailed at Beaver City, Neb., on Sunday from the northwest, driving before it a fierce prairie fire. Many houses have been burned.

Edward Shellenberg, a merchant of Mountain City, Mo., on Sunday night shot and killed Wm. Stebbens, the son of one of the wealthiest citizens of the town. Stebbens was robbing Shellenberg's store.

Frank Howell Christopher, of Pealdeton Center, Niagara county, N. Y., a student at Cornell University on leave of absence, committed suicide by shooting himself at the Grand Hotel, Lockport, N. Y., Sunday night. No cause is known for the act.

The Chicago Presbytery, at its meeting Monday, ordered an overture sent to the General Assembly protesting against the strict and censorious procedure by the appeal of the case of Prof. Briggs, and asking that body to discover some way by which the rights claimed by an acquitted man may not under the constitution be violated.

RAN OFF A BRIDGE. Disaster on the C. P. R.—A Windsor Man and His Mate Killed. WINDSOR, April 4.—The following telegram was received here to-day from Judge Killam, of Winnipeg: "Sieve White's engine yesterday ran off a bridge and fell into the Fraser River. Both White and his fireman were on it, and their bodies have not yet been recovered. Sieve White was born in Windsor and lived here till a few years ago, when he took a position as engineer on the C. P. R. Conductor Bob White, of the G. T. R., is a brother. White was single and lived at the town of Donald, B. C."

LAI IN THE GRAVE. The Remains of the Late Mrs. Alex. Mackenzie Buried at Sarnia. SARINIA, April 4.—The funeral of Mrs. Alex. Mackenzie, widow of the late Hon. Alex. Mackenzie, took place to-day at 2:30 o'clock from the residence of Chas. Mackenzie, M.P.P., and was very largely attended by relatives and friends of the deceased, and a great number of business men and acquaintances. Mrs. Mackenzie having been long and favorably known in this locality. Among those present from a distance were: Messrs. David and Walter Syms, brothers of Mrs. Mackenzie, John H. Fairbank and W. R. Gibson, of Petrolia, and many others.

The pallbearers were the same who carried the remains of Hon. Alex. Mackenzie to his grave a year ago—the five nephews, Messrs. Robt. Mackenzie, jun., David Mackenzie, Chas. Mackenzie, jun., William Mackenzie and Gordon Mackenzie.

The funeral services were conducted at the residence and grave by Rev. Mr. McLaurin, of the Baptist Church.

Another \$100,000 for McGill. MONTREAL, April 4.—It is announced that Sir Donald Smith has given another \$100,000 to McGill College.

Charged With Manslaughter. WHITBY, Ont., April 4.—At the Assizes to-day the grand jury brought in a true bill against Baker and Lingford for manslaughter of one Palmer at Pickering, last fall. Palmer was looking Baker's hen roost, and was surprised and pursued by the accused, Lingford firing and fatally wounding the fugitive.

Canada's Future. MONTREAL, April 4.—Ex-Premier Mercier delivered a strong address to-night in favor of the independence of Canada. He predicted that eventually a union with the United States would be found to be desirable. At the conclusion of the address the meeting passed a resolution declaring in favor of the immediate independence of Canada.

Settling Day in Montreal. MONTREAL, April 4.—To-day was a big settling-up day among the banks, and bankers report payments very bad, a large number of renewals having to be given. There are no big failures reported, as the banks generally are carrying their customers. Bad roads and the late winter are given as the cause for the poor payments.

Mr. George Craig's Will. TORONTO, April 4.—The will of the late George Craig, of this city, disposing of an estate of \$91,451, leaves the following legacies: to the Colleges, \$1,500; Presbyterian home mission scheme, \$1,000; foreign missions, \$10,000; augmentation fund, \$1,000, and \$500 each to Infants' Home, Sick Children's Hospital, and Girls' Home and Boys' Home.

Robt. Kent, one of Kingston's wealthiest and most respected citizens, died Tuesday morning. He settled there in 1844.

Mme. Mapleson at the Grand To-Night—A Detroit Criticism.

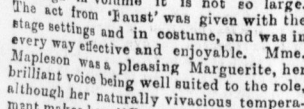
The renowned and beautiful Mme. Laura Schirmer-Mapleson, who has appeared before the crowned heads of Europe and received many tokens of their appreciation, is on her first Canadian tour, accompanied by brilliant artists. The company arrive from the West to-day. The performance at the Grand To-night will be the first in the musical line this season. Says the Detroit Free Press of yesterday:

"Mme. Laura Schirmer-Mapleson and a company of excellent artists received an enthusiastic reception at the Detroit Opera House last night, appearing in a programme made up of selections mostly from Italian operas and in the third act of 'Faust.' The audience were more than pleased, demanding encores after every number on the first part of the programme and only refraining from similar manifestations of approval during the singing of the operatic act in order not to disturb the action.

Mme. Mapleson at once won the hearty good will of her listeners in the extremely difficult and scene from 'Lucia,' a selection which would be injudicious for any amateur artist. All the subtle requirements of the selection—flexibility of action, brilliancy of execution and a keen appreciation for the many musical changes of feeling—were fully realized by the singer, who possesses not only a sympathetic voice under perfect cultivation, but an impressive stage presence.

The concert opened with the overture to the 'William Tell' overture by Isidore Luckstone. It is extremely difficult and offers splendid advantages for the display of remarkable orchestral effects on the piano, and it is in this style of playing that Mr. Luckstone is a master. Mme. Theodor sang 'O Mio Fernando' and was cordially received, but would not respond to the encore to which she was justly entitled. In the romance, 'Ah, si ben mio,' by Verdi, Signor Barron displayed the best tenor voice by far that has been heard here this season. It is clear in tone, sympathetic in quality, and reminds one of Edward Lloyd's voice. There is the same smoothness, although in volume it is not so large. The act from 'Faust' was given with the stage settings and costume, and was in every way effective and enjoyable. Mme. Mapleson was a pleasing Marguerite, her brilliant voice being well suited to the role, and her naturally vivacious temperament makes her different in many respects from the conventional, pathetic heroine, as Goethe conceived her. In the jewel song and in subsequent numbers she showed her talent as an actress as well as a singer. One could not have wished to have heard a more delightful interpretation of the tenor aria, 'Salve Dimora,' than was given it by Signor Barron. He is not imposing in figure, nor is he a good actor, but he has a pure, lyric tenor, and sings with much discretion."

The meeting was held in Mr. Hicks' tailor shop with closed doors, and some thick brown paper served as a screen on the windows to ward off a too inquisitive public. The conference commenced early in the evening and it lasted until 11:30. When it was over the bosses had less to say about the matter than the men. "We are like the aldermen when they came back from Montreal," one of them said. "Mum's the word, you know." From the men it was learned that those present to be submitted to-day by the men to the union, and by the bosses present to the rest of the bosses. The schedule as drawn up embodies all the concessions demanded by the men with very slight alterations, and if it meets with the approbation of both sides to-day the men will go back to work. "But if we don't," said a striker, "we will fight it out to the bitter end. We are getting \$6 a week while we are out, and we can tie up for a while without much inconvenience. There were no harsh feelings displayed at the meeting. Both sides and bosses got down to business

with pencil and paper, and talked the matter over amicably. "Oh, we're getting there," said another of the tailors as he started for home. There were 52 tailors out when the strike commenced and the strikers claim that at least 50 of them are still out. So far no "scabs" have appeared from outside places, but there are several non-striking tailors belonging to the city who are working throughout the strike.

YE OLD FOLKES

Give a Great Concert at Ye Play-House.

Old Fashioned Costumes—Good Old Songs and a Thoroughly Enjoyable Entertainment—Synopsis of the Performance.

 Turning over a page readers were told that "Ye reception of ye old folkies will take place first, and will commence at eight o' ye clock, and will be followed by eight o' ye groats sort o' quaintie musick dishes to meet ye wants o' ye hungry and thiristie ones after goodly things."
 The rise of the curtain revealed a quaintly arranged apartment, in which spinning wheels, candles, an eight-day clock and other curios suggested ye olden times. The audience, when they saluted with graceful old-fashioned bows.  The costumes were decidedly rich. Those of the ladies were very unique, and semi-modern. The men wore the feminine attire, with a disparity of color and style that was laughable as well as entertaining. One dated as far back as the period of the Elizabethan ruff, and others were effective satires on the decrees of fashion. A momentary shudder ran through the male portion of the audience at the appearance of the ruff. Ye menne syngers wore knickerbockers and garments of showy material. Of course all had powdered wigs, and altogether looked thoroughly antique.
 Parts first opened with ye songs of ye olden times, and ye songs of ye present time. Father Heppal Birks, wielding the baton. The chorus proved to be well-drilled and evenly-balanced.
 The song, "The Bugler," showed the resonant bass voice of Josephus Soper to advantage.
 The three-part songs, "Ye Shepherds Tell Me," by Joshua Taylor, Ichabod Collins and Meandering Belcher, was very prettily given by these talented vocalists.
 "Home Again," by all ye singers, was notable for the fine technique and delicate shading which the timist, Father Birks, knows so well how to bring out. The ludicrous contrast was the fugue tune, "Russia," in ye Puritan style—one of the hardships which people had to undergo in the primitive days.
 Dame Faithful Rosehannah Cooper's spinning wheel song was very nicely executed, and she served the enthusiastic applause it received.
 The rising young artist, Master Layfayette Angus, played a tune on ye fiddell, "Souvenir de Haydn," which exhibited his insight into classical selections.
 Sprightly Mutch and Patriarch Carroll gave the very lively and amusing two-part song "Huntingtower" with a dramatic and vocal finish that quite captured the audience.
 The charming spokepiece, "The Marble Dream," called into play the elocutionary powers of Dame Cheerful Sage-Mills, who gave it an intelligent rendering. The lighter selection, "Raggedy Man," further on, was also satisfactory.
 A song, "Cousin Jedediah," by Consolation Boddy and the chorus, was quaintly humorous. The words ran something like this:
 Now, Obed, wash y'r face, boy, and tallow up
 While I go to see Aunt Betty and tell her all
 ye news;
 And Kitty grease y'r hair, and put on y'r Sunday gown.
 For Cousin Jedediah comes right from Boston town.
 A worldie ditty, "Canzonetta," was sung by Nancy Livespark Ziegler in her splendid soprano voice. The ever-fragrant "Last Rose of Summer" concluded the first part.
 The familiar strains of "Home, Sweet Home" sounded sweet indeed in chorus. It was followed by the solo, "The Ballad of the Daughter of Ialington," given with pleasing piquancy by Holdfast Daly. The four menne syngers, Patriarch Carroll, Ichabod Collins, Josephus Soper and Meandering Belcher, "The Blue Bells of Scotland." "The Anchor's Weighed" and "The Two Grenadiers," by Mr. Carroll and Mr. Belcher respectively, were most pleasing contributions to the programme. Master Angus' second fiddle piece received a vociferous encore, which he acknowledged with a bow. Mrs. Cooper's second number was excellent. The good old Scotch ballad, "Ye Banks and Braes," lost none of its charms in the hands, or rather the mouths, of Livespark Ziegler and Consolation Boddy. Last came "Rule Britannia," Patriarch Carroll taking the solo part. Flags were waved as "God Save the Queen" announced the end.
 Ye Old Folkies' Concert was a splendid success—artistically and no doubt financially. The principals included some of the best musical talent in the city, and the performance had the flavor of refreshing originality, which is very often missing in such affairs.

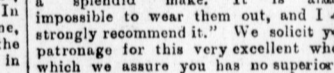
