Russia Still Arming.
London, Oct. 30.—The Observer, which is generally considered to be unusually well informed in regard to the foreign

well informed in regard to the foreign situation, has the following from its diplomatic correspondent:

It is unquestionable that Russia, in spite of the pacific attitude of the Czar, continues her armaments. The people of the central Governments have observed that during the last few months nearly the whole of the troops there have gone towards the German frontier, where barracks for their accommodation have been erected. The Government evidently expects war shortly, and the movement of the army against Germany may be more than a coincidence. The Toulon visit occurred at moment when Russia had completed measures in readiness for a Russo-German war. Rightly or wrongly, the Russian Government thinks the eventuality should be boldly faced, and it is only natural that it should respond to the overture of France.

The Wages of Sin.

London, Oct. 30.—On Friday last a married woman named Lydia Bloss committed suicide at her residence, Whitehead grove, Chelsea. She shot herself with a revolver. Her death has led to the discovery that her suicide was linked with that of Frederick Charles Howard, brother to the Earl of Effingham, who on Thursday shot and killed himself at his residence, No. 34 Evelyn terrace. The coroner's jury in the case of Howard returned a verdict that he had killed himself while laboring under aberration of mind. It has now transpired that Mrs. Bloss, whose husband is in America, was Howard's mistress. Howard's wife, Lady Constance, who is the daughter of the Earl of Winchelsea, discovered the liason and was about to bring action for divorce against him. There is hardiy a question that this was the reason of Howard's suicide. After Howard's death Mrs. Bloss told a friend that she and Howard had discussed the situation and Howard had discussed the situation and Howard had urged upon her that they both ought to commit suicide. Death of Sir John Abbott, Ex-Premier of the Dominien.

MONTREAL, Oct. 30.—Sir John Abbott, who succeeded Sir John A. Macdonald as Premier of the Dominion and who resigned a few months ago in favor of Sir John Thompson, died at his residence in this city shortly before 9 this evoning. The ex-Premier had been in poor health for some months. His advanced age (being over 70) and his poor health forced him to resign the Premiership, and he took a trip to Europe with the hope of regaining some of his old-time vigor. He was absent for over three months, but the trip did not do him any material benefit, and he returned in a very enfeebled condition. Dr. Roddick and other prominent men, who were called in, after consultation, decided the patient was suffering from a species of cancer of the bowels, and that an operation was imperative. This operation was the bowels, and that an opera-was imperative. This operation was ormed, but, though it afforded relief. performed, but, though it afforded relief, it brought no permanent cure, and Sir John gradually grew weaker until death ended his sufferings. His end was peaceful, and he was surrounded in his last moments by all the members of his family. The funeral will probably be private. Arrangements have not yet been completed.

Arrangements for the Murdered Mayor's Funeral—The Remains to be Buried in Graceland

Chicago, Oct. 30.—The Times (Carter Harrison's paper) says: The town has not yet recovered from the shock of the awful and unprovoked murder of its oblef magistrate. It is clear that the assassin was known to the mayor and that he had no cause of grievance whatever save as it existed in his disordered fancy. He was a wretched creature, seemingly bereft of sense. The action was that of a madman, whose wild frenzy made him think that the mayor was responsible for failure to appoint him to a station for which it was obvious he could not for a moment be considered fit. But the deed he wrought was a fearful one and it must be the care of the law that never again shall he be so placed that his deranged intellect shall prompt him to further swful crimes. The approbation which Mayor Harrison so long sought, for he loved the good will and the good voice of all his fellow men, is his beyond any dream that he might have cherished of what name it would be possible for him to leave behind. He is beyond the reach of praise, beyond all care of censure; but the expressions so universal, so heartfelt for his memory, seen the country over, but seen, as was to be expected, most of all in intensity and in tone right here in Chicago, will be a precious heirloom for those immediately left to mourn him.

SYMPATHY OF PRIENDS.

The family residence was thronged with sorrowing irrends Sunday. There was a crush of carriages and people before the Harrison mansion, and for blocks in all directions during the afternoon the sidewalks were impassable. Six policemen kept the crowd moving on, and two more efficers were stationed before the main entrance of the house, to prevent its being overcrowded with visitors.

World's FAIR GROUNDS, CHICAGO, Oct.

World's Fair Grounds, Chicago, Oct. 31.—From turret, dome and spire of the White City's palaces hang the embiems of the nations, at mourning height, on this, the dying day of the World's Columbian Exposition. The people looking towards the sunlit sky of blue, realized that not only Chicage mourned, but the whole world of humanity as represented at the exposition. They came on in much smaller numbers than was expected at sunset Saturday and they found no evidences of rejoining over the crowning achievement of the ege, no sounds of sweet music in the Court of Honor, no merry throngs, no celebration, only a solemn stillness, an unparalleled tribute to the memory of Chicago's dead, or one of sympathy for the loss of a loving father, an illustrious, faithful citizen and chosen chief of a million and a half of people. The greatest exposition the world has ever witnessed died in the same gloom and silence which pervade the home of the afficed family and the city which loved and henored him who was slain for no cause. Even the noisy Midway Plaisance was quieter than usual, and the patrons of the streets seemed to share in the general sorrow.

In the administration offices the chief

In the administration offices the chief men of the fair returned to their desks with saddened hearts, and a gloom hung over all. At 11 o'clock the committee of twelve chosen to draft the resolutions which were read to the people in Festival Hall met in President Highinbotham's office. The resolutions expressed at some length and in the most sympathetic language the general sorrow and shock which the tragic end of the World's Fair City's chief magistrate created in the hearts and minds of the national commissioners, foreign and state representatives, the board of lady managers, exhibitors, directors and executive efficers of the Eputch Presbyterian Church, delivered the prayer with which the gathering began. The invocation contained a feeling reference to the tragedy which had turned the farewell exeremonies into a mourning meeting, and appealed to the turne of grace on behalf of the griessricken family.

Following this sad opening, which brought tears from many thousands gathered in the great hall, came the formal announcement by President Palmer of the mayor's death, and a statement that all exercises of a festive character would be omitted. When the gates at Jackson Park are closed to-night and the official life of the fair has been brought to an end, the most serious problem remaining to be solved will be how best to dispose of the buildings. Fred W. Peck, vice-president of the World's Columbian Exposition, says:

"It surely will be a wrong to the American public if these magnificent buildings are at once turned over to the destroyers. We have herea lesson in architecture which should be preserved. It may be impossible

should be preserved. It may be impossible to continue the fair another year, but certainly we may retain in the buildings.

"I am in favor of preserving the Court of Honor for an indefinite length of time. This can be done without great expense. I am told by Director of Works Burnham that for \$20,000 we can paint the peristyle and the buildings facing the Court of Honor. If this is done at once the staff will remain strong for several years."

Preferring the Supreme Court, the Federal authorities have decided to ask its views on the following questions:

1. Has a provincial legislature jurisdiction to prohibit the sale, within the province, of spirituous, fermented, or other intoxicating liquors?

2. Or has the legislature such jurisdiction regarding such portions of the province as to which the Canada Temperance Act is not in operation? of Questions.

It should be distinctly understood by the friends of home rule in America that Redmond cannot possibly make as good a bargain with the Tories as the Nationalists have already concluded with the Liberale; but by chaffering with the opponents of the Government, however, he may cause political chaos from which may emerge a triumphant anti-Irish majority in the House of Commons. It is not improbable that Redmond is playing agame of biuli, but even that is very dangerous at this moment.

Amnesty for the political dynamiters, so passionately desired in Ireland, is as vohemently opposed in England, and it never will be granted as long as Home Secretary Asquith is in the Cabinet. Asquith is a type of numerous Liberals who accepted home rule as a political necessity and would repudiate it to-morrow if they could do so safely; but he is also a strong, able man, with great influence in the country, and his withdrawal from the Cabinet would have far-reaching political consequences. If Redmond does not know all this he has not mastered the A B C of British politics.






