REPORT UNDER DRAFTEE ACT:

Ottawa, June 17.—By fall, it is expected, the limit of reinforcements under the military service act, will have been reached. This limit is fixed by statute at 100,000, and, up to the present; making full allowance for men not properly classed as "reinforcements" approximately 70,000 men have been secured under the act. The net number of men that should have reported now totals 95,685. Of these, 15,915 failed to report and are not yet apprehended, leaving a total reporting of 79,770.

Included in this total are 2,912 imperial recruits, men voluntarily reporting, and men granted leave of absence for farming. Investigation is now under way to determine how far the men reporting for duty can be properly classed as "reinforcements" under the act. Farmers on leave of absence it is understood, will not be so classed till they actually join the colors. Bad Jump Off Means Drive Will Fail, Say War Critics.

GERMANY BEHIND IT

Terrible Internal Conditions Is Cause of Vienna's "Gambler's Throw."

London, June 17.—The outcome of the Austrian offensive is viewed hopefully, even confidently by the newspapers here. This view is based on the staunch resistance of the Allied defensive and the failure of the enemy to make anything like a big success in his initial advance.

It is admitted that some days must pass before the result of fighting on such a great scale can correctly be judged, but the conviction is firmly expressed in several quarters that it will end in failure for the enemy.

"Failure," say the Daily Mail, "on the first day of these attacks, as conducted on the modern German plan, has hitherto been fatal as in the case of Vimy Ridge, and in the present case the fact of failure can hardly be

MANY SUB-SUNK SHIPS SALVAGED

London, June 17.—From January, 1915, to the end of May, 1918, 407 ships sunk by the Germans in British waters have been salvaged, according to details of the work of the admiralty salvage department, made public in the

the work of the admiratly salvage department, made public in the press today.

Up to December, 1917, 268 ships were recovered. In the present year to the end of May 147 have been salvaged the increase being due to improved methods and not to the greater activity of submarines. Among the difficulties encountered has been the emission of poisonous gases from the rotting cargoes of sunken ships which sometimes have caused the loss of lives. One salvage ship was torpedoed while working on a wreck, while sometimes the work of weeks is destroyed by the rough sea. Feats performed by the salvage department include the raising of a large collier sunk in twelve fathoms of water and involving a dead lift of 3,500 tons. Another vessel was raised 15 fathoms by compressed air.

THE WAR SITUATION

Italians, French and British troops have met the shock of the Austrian of have met the shock of the Austrian of-fensive along a 100-mile front in North-ern Italy, and the enemy is being pushed back, where he is being held in check. Violent battles continue in the mountains from Lake Garda to the Playe and southward along the Playe, but at no place has the enemy broken through the ailled defence. The full through the ailled defence. The full force of the Austrian blow in the moun-tain region drove the defenders of the Venetian Plains back to their third line, but there the Italians held and by suc-cessful counter-attacks have reoccupied cessful counter-attacks have reoccupied important positions on the Aslago Plateau and have recaptured mountain heights along the Brenta. Around Monetello Height, where the battle line turns towards the Adriatic, the British have completely re-established the British line and maintain it against vicious enemy blows. emy blows.

BULGAR PREMIER QUITS;

Teuton Offensive On 100-Mile Front Is Being Held By British, French and Italian Troops—Austrians Who On Sunday Won Across Piave, Are Being Thrown Back By Furious Counter-Attacks - Rome Reports Situation As Assuring - Enemy Claims Capture of 10,0000 Prisoners, and Italians Report Taking 3,000.

Washington, June 17.—An official dispatch from Rome dated 11:55 o'clock last night, says the battle on the Italian front will assume gigantic proportions, the Austrians attempting to break down the Italian defence by a great pincer movement. It adds that the battle will last several days before a decision is reached.

With the Italian Army, Sunday, June 16 .- (Delayed) .- Austrian troops which forced the Piave River have been driven back. The fighting along the river is most intense.

REPEATED COUNTER-ATTACKS.

Rome, June 17.-Vittorio Orlando, the Italian premier, in an nterview, said that the Italian troops, by tenaciously resisting the Austro-Hungarian troops in their new offensive in Northern Italy, and by repeated counter-attacks, they were strongly holding the enemy. The struggle, he added, was most bitter on the eastern slopes of Monetello and to the west of Sandona di Piave.

DIAZ WAS READY.

The Italian army was prepared for the Austrian attack, and there is confidence that it will be able to break the force of the blow. Throughout the country there is a feeling of expectancy. TAKES OWN LIFE AT CARLING CAMP

Body of Wellington County Man Found in Lavatory.

PARENTS IN ON SUNDAY

No Motive Yet Discovered For Act-Court of Inquiry

Pte. John Elkerton (3136057), a member of F. Company, 1st Depot Battalion. Western Ontario Regiment, committed suicide by hanging himself in a lavatory at Carling Heights camp some time during Sunday night. The body was discovered at 4:30 a.m. by Pte. W. H. Girvin, one of the battalion cooks, who immediately notified R. S. M. Whitfield. Lieut. C. W. Pennecott, medical officer of the battalion, was summoned, but life was extinct, and rigor mortishad commenced to set in. It is believed that Pte. Elkerton had been dead three or four hours when discovered. The body was suspended from a water pipe by a short piece of rope.

Pte. Elkerton was a drafted man, 23 years of age, and prior to being called up resided in Wellington County, R. R. No. 1, near the village of Arris, with his parents. The latter were in to see their son Sunday, and were today notified of his death by the military authorified. No motive for the occurrence has as yet been discovered. 

TORONTO, June 16.—Taken from the ranks of units at Niagara and Exhibition Camps today, Joseph Fuller, alias Frank Jackson, and Lyman Morrison, both aged eighteen years, were charged by provincial police officers with the murder of Theodore Taylor of Thomastown, a village six miles from Englehart.

Taylor was a farmer 70 years of age, and it was reported that he had disposed of his farm for several thousand dollars, a portion of which he was believed to have had on his person at the time of the murder. He was clubbed to death and robbed of \$95.

On May 25, the day after the murder, Morrison was arrested for carrying a gun and allowed to enlist by a police magistrate of the locality. That day Charles Cooper was arrested by Provincial Officer Rowell, and is said to have given the information upon which the police then commenced to act.

Fuller disappeared by canoe. Reaching Bracebridge, he came to Toronto to enlist and was taken into the ranks. When the police visited the camp it was found that Fuller was held as a deserter. It is stated that he does not deny complicity in the crime and admits striking Taylor, but not the fatal blow.





Caution Against Freezing.

From a number of sources it has been learned that the severe weather of last winter caused considerable loss through the freezing of canned goods. To prevent similar trouble, care should be taken to store canned vegetables and fruits where they will be protected from freezing. If the place of storage is not frost-proof the jars should be moved to a warmer place when the weather becomes severe.

Essentials For Canning.

It is important to plan your work so that whatever may be needed will be ready for use. Arrange everything conveniently in advance. Preliminary provisions include:

1. A reliable alarm clock in a convenient place (set to ring when the sterilizing is done).

2. All the necessary equipment in place before beginning work.






