-News From Washington.

THE FOREIGNERS' PERIL

Leader Only Element Lacking to Parallel Conditions With Those of Boxer Period.

Washington, Sept. 29.—China is declared to be on the verge of another upheaval, similar to the boxer uprising and the lives of foreigners are in jeopardy. Advices received here recently from Government officials in China express the belief that an outbreak at any time would not surprise them. The state department has instructed officials to maintain a close watch on the internal conditions.

All through the summer months there have been mutterings of discontent in some of the Chinese provinces due to the rice famine, dynastic difficulties and dissatisfaction over acts of the Pekin Government as to foreign investments in China.

Good harvests mitigated to some extent the gravity of the situation, but there is still a general feeling of unrest, according to personal letters received here from men on duty in that quarter.

The army and the navy are prepared for any emergency, but their readiness is solely a precautionary measure, it is said, and should not be taken as an indication of immediate
