John Bull Acts London, July 18. - Two naval orders

issued today by the British admiralty are believed to indicate the determination of Great Britain to protect British shipping from the unjustifiable acts of the Russian navy. One order directs the Mediterranean squadron to leave Malta and proceed immediately to Alexandria, which is close to the mouth of the Suez Canal. The other order directs two fast cruisers to proceed through the Suez Canal and take their station in the Red Sca, the scene of the recent interference by the Russian auxiliary cruisers, with neutral vessels of Great Britain and Germany. Cabinet Meeting Called.

London, July 19. - In British official circles the recent seizure and overhauling of British ships in the Red Sea by the Russian volunteer fleet steamers Smolensk and St. Petersburg are regarded as very grave internation. al incidents. The seizure of the Peninsular and Oriental Malacca by the St. Petersburg and her arrival in the Suez Canal as a prize of war on her way to Libau, on the Baltic, has come as a climax, and the cabinet today is considering the course to pursue. The British law officers acknowledge the right of the Russia to seize and detain mails, provided that only official communications are taken, but they take the most serious view of the status of the Russian ships patrolling the Red Sea, and if any official action or protest ensues it will be chiefly in regard to the passage of these erstwhile merchant ships through the Dardanelles, and their subsequent transformation

It is reassuring to learn that Germany has taken the initiative in repudiating Russia's high-handed course. As an ally of Japan, Great Britain would be charged with seeking to take advantage of Russian misfortunes if she adopted energetic methods, while Germany remained inactive. The close friendship between Germany and Russia has not deterred the German Government from a vigorous assertion of its rights, and this example has made it easier for Great Britain to pursue a similar policy.

JAPANESE WON AGAINST ODDS

Outfought the Russians at All Points in Mo Tien Pass.

RUSS LOSS, 1,000; JAPANESE, 229

Final Assault of Port Arthur Expected To Be Made Sometime This Week.

London, Tuesday, July 19. - The Morning Post's correspondent at Gen Kuroki's headquarters, telegraphing under date of July 17, says: A Russian force, apparently about 20,000 strong, attacked the front, left and right of the Japanese positions on the western slope of Mo Tien Pass at a.m. today, under cover of a dense fog. The sudden onslaught drove in the Japanese posts, but, as soon as rein forcements arrived, the Japanese gallantly advanced to the attack, and after severe fighting drove off the Russians and occupied the position. The Russians retired, their retreat being well covered. The fighting lasted until 3 p.m., and when I left the scene firing was still proceeding. St. Petersburg, Tuesday, July 19, 4:15 a.m.-The Russian and Japanese forces which are lined up expecting a clash, grappled in a serious fight Sunday morning, according to a report General Kuropatkin received here late last night. The report indicates that the Japanese misinterpreted the movement, and that instead of it being an attempt to take Mo Tien Pass, it was a reconnaissance on large scale. General Count Keller's account of the fight does not specially state the number of men engaged though it shows that the Russian main advance consisted of eighteen battalions, with considerable reserves three battalions of the latter being called up during the course of the battle, while others were not utilized An important fact developed by the reconnaissance was the exact location of a powerful Japanese force secreter in the region between Fen Shui are Mo Tien Passes. Its strength is indicated by the fact that 21 battalions were insufficient to permanently force the Japanese positions, though some of them were occupied temporarily. Or the other hand, it would appear from the report that the Japanese either disinclined or unable to follow Lieut.-General Keller when he retire to his former position at Ikhavuar. The seriousness of the day's fighting is shown in Gen. Keller's estimate that the Russian casualties were over 1,000 The battle leaves the general situation unchanged, but shows that a powerfu Japanese army is massed, and is con stantly threatening Liao Yang, appar ently only waiting General Kuroki' signal to advance.

The Official Report.

Following is the dispatch from Gen Kuropatkin, dated July 17: 'After the occupation by Genera Kuroki's army of the passes in the Fen Shui mountain chain, our information concerning his forces and disposi tions was in general inadequate. Ac cording to some reports, his army has been reinforced, and he had even ex tended his forces toward Samaits Other reports stated that a displacement of his troops had been made in the direction of Ta Pass and Siu Yes There were even indications that Kuroki had transferred his headquar ters from Takhkhekan to Touinpu. Or the strength of the information received and on the basis of reconnais sances which had been made, the hypothesis was formed that the principal forces of the enemy were concen trated around Lianshankwan, and tha their advanced guards had beer strengthened in the passes of Siaokao Wafankwan, Sinkia, Lakho and Papua as well as at Sybey Pass, 2½ mile north and half the height of Siaoka

"On July 17, in order to determine the strength of the enemy, it was de cided to advance against his positio in the direction of Lianshankwan Lieut.-General Count Keller had been instructed not to start with the object of capturing the pass, but to act ac cording to the strength of the force that he would find opposed to him.
"The left column of this expedition ary force, consisting of three battalwas dispatched towards Sybey Pass. The center column, commande by Major-General Kashtalinsky, consisting of fourteen battalions, with twelve guns, was destined to attacl Siaokao Pass, the heights surmounted by the temple, and Wafankwan Pass The right column, one battalion strong was occupying points where the roads leading to Sinkia and Lakho Passe cross, in order to cover the right flanl of General Kashtalinsky's column. The general reserve was left at Ikhavuan. and a portion of the force occupied a position at that place.

Used Bayonets.

"At 10 p.m., July 16, the head of the column advanced from Ikhavuan. At 11 o'clock a battalion of the second regiment dislodged a Japanese outpost at the point of the bayonet at the crossing of the Lakho and the Sinkia roads. The details of this engagement have not yet been verified, but its general course, according to telegraphic reports sent in by General Keller, was as follows:

"During the night the Japanese has evacuated Siaokao Pass and the heights surmounted by the temple. leaving only outposts there. At daws General Kashtalinsky's column occupied these passes, driving back the Japanese advance posts. At about 5:30 o'clock on the morning of July 1. the Japanese, in considerable force an with numerous guns, occupied Wafankwan Passes and the mountainous bluffs to the south on the flank General Kashtalinsky's column. From the position and from the crest of the mountains to the east of the heights surmounted by the temple the enemy directed a heavy artillery and rifle fire

"Gen. Kashtalinsky advanced to occupy the bluffs, sending forward at first one and than three battalions, but the attempt failed, no withstanding the support given by the horse moun toin battery, as our field guns could not be brought into action on account of the nature of the ground.

After 34 shots had been fired from the third battery of the third brigade, which held the saddle to the south of Yanze Pass, the Japanese battery was finally reduced to silence "The fight ceased at 3 p.m. and the troops returned to Ikhavuan.

"The Japanese advance was stopped above the valley of the Iantakhe River at a position occupied and maintained

"In consequence of a sleepless night and the heat of the day our troops were greatly fatigued, having been over fifteen hours on foot and fighting Our losses have not yet been exactly ascertained, but General Keller reports that they exceed 1,000.

"The gallant Twenty-fourth Regiment suffered most. General Keller especially mentions the activity, courage and coolness shown by its commanding officers. Col. Koschitz was severely wounded in the leg, but renained in the ranks until the end of he action
