It has been said by jealous-minded rivals that the pride of a Tillsonburg man for his native town is one of the most impressive things in nature. Apart from the hidden sarcasm of the remark the fact remains that we are proud of pretty, enterprising Tillsonburg.

The boys and girls who are returning to the old burg will not only rejoice with us in the evidences of steady growth and continued prosperity, but will also feel a thrill of pride in the fact that Tillsonburg takes a place in the forefront of Canadian towns.

It will interest many of the visitors, many of those who have fragrant memories of the past and present and pleasant associations connected with the name of Tillsonburg, to observe the strides that have been made and that are being made. No town in Ontario has made more material progress in the last few years than has the town to which we belong.

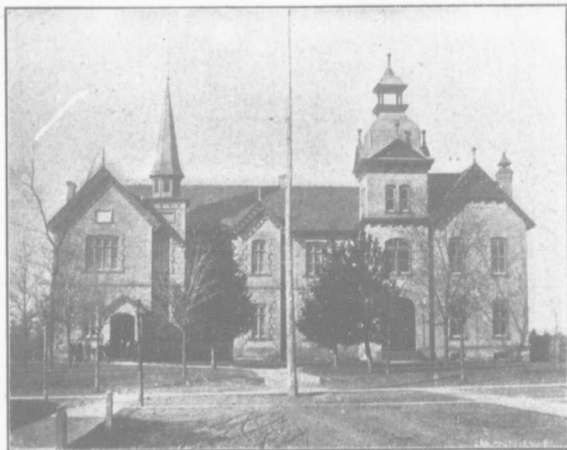

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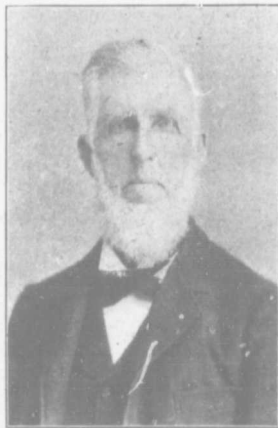

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# A Short History of Tillsonburg

Tillsonburg, named in honor of its founder—is indeed a picturesque and

busy centre of trade, but there is room for more just such enterprising men

as those who have helped to place it in such an enviable position. Located in the Township of Dereham, on the Otter Creek, and without a commercial rival nearer than Ingersoll on the north, Aylmer on the west and Simcoe to the east, merchants and business men are "monarchs of all they survey." The surrounding country is rich in fruit, grain, stock and dairy productions, and railway facilities include the Michigan Central and Grand Trunk. Educational and religious advantages have been provided for with wise liberality, and social life in Tillsonburg is refined and cultured.

But the transition to a consideration of the town of to-day from the forest of a few years ago is too sudden without a brief retrospect.

Among the early comers were three men whose names have become household words since, George Tillson, Joseph VanNorman and Hiram Capron. All have "passed that bourne whence no traveller returns," but their works live still. Hiram Capron subsequently removed to Paris, Ont., where his immense landed and financial operations earned the deserved title of "King Capron." Joseph VanNorman lived to be almost a centenarian, ending his years in the town he had helped to create, and George Tillson's mantle fell on a worthy success in the person of

his son, the late E. D. Tillson, who enjoyed in a marked degree the esteem

wooded bluff, and overlooking Lake Joseph, Tillsonburg, Ontario, may be seen this inscription carved on a plain marble slab: "George Tillson was born in Greenwich, Mass., in 1782, settled at

Long Point Furnace, C. W., in 1822, moved from there to Tillsonburg, then a dense wilderness, in 1825." This simple and unostentatious history is an index of the man, and no words could

more fittingly designate the life-work of one who pioneered his own way.

When George Tillson (sprung from hardy Pilgrim Father stock and reared amid those New England hills—the nursery of nature's gentlemen) first caught sight in 1825 of the lovely valley and slope along which the town of Tillsonburg is now scattered, a far different picture was presented from the present one, though it is one of surpassing beauty. The tree is religiously preserved under which he camped the first night, and is still a conspicuous landmark on the Vienna road, it being a tall, towering fir, closely allied to the Douglas pine of British Columbia. From his camp-fire under this noble fir, George Tillson could see the Big Otter Creek—named from its abundance of specially fine otters—like a silver thread in a setting of dense evergreens down to the very water's edge. With an eye ever looking for water-power, and its possibilities, he saw at a glance that this stream of clear, cool spring water could be made the site of a town, and there and then he decided to stay.

Nothing impresses a stranger visiting Tillsonburg more than the part water may be made to play even in these days of steam and electricity. The sense of water-power seems all-pervading and no part of the town is far distant from a cool stream of pure spring water gushing out of an iron

pipe constantly, with no niggardly tap, but pouring out night and day, summer and winter, from the storage re-

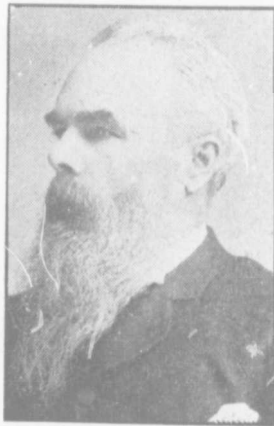

ing pure sulphur water from a bubbling spring free to all with no re-

stricting by-laws to interfere. All the mills are driven by water, and towering high above all is the graceful water-tower—a shaft of white brickwork, 125 feet high—supplying by hydraulic pressure spring water for drinking purposes, whilst for fire protection Lake L'Esgar (storage lake) furnishes an ever-ready pressure. In Tillson's creamery pure spring water is constantly flowing in open stone drains in each room, and even in the growing corn fields hydrants are placed her and there.

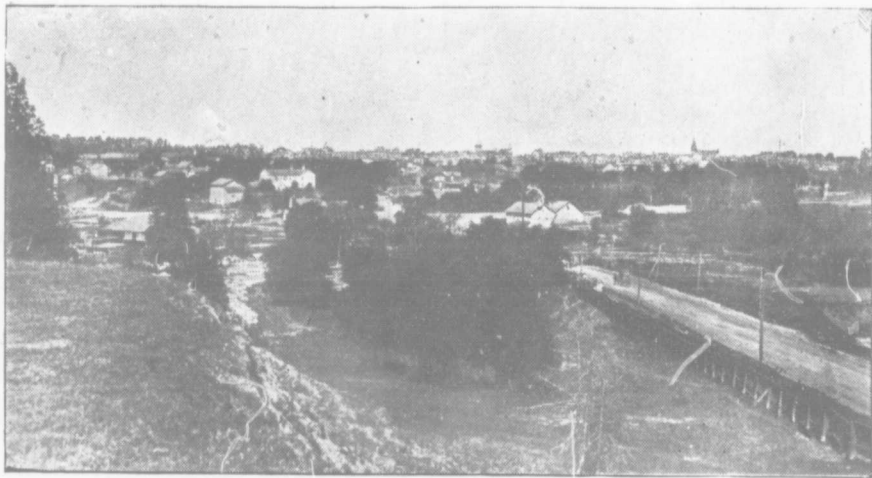
The town itself need not be described. Suffice to say, it is a clean, well-kept and charming place, with beautiful residences along its broad streets, which are beautified by long and symmetrical rows of maples, a noteworthy feature being the neat and solid-looking granolithic sidewalks, in all, some fifteen or sixteen miles long. But the picturesque and Switzerland-like surroundings deserve more than passing notice. Particularly is this true of one road by which the passing stranger is told Eden, a neighboring village may be reached. It seems right according to the eternal fitness of things that Eden lies just beyond those green hills for nothing more Eden-like can be imagined. On the left the Big Otter, released from the tyranny of turning the water wheels farther back, flows along, clear and cool, but with many a sharp curve,

and on the right a noisy little brook, milk-white from the adjacent sulphur

springs, discharges into the larger stream, the waters of which refuse to

mingle with it for some distance. The road itself winds up through the thick evergreens, past a quaint old-fashioned stone mill, just back of which is a famous trout pond. The trees' heavy branches almost touch the water, and up along the hill-sides bright patches of dark orange and snowy-white, intermingled with flaming yellow, tell us where tiger lilies and marguerites love to blossom. From the lofty water-tower a magnificent sweep of country is viewed, and the course of the Big Otter may be traced for miles—the hillsides dark green with pine and spruce and the adjacent country patched with the fresh green of grain fields. The decidedly New England cast of country was, no doubt, one reason why George Tillson, as he shaded his eyes long ago and first looked out on that beautiful valley, decided to stay because it reminded him of his distant Massachusetts birth-place. Certain it is that his Puritan thrift and enterprise, together with the continued activity of his descendants, have been of incalculable benefit to that section, which might well be denominated "Ontario's New England."

The Tillson farm was originally covered by towering pines, and the soil was jocularly called "blow-sand." The homestead comprises 500 acres, and it is as worthy of a visit as the model farms at Guelph and Ottawa. The fences are in perfect order; the lakes

are shaded by avenues of stately maples; each field is supplied with pure spring water. A perfect network of drainage and water pipes underlies the whole, this work having been done under the supervision of skilled engineers. The orchard and gardens are models worthy of imitation

and a fine trout pond adds to the attractions. It is at the barns, however, where the ambitious farmer can find inspiration. Two large silos indicate the method of feeding the fine herds of Durham-Holstein cows. These cattle are beauties, and the system of

Dr. and Cr. is so perfect, that each bovine must show in milk and butter her value. The creamery is neatness and coolness personified. Churning operations are conducted every day. Supplies are sent to some of the leading educational and public institutions throughout the country, and everything is AI in quality. The herd of cows answers the query why the fields yield 40 bushels of wheat to the acre; the corn grows to an Illinois height, and all growth is rich and productive.

Tillsonburg experienced what many other towns in Canada have, in reference to the value of having a supply of fine timber, and mills to manufacture lumber, and here again the Tillson enterprise found a fitting scope. Not so very many years ago there was standing there 6,000,000 feet of lumber. Now it is nearly all gone into the construction of homes. The ordinary experience of a "timber" town is, that when the saw mills close, everything around shows signs of decay. But in this case this did not follow. New industries took the place of the old one, and by the aid of bright and enterprising men, such as can be found in Tillsonburg by the score, the crisis was passed, and a new era of prosperity was inaugurated.

Tillsonburg was incorporated as a town in '72, but in '65 it was elevated to the dignity of a "police village."

The population is 3,500. As the embryo city began to realize the fact that it had to enter into competition with rivals that possessed railway and water communication, steps were taken to supply the demand. The then Canada Southern (now the Michigan Central) and subsequently the Grand

The denominations having organization are: Methodist, Baptist, Presbyterian, Church of England and Catholic.

Good schools are an important factor in the progress of any town and in this respect Tillsonburg takes first rank. The High school has three de-

partments. A fall of 28 feet has been created and Lake Lisgar, half a mile long, is thus formed.

The supply of water for domestic use is derived from the splendid system owned by the E. D. Tillson estate. The source is found in a series of



Trunk, were bonused to the extent of \$18,000. Since then a railroad has been built between Port Burwell and Ingersoll, and the Wabash have been given running rights over the Grand Trunk. There is also a Grand Trunk line between Brantford and Tillsonburg, thus giving the town five railroads.

partments, is a solidly-built brick building, and cost \$10,000. The Public school cost \$17,500.

The waterworks comprises two distinct systems. That controlled by the town is for fire protection, street watering, etc., and is known as the Holly system. Power is derived from the creek that flows into the Otter at this

living springs, a mile or so from town. The tower of the Tillson Works is 125 feet high, and its fine proportions add much to the picturesque beauty of a bird's-eye view of the town. The water is elevated by two pumps, the larger one having a capacity of 42,000 gallons per hour, and no purer water can be found in Canada.

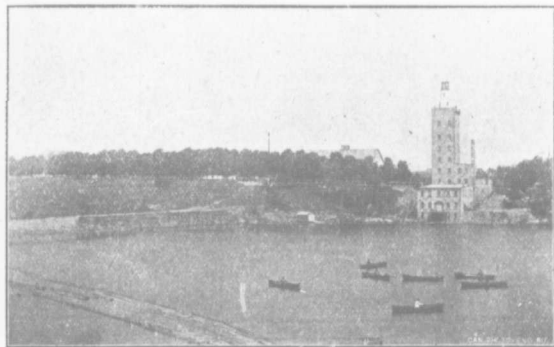

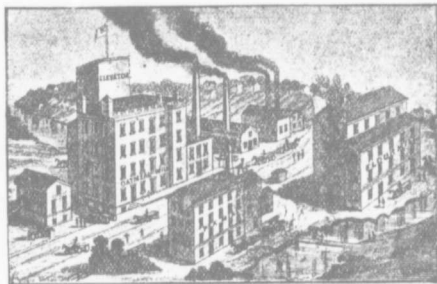

## The TILLSONBURG REUNION

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THE RE-UNION of Tillsonburg's Old Boys which has now been so successfully launched, is the offspring of a sentiment which cannot be too frequently dwelt upon and encouraged. It is the sentiment which inspires in the truly patriotic mind that love of country, for the affection for the spot of ones birth where have been spent the never-to-be-forgotten days of youth or where the roof tree has been reared which most intimately entwines the lives of those most dear to us. However rough or rugged may be the surroundings of the spot thus cherished, if it is the old home, it draws the loving eye, while it's scenes and incidents form a vivid picture in memory's treasure-house, no matter how far the wanderer may have strayed from the places of his youth.
