HON. F.D. MONK DIED TO-DAY AT MONTREAL CITY

He Had Been Ill for Some Time - Splendid Career is Closed.

[By Special Wire to The Courier] MONTREAL, May 15-Hon. F. D. Monk, former Minister of Public Works, in the Dominion cabinet, died here this morning.

The late statesman had been suffering from hardening of the arteries. It was noticed last night by his physicians that he was sinking and the last rites of the Roman Catholic church, to which he belonged, were administered by Rev. Father Troie, a personal friend.

The end came about 3.25, the daughter and his two brothers, F. A. and J. D. Monk being present. Mr. was conscious to the last.

Among the earliest callers on the bereaved family, was Henri Bour-assa, a very old friend of the dead

ormer minister. Mr. Monk resigned his seat for Jacques Cartier on March 3 last owing to the continuance of his ill health. He had been absent from parliament since his resignation of the portfolio of Public Works on October 22, 1912, hoping against hope that he would recover sufficiently to attend to his arliamentary duties.
