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THE PLEBISCITE.

On the whole it is a large vote. It is difficult to get voters to go to the polls when the personal element is absent from an election.

Notwithstanding the absence of these inducements 543,929 men marked their ballots. This is a much larger proportion of the possible vote than is usually polled in the United States.

On the side of the prohibitionists it was an absolutely pure voluntary, unselfish vote. The men who marked their ballots for prohibition, did so for the benefit of others.

A good majority. The majority for prohibition is a substantial one. It is exactly the electoral majority that would support Government that had a majority of 49 in the house of Commons, after an election in which the average majority secured at the polls by the elected members had been 324.
