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Hon. Mr. PALMER: No doubt this is a question of considerable importance to the agricultural portion of the community, and it has been discussed on several occasions which have been decided in Courts of Law; but those decisions have not been on the direct question which is now brought to the consideration of the Legislature, that is, the right of a farmer to the seaweed on that part of the shore which does not properly belong to, or come within the bounds of a farm.

The question arises then, to whom does the property of this seaweed, lodged on that part of the shore, belong? There can be no question as to the right of what is known as the high water mark, for it belongs to the owner of the land on which it is thrown; but the question is respecting what is thrown on that space of the shore between the high water mark and the low water mark originally belonged to the Crown, and if not granted away, the right remains in the Crown still.

The House again resolved itself into a committee of the whole upon the despatches, and after some time was resumed, when the Chairman, Hon. Mr. Walker, reported two resolutions agreed to.

Mr. President and Honourable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council: I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 2nd inst., in relation to the petition of the Farmers of the County of York, relative to the seaweed on the shore.

By the act which you have passed "to amend and explain the Land Purchase Bill," you have empowered me, as soon as the purchase of any Public Estate shall have passed to self-sustaining, to receive from further payment, Tenants on that Estate who have paid their full purchase money of their farms.

Under this Act, I shall be enabled to comply with the prayer of the petition, which, at the commencement of the Session, I informed you that I had received from certain persons who had purchased their holdings on the Selkirk Estate.

I have given my assent, with much satisfaction, to the Bill, by which you have placed in the hands of the Government, a discretionary power to expend a limited amount of public money in the Purchase of Lands, whose value may exceed the limits of the Land Purchase Act.

The important subject of Education has received your anxious consideration, and I trust, that the measure, which you have matured for consolidating and amending the Laws therewith, may be of benefit to the community.

The able Report of the Committee on Highways, has been before you: Although you have not seen fit to take any legislative action upon it during the present Session, the whole subject will be carefully considered during the recess, with the view to the adoption, at your next meeting, of a system of management which will afford a better security for the judicious expenditure of the money appropriated for this service.

I now release you from further attendance here by proposing this Session of the Legislature.

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shell-fish off the shore, and it has been decided that the right belongs to the public, on the ground that they are living fish, for living fish are common to all but it has not been decided that the public have a right to take shore-seed or dead shells, for they are considered as forming a part of the soil. Upon the whole, I do not know that anything more can be done this session, than to give the public the views of the Legislature upon the subject. This will not prevent them from coming before the Legislature at another session, but if what they see published induces them to change their minds, well and good. I fully admit that there are places where large quantities of seaweed are thrown up, which might be an advantage to the public if they were allowed to use it without injury to persons against whose land it is cast, and increasing the work of the fish.

The report was then adopted, and ordered to be published in the Royal Gazette.

On motion of the Hon. Mr. WALKER, a bill for the relief of unfortunate debtors was read a third time and passed.

Adjourned till to-morrow at ten o'clock.
