



From forty to sixty persons are believed to have lost their lives and many others injured in Chicago on Friday by an explosion of gas in the three story compartment building at 140th street and Nedbury Avenue in the heart of the foreign district on the west side. The thermometer registered eight below zero and the injured suffered severely from cold.

France is experiencing the most severe winter since 1893. The cold reached even the most southerly point a few days ago and affected such fovored spots as Nice and Cannes, while at Cetten there was eleven degrees of frost, At Paris the same time the mercury fell to fourteen, at Belfort to eight, at Lyons to five, while the port of Nantes was frozen up notwithstanding efforts of ice breakers.






