

BASZETERRE, Gaudeloupe, Oct. 18.

Five men and three women were killed, and at least twenty-three perwore wounded, six of whom will killed, and at least twenty-three persons were wounded, six of whom will die, during rioting at the elections here. One of the dead is a woman of 70. It is supposed that many others who were injured fled to the woods after the fighting. The roof of the Town Hall, in which the balloting took place, was riddled with bullets. The rioting occurred in the Petit Bourge District of the City. The trouble began through the election trouble began through the ejection from the hall of the representatives of the Radical Party at the moment and when open voting closed, and the inspection of the ballots was to begin. The Radicals who charge frauds against Covernor Gautet and frauds against Governor Gautret and the Government party at the elections of last April, protested against this action, and when outside stoned the building. Finally raising their forces and declaring their right to be present at and assist in the canvass of the votes the Radicals attempted to force a contract. force an entrance and assaulted the 12 gendarmes who stood in their way. The gendarmes fired a volley over their heads and then shot indiscriminately into the crowd

Herring Packing.

(Daily News Message.)

CURLING, Oct. 18. Mesers Whittaker and Potts of lew York, are here for the purpose of establishing a herring packing plant in Bay of Islands. The former gentleman is President of a Pure Food Corporation, whose yearly business uns into the millions. It is their inention to erect a freezer. They are negotiating for the purchase of the old Atlantic Fish Co's, premises at Benoit's Cove. Mr. Whittaker states that he can easily handle 24,000 barrels of herring yearly, and will employ a large number of boys and girls in preparing the herring for market. He says that the herring situation is a very serious one, the fish having almost vanished from the coast of Maine, which has been his firm's principal source of supply heretofore. He also states that American packers will be compelled to come to Newfoundland if they wish to continue in the business. A wire received from the Premier pronounced the project a very attractive one, and requests further particulars regarding it.

Wellman Picked Up.

NEW YORK, Oct. 18. A wireless message from the steam Trent says that the Trent picked up Walter Wellman and the crew of the airship America. 
