

How The Body Kills Germs.



Only four of them were left at the muster-roll of 1905, the people having given the party the worst drubbing on record in the history of politics in Newfoundland. The Tory party were given another chance in 1909. It is true the name of the party was so unpopular that they changed it absolutely and went to the country under a new banner, a new name and a new leader. Sir Edward Morris was called to the leadership by that arch-Tory, Morison, and his associates in the House of Assembly in 1908. In his reply to the requisition he

Dredge is Wanted Here

That the dredging of the coves along the water front, especially in the western part of the harbor is necessary, is evident to all who work there or have business on the different wharves. The coves have filled rapidly with silt and all kinds of offal goming down into them from the site. coming down into them from the city sewers and at low tide and in hot weather strong robust men working on the wharves have become ill by inhaling the efflusion inhaling the effluvia emitted from these places. An incident which occurred yesterday will go to prove that our contention is correct. A steamer was hauled well into the cove be-tween Franklin's and Tessier's wharves and when most of the cargo had been put into her forward she sank several feet in the coze there. A tug was trying to get her out yesterday afternoon for hours, but could not do so and the last expedient was, to take most of the cargo out of her forward to lighten when she was worked out into deeper water. This created a deal of expense which would be unneces-sary if the cove were to be deepened. If the coves are not attended to there will be an outbreak of some dangerous disease in the city before long.

An outbreak of diphtheria has occurred at Torbay. Two cases have been reported from one house and one case from another. 


