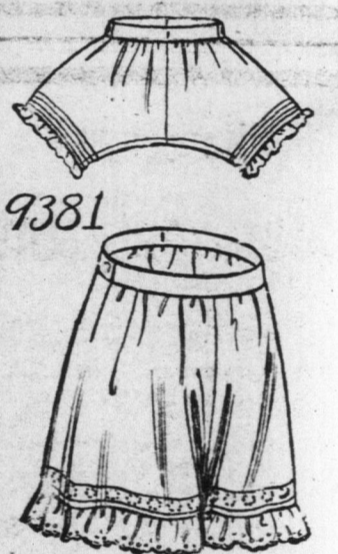

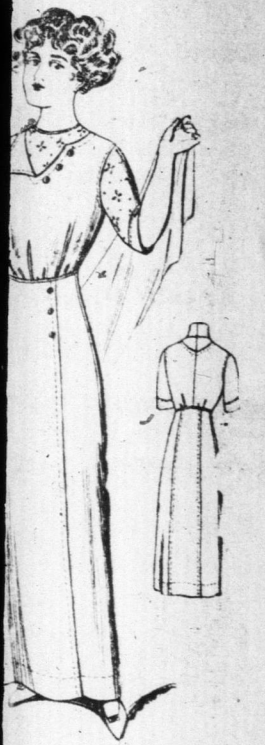

A man whom I used to know recently committed suicide. No, it wasn't a case of unrequited love. Nothing so romantic as that. It was simply a case of unpaid bills. This man had health, a good wife, a fairly good prospect. There was no reason on earth why he should have lived to a ripe old age in enjoyment of all these blessings. If it hadn't been that early in life he drifted into the habit of spending just a little more money than he had. Instead of basing his expenditures on his earning powers, he based them on his wishing powers. Marriage only made him worse. Agencies which had loaned him money at exorbitant rates were constantly hounding him, every mail brought him dunning letters, he borrowed from Peter to pay Paul, he passed sleepless nights trying to find a way out, he agonized over his condition, and yet all the time—such is the psychology of the spender—he went on living beyond his means.

Finally things came to a crisis, and driven half crazy by it all, he killed himself, leaving his wife with a good insurance and a broken heart. We often see people who seem to have more of the good things of life than are commensurate with their financial condition; and sometimes we envy them. It is a foolish envy. Believe me, anyone who lives beyond his means, pays heavily in coin of anxiety and a troubled mind for all the pleasures he may get out of his luxuries. For every man who is driven to suicide by extravagant living I don't doubt that there are hundreds who live on the brink of it. It is said by those who have good reason to know, that a great many of the people who own automobiles are constantly on the verge of financial ruin. Their homes, their salaries and their peace of mind are all heavily pledged to maintain the wretched things. Decidedly the savages who used to call the automobile a "devil wagon" spoke better than they knew. And decidedly we torturers, who plod along afoot and enviously watch the hares in their automobiles, are really much more likely to win out in the race for happiness than we realize. When a young couple starts out spending money in a haphazard way without attempting to reckon just how much per week they can afford to spend for each item, they start on the road to trouble. Five Drowned.

Omemee, Ont., Sept. 29.—Five persons, a family party, were drowned yesterday in the Pigeon River, near Omemee, when their canoe was overturned by the pull of a 14-pound maskinonge, on a trailing line, held by Wm. McCaffery, assistant supply manager of the Canadian General Electric Company, Toronto. The dead are—

William McCaffery, aged 38, 16 South Drive; Laura Seager McCaffery, aged 38, his wife; Mrs. Mary McCaffery, Omemee, his mother, Grace Maxine McCaffery, aged 12, his daughter; Howard Seager McCaffery, aged 8, his son.

Mr. McCaffery, a son of Chas. McCaffery of this town, came here with his family on Friday, to spend a short holiday. With his wife, mother and two children, he started down the Pigeon River, yesterday morning, on a fishing expedition. The weather was fine and though rain came on towards evening, there was nothing in the nature of a squall.

No member of the party was seen alive after the canoe passed down the river. When the party did not return towards evening, Chas. McCaffery, father of the drowned man, became alarmed, and organized a search party.

Seven miles down the river the canoe was discovered, floating bottom upwards. Dragging operations were commenced immediately. The search continued until 3 o'clock on Sunday morning, by which time four bodies—those of McCaffery, his wife, mother and son—had been recovered. The body of the little girl was not found until 10 o'clock this morning. Clutched in the hand of Mr. McCaffery, when his body was found was the end of a trailing line. On the hook was a maskinonge weighing 14 pounds. Mr. McCaffery's watch had stopped at 2:35 o'clock.

ALDERMAN DROPS DEAD IN COUNCIL.

Quebec, Oct. 3.—There was a sensation at the city hall last evening when alderman Patrick Dineen, one of the best known members of the city council, was suddenly taken ill and expired. When doctors pronounced the verdict that his life was in danger, a priest and notary were called, and the deceased was allowed to make his last will before expiring.

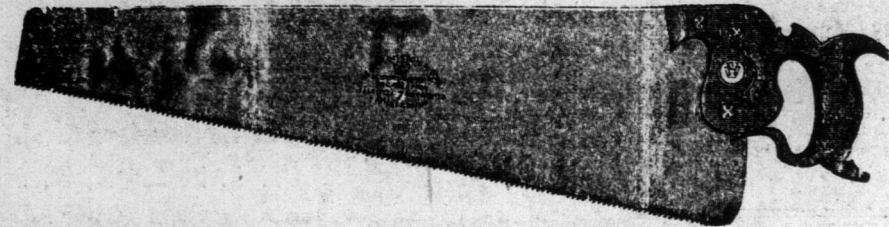

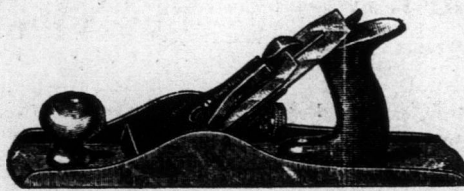

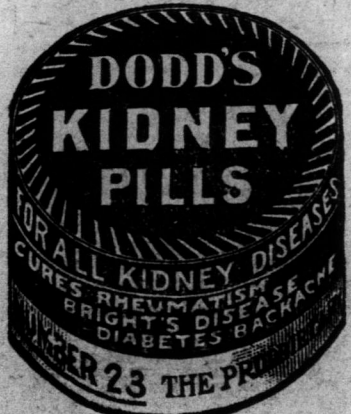

The Tory Leopard Cannot Change Its Spots.

The unpopularity of the Government is intense. It exceeds in intensity even the feeling of 1889 and 1900. It is a noteworthy feature of all three occasions, that the feeling is directed against a Tory Government. The animosity of the people towards the Party of '89 was so great that every member of the Tory Executive who sought the suffrage of the people was not only defeated but placed at the bottom of the poll and only nine members of the party obtained seats in the next House of Assembly. In such a way did the people mark their disapproval of the action of the Tory administration of 1885 to 1898, and to-day the memory of that administration lives as the government of the gunny bag, fousty meal and sour molasses. A Tory administration was tried again in the Fall of 1897, but the experience of that administration was even worse, and its history is so well known, that it will be recalled by a mere reference. How severely the people dealt with the Tory party at the election of 1900 is a matter of record. Only four of them were left at the muster-roll of 1905, the people having given the party the worst drubbing on record in the history of politics in Newfoundland. The Tory party were given another chance in 1909. It is true the name of the party was so unpopular that they changed it absolutely and went to the country under a new banner, a new name and a new leader. Sir Edward Morris was called to the leadership by that arch-Tory, Morrison, and his associates in the House of Assembly in 1909. In his reply to the requisition he



accepted the position of the leader of the Opposition forces in the Colony, which henceforth will be known as The People's Party. "Under the banner of the People's Party the whole of the industrial classes of the Colony—the Fishermen, the Farmers, the Mechanics, the Laborers, the Clerks, and all who work for a living—will find a rallying point, where all who wish to see their country advance may join together to work for the common good. All who work for a living who took the bait have been grievously disappointed by the experience of the past four years. They have not found the rally point they were promised, where work would be done for the common good. They have found a banner under which are crowded a group of members grabbing all the tubercles of its they can get hold of, a gang of heelers picking up all kinds of fees and commissions that they can induce the Government to give them, a body of politicians careless of the future and spending public money lavishly in the hope of turning the political tide which is now running hard against them. The People's Party banner has become a resort for all who are self-seekers and all who are looking out for Government pay, and who are reckless of the common good. All who work for a living see a crowd of picnickers under the People's Party banner, who are getting a good time out of the Government at the expense of the people. All who work for a living find it harder to live now than the People's Party run the Government. House rent is higher. Coal is dearer. Food is scarcer and more expensive. Clothing is dearer. People are being plied by the Tory Times, while they are exasperated by the picnics and fine times the People's Party leaders enjoy. They are reminded that Tory Times were always hard times and are so to-day. They find themselves under the Tory leopard and it cannot change its spots.

The Police Court.

Three drunks were discharged; three others were fined \$2 or 7 days each. A drunk and disorderly fisherman who damaged the cab in which he was conveyed to the station, was fined \$5 or 14 days. Another drunk and disorderly who smashed the windows of his cell at the police station was fined \$5 or 14 days. AN ANNOYING AFFAIR. Yesterday Mr. John Tucker, of Broad Cove, came to the city with his horse and express, and just before noon he left it standing on George Street while he went to a restaurant. When he returned he found the horse gone nor did he find it afterwards. The man left town at 8 o'clock and had to tramp home. At 11 o'clock last night the police found the animal tied to a post on New Gower Street. Boys had the horse off driving all the afternoon and night, and if they are found should be severely punished.

Special Evening Telegram.
LONDON, Oct. 7. The cabinet held a long session today in course of which Grey explained the policy of the Powers in the Balkan question. He received from his colleagues an endorsement of his attitude as taken since the trouble began.

BERLIN, Oct. 7. The aviation week at Johannisthal concluded on Sunday afternoon, after two more deaths had been added to the long list of fatalities that have occurred among European aviators during the past two months. A monoplane, driven by Alig, carrying a mechanic, fell from a height of 600 feet.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, Oct. 7. The Telegraph, referring to rumors in political circles that the Government is in negotiation with John Redmond, in the hope of finding a way out of the Ulster impasse, says that the suggested basis of compromise is giving Ulster the right of the Home Rule Bill and that under certain conditions some agreement has been reached.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, Oct. 7. The Balkan situation is considered more hopeful to-day. The decision of the Powers to take joint action to end the crisis, is greeted with satisfaction and they will meet to-day or the latest, to-morrow, to take up the question of the Balkan States. Turkey and the Balkan States, Austria and Russia have been selected on behalf of the other great Powers to act in Balkan capitals while ambassadors from the other Powers will make representations to the Ottoman Government.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, Oct. 7. A despatch from Constantinople says the proposed joint action taken by the Powers is in conjunction with the decision of the Powers to introduce reforms in her European provinces. It is regarded as a sign that the influence of the Powers has been successful and that the war is now improbable. The Bulgarian Minister here expressed the opinion to-day that war should be averted, but added the Balkan States must be given a guarantee by the Powers that the proposed reforms will be carried out.

Special Evening Telegram.
MONTREAL, Oct. 7. Hon. Walter Long addressed the Canadian Club this afternoon on the Home Rule from an Imperial viewpoint. He said the provincial legislatures of Canada did not offer a suitable prototype for legislative division of the United Kingdom. He thought the Home Rule Bill would prove a disillusion to the Irish people, and that the progress made during the past twenty years was an argument against it. On the question of the navy, the contribution of Canada Long said it was not so much a question of how much was given; it was the intention to assist in the defence of the Empire that counted.

Special to Evening Telegram.
BERLIN, Oct. 7. Germany to-day accepted the amendment to the draft declaration of the Powers, dealing with Turkey and the Balkan States, which now embodies the Austrian proposal for a clearer definition of the intervention of the Powers, which asks for a larger increase of Home Rule for the European provinces of Turkey. The action of the Powers depends on the attitude of Britain which is not expected to be made known here before Wednesday. The German Foreign office expressed agreement to the Russian Foreign Minister as to the inacceptability of the Bulgarian demands for foreign governments for Macedonia under control of the Balkan States.

NEW YORK, Oct. 7. At the hotels here are gathered hundreds of men, notable in current baseball history, for the championship games. All are confident that the coming series will eclipse all past series for the World's championship. This morning found more than 500 men and boys at the Polo grounds sitting around bonfires. They have waited all night for the first chance of the four thousand upper grand stand seats, to be held on sale at \$1 a stand. Each person will be allowed to buy two tickets. At to-morrow's sale of seats only one ticket will be sold to each person.

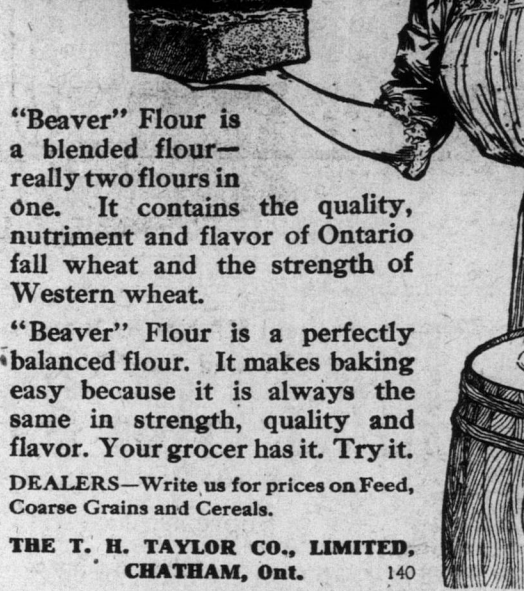

The tension of the Balkan situation is thought at the Foreign Office among diplomats, shows slight slackening. It is a hard fact however that the danger from martial enthusiasm remains. There appears to be some ground for the belief that the Governments of both Turkey and the Balkan coalition might not necessarily their peoples, are still amenable to pressure from European powers. The combined ultimatum demanding big reforms, which the Balkan States were to have dispatched to Turkey has now, under the guidance of diplomacy, taken the form of a note, which will be sent simultaneously to all the Great Powers and Turkey. The Ottoman Government which protested that it would not listen to proposals touching its internal affairs from any source, has attacked the door to receive the demands of the Powers and intended to make by a voluntary grant of Christian Vilayets, a wholesale measure of reforms. Official France has noted the signs of concession as hopeful. The Government thinks, with some extension and an adequate guarantee that the Powers themselves will take a hand in their accomplishment, these reforms ought even to satisfy Bulgaria. It is believed Serbia, Greece and Montenegro will easily be induced to accept, but there is not the same confidence that the Bulgarian Government will be able to control the war fever which has clutched the people of that country. Threats are already heard that King Ferdinand will risk his crown if the shows signs of weakening. He remarked on an occasion of a previous upheaval "I shall maintain peace as long as I can without exposing my self to the stab of a knife." Recognition of the fact that danger threatens the King of Bulgaria is now providing a check to the optimism which diplomats would otherwise be inclined to give the rein.

Dynamite Plot Evidence is Outlined.

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 4.—Not only evidence of the alleged illegal interstate shipment of dynamite and nitro glycerine, but also evidence as to what were done with the explosives will be admitted at the trial of the 46 men accused of complicity in the "dynamite plots." Federal Judge Albert B. Anderson so ruled yesterday, his decision thus opening to the prosecution the right to show a motive by going into the details of many explosions, including that which wrecked the Los Angeles Times building, Oct. 1, 1910, followed the commencing of a jury and a severe arraignment of the defendants in the opening statement by District Attorney Chas. W. Miller.

Mr. Miller in opening, said the Government would prove that the defendants, all of whom are former or present officials of labor unions, entered into a conspiracy to blow up the "jobs" of employers of non-union labor. "We will show that dynamite and nitro glycerine were carried from a place in one state to a place in another state on passenger trains on which thousands of men, women and children were travelling," said Mr. Miller. "Evidence is shown that an infernal machine was devised whereby a charge of explosive with a long fuse attached was set off by an alarm clock so the dynamiters could be hundreds of miles away when their destructive work was accomplished. We will show that James B. McNamara, and John McNamara, who are now in prison in California, one of them for murder, and Orrie E. McManigal, who has pleaded guilty, were active in this dynamiting business and that all the present defendants are guilty with them."

The Government's statement contained a full history of the cases and named Boston, New York, Jersey City, Hoboken, Albany, N. Y., Buffalo, Cincinnati, Cleveland, Chicago, Milwaukee, Omaha, Kansas City, Salt Lake City, Los Angeles and San Francisco as among the cities where the defendants met to carry on a conspiracy. Mr. Miller said, would be produced to show that Edward Clark visited a place at Cincinnati where an explosion was to take place and that Clark forgot his umbrella, leaving it as a "token" of his visit to be found in the wreckage. AND RE-FLOATED. Mr. H. W. LeMessurier, Assistant Collector of Customs, received the subjoined message last evening from West St. Modeste:—"S. S. Bengore Head, outward bound from Montreal, with general cargo, struck Flower's ledge, on Saturday; she was got off with-out much damage and is now lying at Forteau awaiting orders."

It may be remembered that the steamer, which was 23 days out from Maryport, Cumberland, bound to Sydney with a load of manganese iron, was drifting helplessly towards the Virginian waves, and was luckily picked up by the Allan Line steamer Pomeranian which was on her way to St. John's. The Allan Line took her in tow and three hours were broken, the last on parting when the steamers were about ten miles from this port. The Bengore Head then became a floating derelict and was left to the mercy of the waves; coal had run short and all the wood work of the ship had been consumed as well. The Bonaventure and Wasie went after the prize and the former was able to get her to port on the evening of January 22nd, 1910. Eighty thousand dollars (\$80,000) salvage was claimed and one-third of that amount was granted by the Admiralty Court.

Oven this mixture pour gradually two cups of boiling water, and stir with the back of a spoon until it is a smooth paste. Then boil 5 minutes. (The boiling is another step in bringing out the perfect flavor of Lowney's. It should be continued the full 5 minutes.)

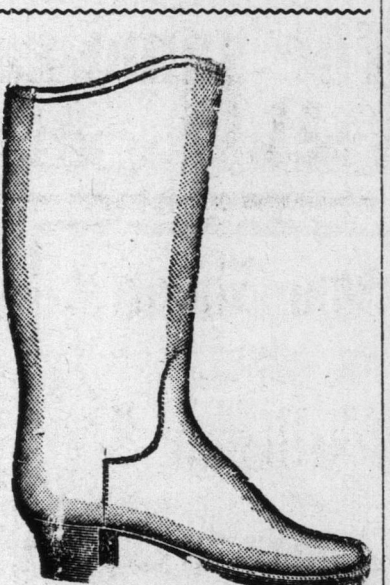

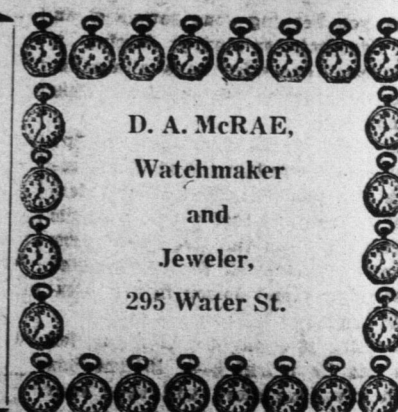
