





Outlook for the Session.

If we look to the Governor's Speech for guidance as to the business of the cate concerning the present standing Session we find no indication but that the Session will be barren of results, so far as important legislation is concerned. The Speech is of course the statement of the Government which, while looking behind as to the year past, is meant to foreshadow the legislative proposals they intend to bring forward. The only indication of legislation of importance is contained in the following statements on the current finances of the Colony:

"As the expected increase in duties paid on additional imports of other articles has not been realized, pro-posals will be sumbitted to you at an early date to adjust the equilibrium between revenue and expenditure, without, however, departing from the principle embodied in last session's enactment, namely, that the producing classes should have, so far as pos-

sible, the necessaries of life untaxed." This foreshadows the imposition of new taxes in some shape or other, which in the expectation of the Government will bring about the equilibrium between revenue and expenditure they must seek.

In neither the Governor's Speech nor in that of the Prime Minister's in reply to Mr. Kent is to be found a statement as to the extent of the shortage during the first six months. The following special jury were of the fiscal year, nor of the estimated shortage for the whole year ending June 30th next. There is nothing of a definite nature in this respect set Bowden, Thos. But the shortage is of sufficient gravity to constrain the Government to acknowledge it, and to inform the House of Assembly that financial measures must be passed to cope with it. MIYAZAKI, Jan. 16. The situation here is improved. There are still frequent earthquakes and terrifying thunderstorms throughout Kiuslfu. Rain, however, has purified the atmosphere. The river has turned yellow and caused the

NIKKO ISLAND, Hondo, Jan. 10

All the mountains are coated with ashes from the volcano Assuma Yama, which is now active. Frequent earthquake rumblings are heard and a column of smoke is rising, but no great damage is done.

TOKIO, Jan. 16. The suicide to-day by Sari Kari, chief of the Meterological Observatory at Kagoshima, is reported in unconfirmed despatches to newspapers here. The correspondents declare he committed suicide owing to the severe criticism of his actions in informing the citizens of Kagoshima they were in no danger from the ruption of the volcano, Sakura Jima, as the centre of the subterranean disturbance was elsewhere.

Seamen Jumps Overboard.

At three o'clock yesterday just as the big steamer Manchester Commerce was about to leave port one of her seamen, who was supposed to be in an advanced state of intoxication jumped from the stern part of the ship into the harbour. Immediately a fellow shipmate, who was a good swimmer, plunged overboard and succeeded in holding up the former until a boat was lowered from the ship and both men were taken into it. But for the timely rescue a drowning accident would, no doubt, have occurred.

Smallpox Being Stamped Out.

The smallpox outbreak in which patients were down with the disease at Belleoram is being stamped out. Dr. Fitzgerald, of St. Jacques, who was attending to the sufferers, carried out the quarantine laws strictly and prevented infection. 


