Parcels for Nfld. Forces Overseas.

(1) Parcels must not exceed 11 lbs.

in weight. (2) Parcels addressed to members of the Newfoundland Forces Over-seas should bear the name and address of a second addressee to whom the parcels may be delivered or forwarded if it should prove impossible to deliver the first. The original address should be written on the FRONT of the par cel where the postage stamps and Customs declaration are affixed, and the second or alternative ad dress should be written on the BACK of the parcel.

(3) If a second address is not fur delivery cannot be effected, the contents of the parcel, unless of exceptional value or of a personal nature, will be turned over to the Military Authorities for distribu-

(4) Parcels containing articles of a personal nature or of special value will be returned, if a request for their return in case of non-delivery is made by the sendthe cover of the parcel at the time

(5) This plan is being adopted at the suggestion of the British Post Office, which states that the present procedure of holding undeliv erable parcels at the Dead Letter Office until instructions are received as to their disposal is re-sulting in the waste of a large quantity of perishable foodstuffs, which form the contents of 90 per cent. of parcels addressed to sol
