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



LEAGUE PRESENT DIFFICULTIES.

LONDON, March 12. In opening the Conference of the League of Nations Union which began at Westminsteer to-day with British, French, American, Norwegian, Greek and other delegates in attendance, Lord Shaw, who was elected President, said that the covenant of the League of Nations as formed in Paris, unquestionably presented serious difficulties of substance, and in one or two cases of fundamental principle, Lord Shaw said he was a great deal concerned as to the position and powers of the general body of delegates under the covenant. No one would dream of suggesting, he proceeded, that the Great Powers and the small Powers should stand and the small Powers should stand borns in the greatest measure the borrors and burdens of the war, should not have practical deference paid to their position. But, he added, all those things would be adjusted. Premier Venizelos, of Greece, who is one of the delegates, said that in working for the League of Nations those who did so were also working for internal peace, as international and national peace depended upon one another. Unless national desires could be satisfied, international difficulties never would be solved. He deprecated any effort to make the work of the organizers of the League of Nations so complete at the outset as to run the risk of having no League at all. If they could not make it as complete as they would wish, they would do better, he contended, to accept what they could get and wait until later to get more. Leon Bourgeoise, President of the French Society for a League of Nations, said that the requirements for unanimity of decision on the part of the memers of the League might endanger whole structure. ### Social Service Council.

Important Problems Discussed. The Social Service Council of Newfoundland met in the Presbyterian Hall last night, Vice-Pres. Rev. D. B. Hemmeon, in the chair. The Secretary, Rev. Gordon Dickie, M.A., read several communications from the Social Council of Canada regarding the holding of a number of conferences in Canada and Newfoundland during the coming year, similar in character to the Congress held in this city over twelve months ago. A report on the question of an industrial home for boys was presented, recommending that the Government be requested to build and equip a state institution for the detention of boys and for their training in some useful occupation. It is thought a large and costly plant would not be necessary, but that a beginning might be made in a modest way and enlargements follow when necessary. Provision would probably be made for twenty-five boys at the outset. According to statistics furnished by the police authorities, sixtysix boys and eighteen girls were ar rested and convicted during the last two years for larceny, street-walking, disorderly conduct, etc. The majority of these offenders were under sixteen years of age. The Social Council also recommended a committee to enquire into the question of girl delinquents. and suggested that co-operative legislation if necessary might be secured with Canada to permit the sending of such girls to suitable institutions in the Maritime provinces. The number of such girls is not large enough to warrant the establishment here of a special home for them. The Council also instructed a committee to draft a Child's Protective Act suitable to the conditions of the Dominion, to be presented to the Government for approval at the coming session. The meeting then adjourned to meet in four weeks' time or previously at the call of the President. The desire was expressed during the evening that the various bodies, such as unions, etc., co-operate with the Council in for-
