





Death of Inventor of Famous Gun.

norning of Friday, November 24, 1915, gun which bears his name. Born in the United States in 1840 he came of old Puritan stock, of which he was not a little proud. From an apprentice n a wheelwright's shop he became one of the world's Gun Company, the Maxim Nordenfeldt Gun and Ammunition Company, and Vickers, Son & Maxim, Ltd., retiring from the lastnamed directorship on his 71st birthday, in 1911. He then said he would devote himself to flying machine work. He once admitted that he had "done a lot in the way of inventing," and the late Lord Salisbury introduced him to King Edward as "the man who had prevented more men from dying of old age than any other man who ever lived." His best-known invention was the Maxim gun, once described by Sir Ian Hamilton as "that invention of the devil." Sir Hiram himself declared it to be beneficent as it shortened wars. The idea for the gun came to him when he received a powerful "kick" from an United States military rifle as a boy, and the plan which he automatically. When his gun had been perfected he was asked to fire before the British officials at Enfield. They asked for a gun that did not weigh over 100 lbs. that would fire 400 rounds a minute, and 600 rounds in two minutes. He made a gun that weighed 50 lbs. and fired 2,000 rounds in three minutes with one pull of the trigger. The automatic system had ome to stay. 

The Hero of Lucknow.

Sir Henry Havelock, who led the first relief of the beleaguered Lucknow Residency in the Indian Mutiny, was a Christian soldier of the best type. Born in 1795 at Bishop Wearmouth, Durham, he went early to India, where he did good service in the Afghanistan and the Sikh wars, and the Persian expedition. But promotion came slow. At the age of 62, he was only Brigadier-General, when his first great chance came with his appointment to command the force hurriedly raked together for an attempt to reach Lucknow. Even then he seemed destined still to disappointment, for his small army, after gaining repeated successes, was so weakened that perforce, he fell back to Cawnpore, when he learned that he had been superseded by Sir James Outram. But Outram, well-named the Bayard of India decided to leave the honour of relieving Lucknow to the veteran who

Ben Jonson said he could repeat all that he had ever written, and whole books that he had read. Sasaubon wrote of Scaliger, the celebrated French cholar, that he never read anything hat he did not remember. In three months he committed to memory all the Greek poets.

Other memory feats of a more mechanical kind are recorded. Hippias, a Greek rhetorician, was able to repeat, in order, a series of 500 words after once hearing them. He was beaten by Seneca, who could retain 2,000 names in order, and repeat the list backward at will. Themistocles, the Greek General, was able to call by their names the 20,000 citizens of thens; Cyrus, the Persian Emperor, took pains to learn the name of every soldier in his army. 


