ses; now a disallowance of the Oaths Act; now the offer of a Commission which he knew would not be and ought not to be accepted; now the threatened prorogation of Parliament immediately after its re-assembling; and now the appointment of a Commission composed of Judges nominated by himself. Anything for a chance of something turning up, anything for opportunity to turn over another leaf in the chapter of accidents. But at every double he hears the loud cry of a whole people for justice, and his guilty conscience will not allow him to make a stand. The end must come, however, and it cannot now be far off. Despite his crafty attempts to get away from im. not now be lar off. Despite his crarty attempts to get away from impending punishments, he must meet that High Court of Parliament before which the charges against him were made, and before which alone ought those charges to be investigated. His latest announced determination to select his own judges is a direct in latest announced determination to select his own judges is a direct in sult to the whole nation. They may be immaculate, above suspicion, impartial, anxuous to do justice, eminent as jurists, pre-emment as men. But, after all, they are men, the nominees of the accused, and imbued with the same feelings, predilections and prejudices as those by whom they are surrounded. It has been our proud boast for years that our judiciary is above reproach, and that, as compared with the elected Judges of the United States, it is as gold by the side of brass. It has been equally our boast that our Legislature is as superior to 141 acres, Lot 29, 1st con. Eramosa that our Legislature is as superior to similar bodies in the Republic as our similar bodies in the Republic as our Bench is to that of our relighbors. And yet we have overwhelming evidence that our Dominion Parliament is rotten at the core, and that it is, to a large extent, the creation of railway speculators, and the slave of wealthy men who have bought up whole constituencies. Are we prepared to speculators, and the slave of wealthy men who have bought up whole constituencies. Are we prepared to cast a similar cloud of suspicion over those who have hitherto been regarded as spotless? Is the ermine of our Judges to run the risk of being smirched and smidged as are the robes of our law-givers? Putting saide any consideration of the right of Parliament to adjudicate upon the charges, is it wise to place the brightest ornaments of our Bench in a position where they will inevitably be Fegarded as political catspaws whereby Sir John and his colleagues are to be relieved from difficulty? If the House of Commons decides that a Commission is preferable to a Parliamentary Committee we are willing to accept its verdict, even if doubting the propriety of such a course; but until it does so resolve torid itself of its functions, we must protest against such use of our Judges as has been resolved upon by the Administration. To Parliament belongs the right of determining how the charges made before it as the highest court in the Dominion shall be heard; and to seek to wrest that power from its hands by immediate prorogation and the appointment of a Commission named by the accused is a stretch and abuse of authority to which we cannot believe the Premier to be equal or the Governor-General likely to be a party. Let the result be what it may, Parliament must determine the course to be pursued in the further investigation of this foul blot upon our national good name. No other mode of procedure will satisfy the people. No action of the Ministry, unauthorized by Parliament, will be regarded as free from suspicion. And if the Governor-General—carried away by misplaced generous impulses, or overborne by the pertinacious demands of those who have forfeited their claims to be regarded, in this matter at least, as constitutional advisers until the synthesis of the seed of the people, he will have so far undermined his influence for good that he will thenceforth be regarded as a partisan, and looked upon as an ampeliable custodian of the interests which it is his special province to conserve. All this had taken place within five misutes after the inburst of the Cherokees by whom the character of the cherokees had been entirely changed. Fighting now with renewed courage, the settlers charged the Chicksasws, who surrounded them, and their new allies assailing them from the other side, they were at once panic-stricken and driven to the opposite courser of the enclosure. Here, hemmed in on every side, they would have been exterminated had not those nearest the palisade made a breach in it with their temahawas, through which numbers made their their escape, and plunged into the forest at the mearest point, leaving their dead and wounded and several prisoners in the hands of the Cherokees.

Among the latter was Sam Lorton who had made desperate efforts to escape, but had been prevented by Jim Potts, who flung bis arms round him, wrenched his weapon from his grasp, and held him till sletve, Philip and several of the settlers surrounded him, bore him to the ground, and bound him firmly with cords. Then he was thrown like a log down by the side of the palisade, where he would he out of the way, and the victors set about seeking for his companion, Gomez the half-breed.


