The latter nine played an excellent game last season, and we hope to see them do equally as well this year.

THE THIRTIETH WELLINGTON RIFLES GALOP - Mr. John Anderson has received the second edition of this first of Mr. Vale's published compositions, and has sent us a copy. It is a pretty little piece written in the natural key, and is quite easy of execution. The bugle call of the regiment is heard at the opening and the close. It would make a good march, and we have heard it played on the band with fine effect. The issue of a second edition indicates the interest with which Mr. Vale's productions are regarded.

MONTHLY FAIR - The Fair this morning was very dull as is usually the case in August. There were but few cattle on hand, and these not generally of good quality, owing chiefly to the deficient pasturage lately. Business was slack, and we heard of but few sales. Beef cattle ruled from \$2.25 to \$4.00 live weight. We noticed a fine pair of working oxen on the ground, six years old belonging to Mr. Andrew Wilson, of Guelph Township, for which he was asking \$140.

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THIS MORNING'S DESPATCHES

A Chinese Duel. Cholera. The Cuban Struggle. Spain.

Paris, August 5. - A despatch from Vienna says the Comte de Chambord received the Count of Paris to-day. Ex-President Thiers assures his Republican friends that they need have no fear that a fusion of Bourbons and Orleansists will be effected.

New York, Aug. 5. - Advice from Cuba state that a very severe engagement had taken place at Barranaco, nine leagues from Manzanillo. The Spanish loss was severe; 37 wounded were taken to Manzanillo, and 30 more severely wounded were left at Vequie. The Spaniards are very reticent.

Madrid, August 4. - There was a large popular demonstration in Seville yesterday in favour of the Government. Members of the revolutionary Junta at Cadix are under arrest. Grenada has surrendered to the Government troops. The Province of Analuisa is completely pacified. The debate in the Cortes on the new constitution will open on Wednesday.

Berlin, August 5. - Captain Werner, who recently seized the Spanish insurgent gunboat Vigilante, will be removed from the command of the Germansquadron in the Mediterranean.

Berlin, Aug. 5. - The German Government has instructed its representatives in Spain to co-operate with the English and French representatives for the protection of foreigners and their property, even if force has to be employed.

Washington, Aug. 5, 1 a.m. - Probabilities for the middle Atlantic States, north-east and south-east winds, rising temperature, clear and partly cloudy weather. For the lower lakes and Michigan, and thence to Kentucky, south-easterly to south-westerly winds, falling barometer, warmer and increasingly cloudy weather.

New York, Aug. 5. - The Brooklyn Trust Company stock holders have resolved to pay fifty per cent. when called upon by the Directors, and will open the bank for business on Saturday morning.

Two Chinamen fought a duel in Lincoln County, Arkansas, last Thursday, in which one was killed. The survivor was jailed at Pine Bluff.

Two cholera deaths at Carmi, Ill., yesterday, and six new cases of cholera are also reported at Aurora, Ind.

New York, Aug. 6. - City of Mexico despatches say the great Tepic Chief, Lozoya, has been captured and shot by the Government forces.

Cholera is raging in the State of Chiapas.

In the case of Ann Priest, whom the Government proposed to expel as a pernicious foreigner without legal process, a stay of proceedings has been granted with all the advantage of the law. This result has been attained by a conference of friendly foreigners.

A letter from the Government of the Argentine Republic to that of the United States of Columbia on the subject of interposition in behalf of struggling Cuba has been received. Nearly all the South American Republics have offered their friendly services in like manner.

The enthusiasm in Peru over the Cuban question is intense, and it is reported that a loan of twenty millions is to be issued in that country on behalf of Cuba's liberty.

Buffalo, N. Y., Aug. 5. - The meeting of the Buffalo Park Association opened this morning. The 2:34 race was won by Membrino Gift; best time 2:26. The 2:27 race was a beautiful race, but was won easily by Nellie, who was the favourite by all odds in the pools, in three straight heats, without any apparent effort.

Public Meeting in Montreal. MONTREAL, Aug. 5. A mass meeting was held at Montreal on Tuesday. There were over 5,000 people present. The action of the Government in relation to the Pacific Scandal was unanimously denounced. The Mayor of Montreal presided.

The Editor of The Gazette insisted on an investigation. The first resolution was moved by Hon Mr. Holton, and seconded by Hon Mr. Huntington, who made a long and able speech.

Colonel Smith moved the second resolution. Mr. T. White, jr., Hon. Mr. Dorion, and other speakers followed, condemning the Government. The resolutions passed called for an immediate investigation, deprecated any intervention of the Executive in the conducting of the inquiry, and recommended the widest place possible to the petitioners. The meeting was unanimous in feeling, and no disturbance occurred.

The Norfolk Railway By-Law. The vote to give \$70,000 to the Norfolk Railway Company had very little opposition in the town of Brantford on Monday, the figures being 204 for and 56 against. No effort was made to bring out the whole vote of the town on either side. The Reporter states that the scheme to build a railway to Port Huron will now be carried out, in the event of the other municipalities along that route granting their bonuses. Should those bonuses be refused, the By-Law admits the application of the money, without a re-vote, to the Port Dover route, if the friends of the latter scheme can get aid from the townships interested. Should neither road be finally built, the money reverts to the town at the expiration of the charter, and in the meantime it can be used for no other purpose.

The Situation.

As the hunted fox, with his pursuers in full cry, doubles and twists and resorts to every scheme his cunning can devise to throw them off his track, so the wily Premier makes effort after effort to baffle those who carry on so determinedly the exposure of his corrupt practices. Every week brings forth a fresh plan for procrastination and for a lengthening of the delay in which alone he sees hope of escape. Now it is a postponement of the work of the Committee for the ostensible purpose of permitting the return to this country of certain necessary witnesses; now a disallowance of the Oaths Act; now the offer of a Commission which he knew would not be and ought not to be accepted; now the threatened prorogation of Parliament immediately after its re-assembling; and now the appointment of a Commission composed of Judges nominated by himself. Anything for a chance of something turning up, anything for opportunity to turn over another leaf in the chapter of accidents. But at every double he hears the loud cry of a whole people for justice, and his guilty conscience will not allow him to make a stand. The end must come, however, and it cannot now be far off. Despite his crafty attempts to get away from impending punishments, he must meet that High Court of Parliament before which the charges against him were made, and before which alone ought those charges to be investigated. His latest announced determination to select his own judges is a direct insult to the whole nation. They may be immaculate, above suspicion, impartial, anxious to do justice, eminent as jurists, pre-eminent as men. But, after all, they are men, the nominees of the accused, and imbued with the same feelings, predilections and prejudices as those by whom they are surrounded. It has been our proud boast for years that our judiciary is above reproach, and that, as compared with the elected Judges of the United States, it is as gold by the side of brass. It has been equally our boast that our Legislature is as superior to similar bodies in the Republic as our Bench is to that of our neighbors. And yet we have overwhelming evidence that our Dominion Parliament is rotten at the core, and that it is, to a large extent, the creation of railway speculators, and the slave of wealthy men who have bought up whole constituencies. Are we prepared to cast a similar cloud of suspicion over those who have hitherto been regarded as spotless? Is the ermine of our Judges to run the risk of being smirched and smudged as are the robes of our law-givers? Putting aside any consideration of the right of Parliament to adjudicate upon the charges, is it wise to place the brightest ornaments of our Bench in a position where they will inevitably be regarded as political catspaws whereby Sir John and his colleagues are to be relieved of difficulty? If the House of Commons decides that a Commission is preferable to a Parliamentary Committee we are willing to accept its verdict, even if doubting the propriety of such a course; but until it does so resolve to rid itself of its functions, we must protest against such use of our Judges as has been resolved upon by the Administration. To Parliament belongs the right of determining how the charges made before it as the highest court in the Dominion shall be heard; and to seek to wrest that power from its hands by immediate prorogation and the appointment of a Commission named by the accused is a stretch and abuse of authority to which we cannot believe the Premier to be equal or the Governor-General likely to be a party. As well might every horse-stealer or burglar in the land claim the right to select his judge and pick his jury. A reasonable would it be for a party to a civil suit to claim that his well-fed counsel should step into the judgment seat and decide his case. As fairly might a member of the House against whose return a petition had been presented, ask to nominate the Committee to try it. Let the result be what it may, Parliament must determine the course to be pursued in the further investigation of this foul blot upon our national good name. No other mode of procedure will satisfy at least, as constitutional advisers until it is cleared their skirts—should weakly yield, and ignore the representatives of the people, he will have so far undermined his influence for good that he will thenceforth be regarded as a partisan, and looked upon as an unreliable custodian of the interests which it is his special province to conserve. We cannot

bring ourselves to think that he will make such exercise of the prerogative as to close the mouths specially elected to give expression to the national will. The path before him may seem beset with difficulties, but it is plain and well marked if he does not close his eyes to it. Let him give opportunity to Parliament to declare the line of action which it approves, and his part will have been well and properly acted. Men of all parties will approve his manly stand, and from one end of the Dominion to the other, the opinion will prevail that he truly and firmly represents the impartial attitude which the Crown should assume at such a crisis. That he may feel how heartily the people are with him at such a crisis, the Petitions now circulating in this County and throughout the Province should be as numerously signed as the brief period between now and the end of this week will permit. It is the duty of all claiming to be true descendants of the men who secured to us not only the right to petition, but the more important right to mole out punishment to wrong doers, to make use of the opportunity now presented for entering a solemn protest against those who have sought to debauch our constituencies, to corrupt our public men, and to usurp the functions of Parliament itself. His Excellency is surely with the people at such a time. Let them strengthen his hands by pouring in their petitions, asking a fair hearing of their cause, between this and Saturday next.

The Imperial Parliament was prorogued on Tuesday. Her Majesty's speech was read by commission. It returns thanks "for the loyal promptitude with which you have made further provision for my son, the Duke of Edinburgh, on the occasion of his approaching marriage," and adds "This marriage will, I trust, form a new tie of amity between two Empires." A brief review of the principal work of the session concludes the speech.
