The morning after the Times came out Mr. Parnell pointed out that, although at first sight some of the letters composing the signature to the fac-simile letter published in the Times this morning appeared to resemble those which he habitually formed in writing his autograph, a close inspection and comparison of the forgery with his genuine signature showed a decided and striking difference in many important points.

which his genuine signature in many important points. "In the first place," said Mr. Parnell, "the writing of the forgery slopes upward, while the genuine signature slopes downward. Then there are other points of difference which are to be readily perceived. For instance, I invar-iably place a full stop after the initial letter 'S.' which you will observe is omitted from the forgery, and the 'm 'Parnell' and the 'C' be-ginning the abbreviation 'Chas,' are totally dif-ferent from anything that I ever wrote in pen-ning my name to anything. Moreover, the 'Ch' in 'Chas,' is abnormally long and the forma-tion quite different from my own style of form-ing the character. The initial letters 'S.' and 'P.' are the only ones at all resembling the gen-une.

STRIKES IN MERRY MAY.

A GENERAL SHAKING UP BETWEEN

Toronto Stonemasons Out—The Bossas Will Not Yield—Tronble at Mamilton, Mer-ritton, London and Chicago—The Local Upholsterers to Have a Conference.

The stonemasons to the number of about 100 went out on strike yesterday, in accordance with the action taken at their meeting on Saturday night. During the afternoon the union held a lengthy meeting, when the situa-tion was discussed. It was said that some thirty means were recovering the saile demand.

tion was discussed. It was said that some thirty masons were receiving the scale demand-ed by the men from non-union bosses. The men declare they will adhere to the demands made, and are confident the bosses will eventually meet their wishes. One mason said he intended leaving the city, as work was plentiful in other sections of the country. The new Parliament Buildings, Court House and other proposed large buildings have at-tracted to the city, so it is averred, a number of masons who, however, were not aware that their construction will only be proceeded with this season on a small scale. Ninety-nine ma-sons answered the roll call at the Union meet-ing yesterday, and committees were appointed to take charge of the various sections of the city.




