

Braid and gold ornaments are in active demand, and dealers report they have difficulty in supplying all requirements. Cheviot ulstering and mantle cloths are in more than ordinary demand. Hoslesy, underwear, gloves and goods of this description are selling well, and it only requires a touch of cooler weather to increase the activity. Staples have not been so active of late, attention chiefly being devoted to fancy goods. The mills are reported to be fairly well engaged. Payments are moderately good and quite equal to those at same time last the volume of business that has been done so far this month. It is not due to the amenut of orders that have been received by buyers during the exhibition, orders during that period being, as usual, small and of a sorting up character. Prices are fairly steady. This applies more particularly to heavy goods. A good deal better feeling prevals in the tone of the metal markets, both in New York and in London. Canadian and American manufacturers appear to be fairly well employed, and it is impossible to get prompt delivery.
