HIGH DEATH RATE IN JULY.

LARGE INCREASE OF MORTALITY AMONG CHILDREN. Above Three Hundred Interments in One Month - Sixteen Deaths Were From Diphtheria and Three From Typhoid Fever - Consumption Claimed Fourteen Victims - Detailed Analysis of the Returns.

The mortality returns for July show an unusually high death-rate of children. There were 302 interments in the city cemeteries, which is considerably above the summer average.

Of the 302 deaths during the month medical certificates showed 52 died from cholera infantum, 16 from diphtheria, 14 from consumption, 13 from diarrhoea, 8 from heart disease, 7 from typhoid fever, 6 from pneumonia and cancer. Other causes of death were phthisis 10, typhoid fever 3, shock 3, bronchitis 3, murder 2, measles 2, Bright's disease 2 and 1 each alcoholism, burning, suicide, blood-poisoning, paralysis, apoplexy, fracture of skull, dysentery, railway accident, erysipelas, hemorrhage.

At Mount Pleasant there was an increase of 13 interments compared with July last year, and a still greater increase of 25 in the figures for June last. Of the 75 interred, only 4 were 70 years of age; 38, or more than one-half, were children.

At St. James' Cemetery there were 11 deaths from cholera infantum, 2 each from consumption, pneumonia, diarrhoea, 1 each from heart disease, bronchitis and diphtheria.

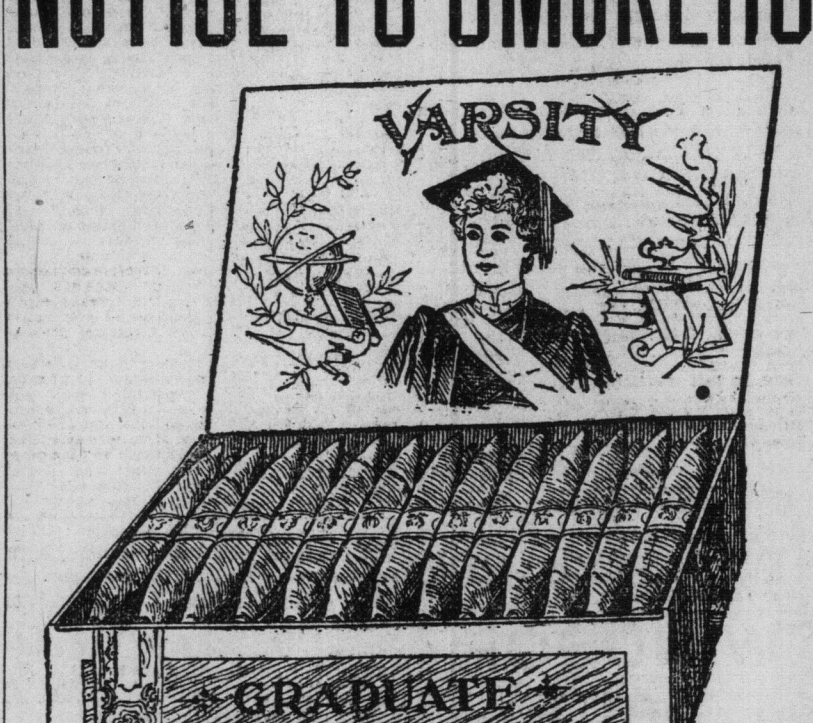
