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

NEWSPAPER ON AN OCEAN LINER.

London, Jan. 7.—The end of the present month will see a British mail steamer sailing from Liverpool equipped with a complete staff and plant for the publication on board of a newspaper during the voyage to New York. The contracts have been made, and Cuthbert Hall, the Managing lirector of Marconi's English Company, yesterday told the representative of the Daily Telegraph that the arrangements had all been completed. The Marconi plant will supply the news, and the printers and the machinery necessary to produce the first ocean daily newspaper are all ready to begin work. Cuthbert Hall hesitated to mention the name of the ship aboard of which the first experiment is to be made, and only gave it in confidence, until the result of the first voyage is known.

Briefly it consists of two fixed wings extending from top row of flues to within two inches of smoke box. To the fixed wings are hinged two fan shaped deflecting plates or hoods capable of adjustment. LETTER FROM LABRADOR.

The following extract copied from an merican paper, refers to Mrs. Hugh Calder, now in Labrador, as the writer of the letter which gives an inter esting account of her voyage and life

in the northern wild: A resident of the village of Hard-wick, Mass., has a letter from a for-mer schoolmate, now the wife of a man interested financially in a lumber company controlling a large area of timber land in Labrador. The letter is particularly interesting in that it presents clearly to view some of the difficulties encountered in working so far away from "all supplies and repairs" and in a place absolutely inaccessible for almost eight months in the year. the year. The husband of the letterwriter, as superintendent for the company, took the first mill into the unbroken forest the past summer. A
sailing vessel was chartered, the sawmill with its equipment and duplicate
parts to guard against breakage, some
eight or ten horses with harness, sleds,
etc., two cows, several dogs and
abundant supplies of hay and grain
were placed on board. The party consisted of the superintendent, his wife
and two children, a boy of three and
a baby some six months old, and
eleven wood choppers, teamsters and
mill hands. Household goods and
abundant supplies of provisions had
to be included in the cargo and care
exercised that no important thing be
forgotten as there would be no opportunity to get anything once left behind. The sailing trips began early
in August and in two days less than
four weeks the harbor selected as a
location of the camp was reached in
safety. Tents were used for camping
until the mil! could be landed and
set up, timber cut and sawed into
