**GEORGE KIRKPATRICK DROWNED.**  
(Hants Journal.)  
A dispatch from Margareville, N. S., states that a sad drowning accident occurred about two miles off Morden on Saturday last. George Kirkpatrick, an aged and respected resident of the place, accompanied by his son Fred and another man, were going fishing, when a sudden gust of wind capsize the boat, and all three were precipitated into the water. They succeeded, however, in getting on the bottom of the overturned boat after some time, and before assistance could reach them the eldest of the three had to let go his hold and was drowned. The other two were rescued by a boat putting out from Morden.  
Mr. Kirkpatrick was the father of Dr. Kirkpatrick, of Halifax, and leaves a widow and another son, Fred, who was with him in the ill-fated boat.  
**HUDSON BAY RAILWAY.**  
The government has taken steps to test the feasibility of a railway from Saskatchewan to Fort Churchill on Hudson Bay. An exploration has been made of the entire route, and information secured showing that such a railway would not be a very expensive undertaking, and that a small port of the Harbor of Churchill can be kept open all the year. The government has already expressed the opinion that the long-continued condition of traffic in the Northwest, and has also favorably received the suggestions of Northwest members to assist such an undertaking.  
**THE EYES OF SCHOOL CHILDREN.**  
The idea of this paper will be merely to mention the diseases and symptoms which children manifest, so that they may not pass over the things which seem trifling, but which may eventually lead to some serious condition.  
It seems pitiable the way children's eyes are neglected, and how they are allowed to suffer and often lose useful sight for want of a little care and thought.  
Squint-How often is this unsightly deformity neglected by the parents simply because they have a dread of an operation, when very often such is quite unnecessary, as a careful fitting of glasses under a mydriatic would correct this deformity, and if not taken too late, save useful vision in the squinting eye which otherwise would become almost useless from non-use. If an operation is found to be necessary, not only the cosmetic effects, but also the vision will be found to be greatly improved in time. Besides glasses, the microscope may be utilized to strengthen the muscles of the eye.  
Hyperopia and Astigmatism, separately or in combination, are frequently found. The teacher may consider these children stupid, simply because they will not study. The reason in the vast majority of cases being that near work is rendered fatiguing and causes severe headache. These children are often peevish and irritable. A proper correction of these refractive errors under a mydriatic (it is useless otherwise) will relieve the pain and make them different children. They often suffer from blepharitis, hordeolum and blepharospasm.  
Myopia-This most serious eye disease should be carefully watched. It is due to the elongation of the globe, and may sometimes be detected by prominence of the eye. If a person complains of specks in front of the eyes, screws up the eyelids and is troubled with conjunctivitis, which resists treatment, myopia should be suspected.  
Children who suffer with this affliction should have their eyes examined and refracted at least once a year. They should be given their full glass correction where possible, and made wear their glasses continuously, so as to do away with all eye-strain. It thus help prevent the myopia increasing. They should be given front desks in school with the best light, their studying, of which myopes are usually very fond, should be restricted, and they should be made to take regular out-door exercise, the general health looked after, and all extra reading prohibited. Reading in bed is a very bad habit that some of these children have.

COMMENT ON THE WHEAT SITUATION.

(Montreal Witness.)

Whatever may be the 1907 outcome of United States and Canadian wheat production, it is now fairly well assured that prices will be well above the average of the past five years. This is all the more to be assumed when the crop and weather reports of other large wheat producers in Europe and elsewhere are taken into account. There are very few exceptions to the cry of 'late,' and therefore, more or less, unsuccessful sowing in the distant fields, and the probability is that the world's production will be much below the average. The effect of the short crops will, in a measure, be neutralized by the large supplies now on hand. Canadian farmers have a large quantity of wheat still uncut and it is only natural to suppose that they will have the advantage of the higher prices for the old crop. The enhanced values will, in many cases, fully compensate for the loss of acreage and yield. One of the most formidable arguments of the bull in wheat is that of the decrease in acreage, apart altogether from the alleged damage to the seed that was sown prior to the frosts of a few days ago. But the latest information received from the west is not altogether convincing that there will be eventually a very great decrease in acreage under seed. Figures to hand indicate nothing in the nature of a fifty per cent decrease in the total wheat production of the country. A feature of the situation which is rather unique is the almost entire absence of crop advices from the Ontario winter wheat districts. It is true that a few premature reports came through two or three weeks ago, but the fact that there has been no depressing news from that quarter during the past few days, may be accepted, let us hope, on the basis that no news is good news. There is an average yield of winter wheat at the Ontario fields of about twenty million bushels, and it will be distinctly gratifying if few or none of the fields are seriously impaired.

THAT YEAR WITHOUT A SUMMER.

A week or two ago. The Times published an article from an old number of the New Sun which stated that there was no summer in 1816. The truth of the article was questioned here by many people, but the following interesting facts can be found in Rev. Dr. Patterson's "History of the County of Pictou, N. S." published in 1877. "In the Northern States frost, ice and snow were common in June. Snow fell to the depth of ten inches in Vermont, seven in Maine and three in Central New York. On the 5th July, ice was formed of the thickness of common window glass throughout New England, New York and some parts of Pennsylvania. In August ice was formed half an inch thick. Indian corn was so frozen that the greater part was cut down for fodder. Indeed almost every green thing was destroyed. A similar state of things existed in England. During the whole season the sun's rays seemed to be destitute of heat. All nature seemed to be clad in a sable hue. The average wholesale price of flour during that year in Philadelphia was \$13 per barrel. The average price of wheat in England was 27s. per quarter.

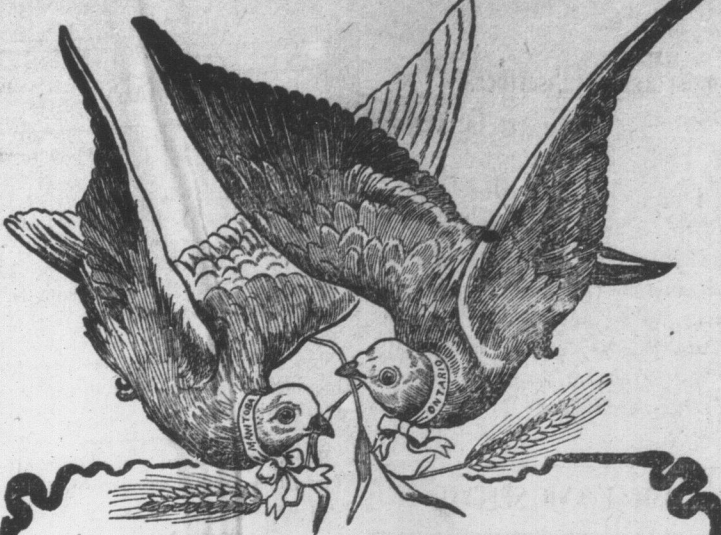

**IN A SERIOUS SCRAPE.**

Halifax, May 29.—A case that may turn out seriously for Ainsley Wentzell, an eighteen-year-old boy, of Aurdale, Lunenburg county, is now being investigated by the authorities.
