#### MINING LAWS.

#### FREE MINERS.

"Free miners" only can have right or interest in mining claims or ditches. A "free miner" must be over 16 years of age. His certificate may be for one year (\$5), or three years (\$15), and is not transferable. He may enter and mine Crown lands, or, on making compensation, lands occupied for other than mining purposes. To recover wages must have a "free miner's" certificate.

#### RECORD, ETC., OF CLAIMS.

Claims must be recorded (\$2.00), and re-recorded (\$2.50). Time allowed for record is three days after location, if within ten miles of office—one additional day for every additional ten miles, or fraction thereof. In very remote places, miners, assembled in meeting, may make valid rules temporarily. Transfers of claims or mining interests must be in writing and registered. "Free miners" may hold any number of claims by purchase, but only two by pre-emption, except in certain cases, but the rule is that every full claim or full interest must be worked either by owner or agent. A "free miner" can, by record, get a fair share of water necessary to work claim. A claim is deemed open if unworked for 72 hours on working days, unless for sickness or other reasonable cause.

#### NATURE AND SIZE OF ORDINARY MINING CLAIMS.

Claims, as far as possible, are rectangular and must be staked by post or tree. Sizes are, "bar diggings," 100 feet wide at high-water mark, and thence extend into the river at its lowest water level. "Dry diggings" 100 feet square. "Creek claims" 100 feet long measured in the direction of the general course of the stream, and shall extend in width from base to base of the hill or bench on each side, but when the hills or benches are less than 100 feet apart the claim shall be 100 feet square. "Bench claims" 100 feet square. "Hill claims" base line fronting a stream 100 feet—parallel side lines at right angles thereto at summit of hill. Posts 100 feet apart. Claim not to come within 100 feet of any gulch or tributary creek. Measurements horizontal, irrespective of surface inequalities,

The above increase of size applies to dry, bar, bench, creek, or hill diggings, not to quartz claims or minerals in lodes or veins.

A new stratum of auriferous earth or gravel situated in a locality where the claims are abandoned, shall, for the above purposes be deemed a new mine, although the same locality shall have been previously worded at a different level; and dry diggings discovered in the vicinity of bar diggings shall be deemed a new mine, and visa versa. A discoverer's claim shall be reckoned as an ordinary claim.

Creek discovery claims shall extend 1,000 feet on each side of the centre of the creek, or as far as the summit.

#### LEAVE OF ABSENCE.

On discovery of new lode or vein containing minerals, six months.

On proving expenditure, in cash, labor, or machinery, of \$1,000 on each full interest (without reasonable return), one year.

Under other conditions Gold Commissioner has option.

#### MINERAL CLAIMS.

"Mineral claims,"—that is, claims containing, or supposed to contain, minerals, precious or base (other than coal), in lodes or veins, or rock in place—shall be 1,500 feet long and 600 feet wide, and, as nearly as nearly as possible, in rectangular form. Must have three posts (or tree posts) at equal distance along centre line, with a notice on each. Only one claim on the same lode or vein can be held, except by purchase. Quartz claims are deemed to be mineral claims.

In order to get a Crown grant for a mineral claim lawfully held, it must be surveyed by a surveyor approved by the Land Office; notice af application for the grant must be posted conspicuously on the land on the Government office of the district, also inserted for sixty days in the Government Gazette and a newspaper, if any, circulating in the district, and proof must be given to the satisfaction of the Government

officers that \$1,000 have been bona fide expended in money or labor upon the claim. Or a Crown grant may be got by paying \$15 per acre to the Government, in lieu of representation and expenditure on the claim.

General provisions for ordinary mining claims apply to mineral claims as far as may be.

The proper representation of a "mineral" claim requires that the sum of one hundred dollars, in money, labor, or improvements, shall be expended in a first six months of every year upon the claim, to the satisfaction of a Gold Commissioner, and that the owner shall have obtained a certificate from the Gold Commissioner to that effect, within six months from the location of the claim, and hereafter within the first six months in every year, and shall have recorded the certificate immediately after its issue.

An annual tax of \$1 per acre, or fractional part of an acre, of every mineral claim is payable on the 31st December.

Leases of mining ground, ditch privileges, &c., may be issued, but will not in general be granted for a longer term than ten years, or for a quantity of ground-greater than:

In dry diggings, ten acres.

In bar diggings, unworked, half a mile in length along the high-water mark.

In bar diggings worked and abandoned, one mile and a half in length along the high-water mark.

In creek claims, on abandoned creeks, one mile and a half in length.

The regulations as to flumes ditches, and drainage need not be detailed, but it may be stated that the water taken into a ditch or sluice, has to be measured at the ditch or sluice head. No water should be taken into a ditch or sluice except in a trough placed horizontally at the place at which the water enters it. One inch of water means half the quantity that will pass through a orifice two inches high by one inch wide, with a constant head of seven incher above the upper side of the orifice.

#### PARCELS.

Parcels for Canada must be prepaid 6 cents for 4 ounces, and must not exceed 5 lbs. in weight, nor 2 feet in length, by 1 foot in width or depth. They may be registered for a fee of 5 cents.

Parcels for Newfoundland and the United Kingdom must be prepaid 40 cents per lb. or fraction of a lb., and must not exceed 4 lbs. in weight, nor 2 feet in length by 1 foot in width or depth. A Customs Declaration of the contents, and the value of each parcel must be filled up at the post office by the sender. These parcels are forwarded by Canadian contract steamers only.

#### MISCELLANEOUS .MATTER.

Postage rate 1 cent per ounce, or fraction of an ounce, to be prepaid by postage stamp.

Miscellaneous articles of merchandise, and generally all matter permitted to pass by mail in Canada, which is not of the nature of a letter, and not entitled to be posted at a lower rate than 5th classs, under one of the other classes, may pass as 5th class when addressed to any destination within the Dominion or United States.

Fifth class matter must be so packed or put up so as to be open to examination of contents, and must not exceed 4 lbs. in weight, nor 2 feet in length by 1 foot in width or depth.

When passing between Canada and the United States it will be subject to customs regulations if liable to duty. The registration charge on 5th class matter is 5 cents in addition to the postage.

It is desirable that the stamp should be a registration stamp.

Registration Stamps cannot be accepted in payment of postage.

#### POST BANDS AND STAMPED ENVELOPES.

One cent post bands for newspapers or books packet wrappers, and one and three cent stamped envelopes are issued by the Department, and may be had at the stamp vendors at a trifle above their face value.

#### THE CHARGE OF THE SIX HUNDRED.

## A Graphic Description of the Charge by a Survivor.

A survivoo of the celebrated vide into the jaws of death gives, in the Boston Commercial Bulletin, the following graphic picture of the charge:

- "Lord Cardigan's eye glanced over us; then spurring his horse forwaad a few paces, he said:
- "'My men, we have received orders to silence that battery."
- "'My G-d!' my brother ejaculated. Then grasping my hand, he said:
- "'Fred, my dear fellow, good bye; we don't know what may happen. God bless you; keep close to me—'

."What more he might of said was lost in Lord Cardigan's ringing shout of:

" 'Charge!'

"INTO THE JAWS OF DEATH.

"We went in at a trot; the trot changed to a canter, and the canter into a gallop. Through the lines I could see Lord Cardigan several horse-lengths ahead riding as steadily as if he was on parade. Now, to tell the plain truth, when we had ridden a short distance, say one hundred paces, I felt terribly afraid. The truth flashed upon me in a moment that we were riding into a position that would expose us to a fire on both flanks, as well as the fire from the battery in front of us, which we had been instructed to silence. I said to myself, 'This is a ride to death!' but I said it loud enough for my brother to hear, and heanswered and said:

" 'There goes the first!'

"The first was Lord Lucan's aid-de-bamp, Captain Nolan, who, after making a short detour, was crossing on our left to join us in the charge. A cannon-ball had just cut him in two as my brother spoke.

"My heart leaped into my mouth and I almost shrieked with fear, but I restrained myself, and setting my teeth hard I rode on. A moment later the rifle bullets from the sharpshooters on the hillside began to whistle about our ears. Saddles were emptied at every step. Then came the whistling shot and the shrieking shell and tore through our squadrons, mangling men and horses, plowing bloody furrows through and through our ranks. Then my fear left me. My whole soul became filled with a thirst for

revenge, and I believe the same spirit animated every man in the ranks. Their eyes flashed, and they ground their teeth and pressed closer together. The very horses caught the mad spirit, and plunged forward as if impatient to lead us to our revenge and theirs. At this time there was not much to be seen. A heavy dense smoke hung over the valley, but the flaming mouths of the guns revealed themselves to our eyes at every moment as they belched forth their murderous contents of shot and shell.

"Now a shot tore through our ranks, entting a red line from flank to flank, then a shell plowed an oblique and bloody furrow from our right front to our left rear; anon a ricocheting shot rose from our front ranks, fell into our centre, and hewed its way to the rear making terrible havoc in its passage. Oh! that was a ride. Horses ran riderless, and men bareheaded, splashed with the blood of their comrades pressed closer and closer and ground their teeth harder, and mentally swore a deadlier revenge as their numbers grew smaller.

#### "INTO THE GATES OF HELL.

"Alone and in front rode Cardigan still keeping the same distance ahead. His charger was headed for the centre of the battery. Silently we followed him. Up to this time neither my brother nor myself had received the slightest scratch, although we were now riding side by side with comrades who at the start were separated from us by several files. We reached the battery at last. Up to this time we had ridden in silence, but what a yell burst from us as we plunged in among the Russian gunners. Well would

it have been for them if they had killed us all before we reached them. They had done too little and too much. They had set us on fire with passion. Only blood could quench our thirst for revenge. We passed through the battery like a whirlwind sabring the gunners on our passage. I don't believe one of them live to tell the tale of that ride. Out of the battery and into the brigade—an army it was—of cavalry. Cur charge was resistless.

"The Russians fell before our sabres as corn falls before the reaper. They seemed to have no power of resistance. And there was no lack of material to work upon. They closed in upon us and surrounded us on every side, but we hewed our way through them as men hew through a virgin forest, and only stopped when we reached the bank of the Tehernaya River.

"Wheeling here, we proceeded to cut our way back again. On the return ride I was assailed by a gigantic Russian trooper who made a stride at me with his sabre. I partially guarded it, but not wholly, and the next moment felt a stinging pain in my neck. It passed in a moment, however, and I was about to make short work of the trooper, when I heard my brother cry:

#### HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Land may be obtained in British Columbia from either the Dominion or Provincial Governments, who have offices at New Westminster.

#### DOMINION GOVERNMENT.

Any man 18 years of age, or any head of a family can make application for 160 acres of land, and paying a fee of \$10. The applicant must be on the land within six months from the date of entry. After three years residence and payment of \$1 per acre, he is intitled to a patent, provided he is a British subject. These provisions don't apply to Mineral, Timber, Hay, or

lands which may be required for railway or general public purposes.

#### PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT.

Any man 18 years of age, any head of a family, or a widow (British subjects) may record 160 acres, the fee being \$2. The settler must enter into occupation within thirty days after recording, and must continue to occupy it. Absence for a longer period than two months consecutively is deemed cessation of occupation. Leave of absence may be granted not exceeding four months in any one year. After, providing that he has made improvements to the value of \$2.50 cents per acre, a Crown Grant is issued, costing \$5.

Settlers may employ agents. Indians or Chinese cannot be agents.
