Any loans contracted not in accordance with the conditions specified will be illegal and the Council will have no power to honor them either temporarily or otherwise, excepting. of course, the amount in anticipation of revenue, which, however, has to be repaid within the year. This clause practically prohibits the bank, from lending any money to the city except the actual amounts stated in this amendment.

The amount allowed for the purpose of meeting the existing pressing engagements or liabilities during the year 1897, and which has already been incurred over and above the limit of the borrowing power, is \$212,440. It is considered that this sum will be sufficient to meet the liabilities which will have to be paid during the year. ### THE NEW U. S. TARIFF.

One of the best-posted commercial correspondents in Washington writes to the Daily Commercial Bulletin that there is every evidence that the Republican members of the Ways and Means Committee, as well as the Republican leaders in the Senate, are already thinking about the new tariff law, and considering its details. The emphatic declaration of the President, that the existing law would afford sufficient revenue, has put an end to such hopes as were entertained that a revenue bill might become law during the present Congress. This has in a measure cleared the ground for the framing of the general bill which the incoming Administration has in contemplation. There are hints that Speaker Reed and some of the Eastern members are not so zealous for a new agitation of the tariff as they might be, but it is perfectly evident that President-elect McKinley intends to carry out the programme upon which lican nomination—the restoration of ers. of a bill will be begun by the Ways and Means Committee of the present House within a very short time. Whether hearings shall be given during the present Congress or not until the next one has not yet been decided. It is not very material, since the bill will really be given shape in private conferences between members of the Committee and representatives of leading industries rather than as the result of the formal public hearings. It is the purpose to get the bill on to the statute book at the earliest possible moment after the meeting of the next Congress in extra session. Whether this can be done before August or September is very doubtful, but the party leaders do not intend to lose any time, which they can avoid losing.

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It is proposed, in order to prevent useless debate, to leave certain schedules of the existing law untouched. Among them will be the cotton schedule and the metal schedule, If changes are required in either of these, they will be made by separate paragraphs rather than by re-enacting the entire schedule. Cotton ties will be taken from the free list and made dutiable. The silk schedule may also be allowed to stand without change. 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### TESTAMENTARY DOCUMENTS.

In an article on the making of wills, the Paper Trade Journal points out that a will cannot operate to confer rights until the death of the testator -the party making it; until which event it is, in its essence, ambulatory and revocable. Therefore the law in force at the time of death governs as to the proper execution of a will and the law of the domicile of the testator at the time of his death controls. The law of place governs the disposition of his real estate—that is, the place where the realty is situated controls. The law of the domicile determines what is personal and what is real property. Thus, in some States railroad bonds are declared by statute to be real estate, and the courts there would construe clauses relating to them according to the

The party offering a will must prove capacity of the maker, and a preponderance of evidence on the part of those contesting must be produced in order to prove a want of capacity.

Undue influence is frequently alleged against the probation of wills: but this cannot be presumed from interest and opportunity-it must be proved; and probate will not be refused on this allegation "where it appears that the testator was a fairly intelligent person, and gave instructions to his counsel intelligently, and the latter read the will over to him. explaining each clause, to which the testator made intelligent and consistent answers." "The influence which is necessary to invalidate a will must amount to over-persuasion, coercion or force, destroying the free agency or will of the testator." It is not undue influence to " coax a person to execute a will in a certain manner.

In construing a will "the main purpose is to ascertain the true intention of the testator from the language used in the instrument, and this intention should prevail above every other construction which might be placed on the language, but the intention must be consistent with the roles of law. The general intent overrides all more technical and grammatical rules of construction, and must be taken from the whole will, all the clauses taken together going to make the intention of the testator." A will should be signed at the end, and whatever may be after the signature is void. It should be acknowledged to be the last will and testament in the presence of the subscribing witnesses, not separately. but in the "presence of each other." The mumber of such witnesses is generally prescribed by law, and the will is void if there are less, and this means competent witnesses, for those who are interested either in the legades stated or in the residue of the estate are not competent.

The maritime interests of Germany appear to be confronted with a state of affairs somewhat resembling that which led to the formation of the Shipping Federation or union of shipowners in England six years ago. The history of the struggle conducted by this organization against the dictation of the labor unions is an extremely interesting one and may prove to have an important bearing on the reported attempt to order general strikes in other countries in sympathy with those of the Hamburg lightermen and dock laborers. When trades unionism began to develop itself among the sailors and firemen of English steamships the shipowners regarded it with considerable favor. It was hoped that the influence of a well-conducted union would have a salutary effect on the character of the sailors which had been considerably lowered since the introduction of steam, and still more was expected from it in raising the standard of discipline among that particularly rough class of laborers who were employed to feed steamship furnaces. But it turned out, as might perhaps have been expected, that the character of the unions was determined by the character of the men, and that the more tyrannical an I arbitrary the tactics of the union leaders the better the members were salisfied.

The unious were no sooner fairly organized than they made their customary demand for the exclusion of non-union men from employment on ships worked partly by union men. It was not enough to belong to one of the older and smaller unions that had preceded the formation of the more comprehensive body. Some of these that paid tribute to the larger union were accepted as in good standing, but the members of these who did not were, equally with non-union men. placed under the ban. A ship on which either were found was promptly descried by union sailors and firemen, signed articles to the contrary notwithstanding. The ship had to stay in port till the non-union men were discharged or became members of the national union, and the captain had stead of lowering them, and called frequently to pay the entrance feed crew after crew when anything

One of the first effects of the policy of dictation was a sensible lowering of the discipline on ship board. 

## DUPLEX SINGLE STEAM POWER PUMPS.


