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#### Apples and Citrus Fruits

Copy of Note to be addressed by the United States Secretary of State to His Majesty's Ambassador at Washington

EXCELLENCY:

During the course of the negotiation of the Trade Agreement signed day, it has been explained that the fruit growers of certain parts of the British Commonwealth, together with the United Kingdom producers, have for time past cooperated in an organization called the Empire Fruits Council which has made arrangements concerning the shipment of apples to the United Kingdom market from overseas, with the object of maintaining a stable remunerative market in the interests of all concerned and of avoiding, in so far nossible towards and of avoiding, in so far possible, temporary periods either of oversupply or of shortage.
