ALLIES DRIVE GERMAN FROM TWO TOWNS
AT ROULERS AT ARMENTIERS

AMSTERDAM, Via London, Dec. 10.—10.35 p.m.—The Allies have entered Roulers (Rousselaere) in West Flanders about 12 miles northeast of Ypres, according to the Sluis correspondent of The Handelsblad.

LONDON, Dec. 10.—10.10 p.m.—Reuter's Bologne correspondent says: the Germans on Tuesday were driven out of Armentieres by the British and hurled back beyond artillery range. Armentieres is nine miles northwest of Lille.

UPPER QUITS,
MUELLER GETS
A SUBSTITUTE
German Professors at University Help President Out of His Dilemma

ANOTHER BOARD MEETING
Dr. Benzinger is Now Only Professor Still to Be Disposed of.

At yesterday afternoon's meeting of the governors of Toronto University the tangle in which the matter of the German professors was left was partially smoothed out. Mr. Tipper, of the department of German, solved the difficulty which existed in his case by resigning. Prof. Mueller stated that he had arranged with Prof. Swedelius of McMaster University to assume his work for the university in addition to his lectures at McMaster. Prof. Mueller will pay Prof. Swedelius for this work. As to Dr. Benzinger, of the department of oriental languages, he has not yet been reached. President Falconer stated that an effort would be made to have an exchange effected with one of the American universities, but the attitude of the government toward allowing him to leave the country will have to be learned before such a move is made.

Loath to Talk.
Several of the members of the board were questioned by The World before any information about the meeting could be secured. None were willing to give details. Mr. Edmund Walker stated that "the old subject was not brought up and wasn't even mentioned at the meeting." He said that they had "just had a little fun, and that nothing besides the regular business had come up."

Arranged With McMaster.
Prof. Swedelius of McMaster University is a native of Sweden. He will not be under salary, but will make private arrangements with Prof. Mueller. With the president's sanction the two professors will exchange work until the difficulty passes over. McMaster University has consented to the arrangement.

McMaster Board Met.
At the meeting of the McMaster University board of governors last night permission was given to Prof. Swedelius to take certain classes at Toronto University, following out a private arrangement between him and Prof. Mueller of Toronto University. Chairman D. E. Thomson of the McMaster board told The World that Prof. Swedelius was the professor of French at McMaster, but that he was a competent linguist and was able to give instruction in German, Italian and Spanish as well.

German Submarines Tried To Enter Harbor of Dover Under Cover of Darkness and in Heavy Rain-storm Half a Dozen Hostile Ships Made an Attack But Were Driven Off and Some Were Sunk.

LONDON, Dec. 11, 12.35 a.m.—Half a dozen German submarines made an attempt at 6.30 o'clock Thursday morning to enter the admiralty harbor, according to a Dover despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Co., and for half an hour the batteries kept up a furious fusillade, firing at least 200 shots. It is reported that two or three of the submarines were sunk, but no confirmation of this can be obtained.

The attempt was made under cover of early morning darkness and during a heavy rain-storm. The first alarm, says the despatch, was given by the firing of a naval gun, and soon all the batteries were in action. The admiralty, to whom this despatch was submitted, said that it had not received confirmation of the reported attack.

HUGE RUSSIAN FORCES BLOCK KAISER'S ARMY
German Plan is Apparently to Outflank Russian Right Wing TO GIVE UP WARSAW?

PETROGRAD, Dec. 10, via London, 6.15 p.m.—A Russian military expert analyzes and interprets the German attempt on Warsaw as follows: "Altho the German forces are more numerous than in their former advance and they are planning attacks from several separate directions simultaneously, their task is greater than before on account of the vastness of the Russian army which is massed to meet them. "Gen. Franco of the Eighth German army corps from Osterode and Soldau is proceeding from East Prussia, thru Mlawa, Ciechanow, Roslan and Przasnysz, on the right side of the Vistula, in an attempt to push toward giving the powerful fortress of Novo Georziak a wide berth. The Germans thus hope to outflank the Russian right wing and strike Warsaw from the northeast. "Gen. Mackensen's German army from Thorn meanwhile continues an offensive on the left side of the Vistula, thru Lodz, and aims at Warsaw in an effort to outflank the Russian left, which is besieging Cracow while the other part of the Austrian army on the north, which is in contact with the extreme German right, is trying to proceed northeast with the object of taking Kielce and Racow. The movements take the form of a widespread fan with Warsaw the handle. "To Evacuate Warsaw. "Except on the north from Clechaw the movements are not new, the Austro-Germans having tried them before and failed. "According to the Russian authorities, the yielding of cities to the enemy does not constitute an important war factor, since the taking of big cities like Lodz, with the attendant destruction of life and property, tends to demoralize the army. Thus, if it is of strategic value to evacuate Warsaw, the capture of that city ought not to be considered important.

BY THE BACK DOOR.
LONDON, Dec. 10.—The Germans continue their efforts to smash the Russian armies. While a large part of the force is endeavoring to hold the Russian centre, another army is advancing from East Prussia to the east of Mlawa and is attacking the Russian right with view to cutting (Continued on Page 3, Column 2)

BOER LEADERS WHO ESCAPED PLAN INVASION
Botha Warns That Maritz and Kemp Have Received Equipment. GERMAN COLONY BASE Internal Trouble Ended, But Attack From Outside is Imminent.

LONDON, Dec. 10.—General Louis Botha, premier and commander of the defence forces of the Union of South Africa, announced that the rebellion is practically at an end. Since the capture on December 4 of 500 rebels and the surrender of 200 others, five additional rebel leaders and their commandos have unconditionally laid down their arms. Only one rebel leader is at large—Colonel Maritz.

Maritz and Kemp, who were corrupted while officers of the Union Defence Force, has succeeded in escaping to German South-West Africa, and from there, equipped with fresh arms and artillery by their German allies, will seek to invade the Union. Our next duty is to deal with this danger and to make it impossible for German Southwest Africa to again be used as a base from which to threaten the peace and liberty of the Union.

Hydro Telephone Scheme Proposed
Ontario Municipal Electric Association Held Third Annual Meeting. TO SEEK LEGISLATION Question of Publicly-Owned Telephones is Being Investigated.

Fifty representatives of the hydro municipalities all over Ontario met in the evening at the Ontario Municipal Electric Association. The delegates included the chairmen of the various hydro commissions, engineers, mayors and aldermen. Philip Bock of London was elected president of the association for the coming year, and Mayor Carter of Guelph and A. D. Bowley of Windsor elected vice-presidents. E. M. Ashworth of Toronto was elected honorary secretary of the association.

Discussed Many Topics.
The members spent the afternoon discussing the various electrical problems which had been encountered throughout Ontario during the year 1914. On motion by P. W. Ellis of Toronto the association decided to be the Hydro Commission to assist the municipalities in securing suitable legislation so that easements for wire, poles or other equipment on private property may be secured without recourse to expensive expropriation proceedings.

THE KAISER IS BETTER WITH A NORMAL PULSE
AMSTERDAM, via London, Dec. 10, 9.10 p.m.—Emperor William's health has considerably improved, according to an official announcement made in Berlin today. His majesty's catarrh is retreating and his temperature and pulse are normal.

NO DUM-DUMS FOR BRITISH ARMY'S USE
Count Von Bernstorff's Charge Refuted by United States Firm.

NEW YORK, Dec. 10.—Denial of the charge made by Count Von Bernstorff, the German ambassador, that the Union Metallic Cartridge Co. has shipped to Canada since October 5,000,000 soft-nosed, or "mushroom bullets" for use in the British army, is contained in a letter sent to Count Von Bernstorff today by S. F. Fryer, vice-president and general manager of the Remington-Union Metallic Cartridge Co.

Mr. Fryer asserts in his letter that his company has manufactured in all 117,470 of these cartridges for the big game hunting only and that they "could not be used in any of the military rifles used by any of the foreign powers."

SERENO PAYNE DIED SUDDENLY AT CAPITAL
Prominent Republican Tariff Expert Succumbs to Heart Failure.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—Representative Sereno E. Payne, of New York, died suddenly of heart failure here tonight. Mr. Payne, who was 71 years old, lived in New York and was a member of the House of Representatives since 1888 except one year, when he was in the Senate. He was chairman of the ways and means committee and Republican floor leader in 1903-10, and directed the drafting of the Payne-Aldrich Tariff Bill. In 1893 he was appointed a member of a joint high commission to negotiate a treaty with Canada.

A NEAR-ULTIMATUM IS SENT TO MEXICO
U. S. Threatens Serious Measures Unless Firing Over Border Ceases.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—The United States has served formal notice on both Provisional President Guiterrez and Gen. Carranza that unless they promptly provide their troops from firing across the American boundary, such force will be employed by the United States Government as may be necessary to protect American territory.

BODY OF GENERAL BEYERS FOUND IN VAAL RIVER
PRETORIA, via London, Dec. 11, 12.30 a.m.—The body of Gen. Christian Beyers, the rebel leader, who was drowned recently while attempting to escape across the Vaal River from government troops has been found at Vrege Kraal, not far from the spot where General Beyers was seen to sink.

CRUISER NURNBERG IS SUNK BY BRITISH DRESDEN TRAPPED
Only Survivor of German Squadron Defeated in Five Hour Battle Off Falkland Islands, Apparently Bottled Up in the Straits of Magellan.

LONDON, Dec. 10.—The admiralty made a further announcement relative to the sinking of German cruisers off the Falkland Islands in the south Atlantic, saying that a telegram has been received from Vice Admiral Sturdee, in command of the British vessels in the engagement, that the Nurnberg also was sunk on Dec. 8, and that the search for the Dresden is still proceeding.

The action, according to the admiralty's telegram, lasted five hours. At the end of three hours fighting the Schanhorst sank, and the Gneisenau two hours later. "The enemy's light cruisers then scattered," says the message, "and were chased by our light cruisers. There was no loss to any British vessel."

FOUGHT FIVE HOURS.
The official announcement of the admiralty says: "A further telegram has been received from Vice-Admiral Sir Frederick Doyton Sturdee, reporting that the Nurnberg was also sunk on Dec. 8, and that the search for the Dresden is still proceeding. "The action lasted for five hours, with intervals. The Schanhorst sank after three hours and the Gneisenau two hours later. The enemy's light cruisers scattered and were chased by our cruisers and light cruisers. "No loss of any British vessel is reported."

NURNBERG THIRD-CLASS CRUISER.
The Nurnberg was a third-class cruiser of 3300 tons displacement, 54 1-4 feet in length, 43 1-2 feet beam, and a draught of 15 3-4 feet. Built and completed at Kiel in 1908, she had engines of 13,200 h.p., and her twin screws propelled her at the rate of 23 1-2 knots, or about 25 miles an hour. Her armament consisted of ten 4.1 inch guns, eight 2.1 inch quick-firing and four machine guns, together with a couple of submerged torpedo tubes. She had a coal capacity of 850 tons and a complement of 295 men.

DRESDEN BOTTLED UP?
Reports received say that the Dresden is being pursued near the entrance to the Straits of Magellan. The German auxiliary cruiser Prince Eitel is reported to be cruising in the south Atlantic and to have on board 1500 German soldiers. So far as is known, the victorious squadron was composed entirely of British vessels.

REASONS FOR RETICENCE.
The withholding of the names of the British ships engaged is perfectly understood here. It is explained that the British admiralty desires to prevent the Germans from learning which important ships have been withdrawn from the battle fleet in the North Sea. It is also desired by the British that the two remaining German cruisers at large remain in ignorance of the strength of the enemy in their vicinity.

INSURE MINIMUM LOSS.
It is pointed out that the advantage of having, as have the British, an overwhelming preponderance of ships, is to use them on such terms that they will never be compelled to face the enemy on equal terms, thus insuring the minimum of loss to the British.

BOLD DASH FAILED.
The destruction of a majority of the ships of the German squadron had an immediate effect on insurance rates, and the government rate for insurance of cargoes against war risks was reduced today from two guineas to one and one-half guineas per cent. One member of Lloyd's who recently has not been accepting any business, resumed operations.

**MAKE PRISONERS CLEAR NORTH ONTARIO LAND**

Provincial Government is Establishing Experimental Farm in the Clay Belt.

As the result of negotiations between the federal and Ontario governments, a large experimental farm will be established at a point on the National Transcontinental Railway in northern Ontario. The exact location is not yet decided upon, but this morning a representative from the agriculture department at Ottawa will discuss the matter with J. F. Whitson, provincial commissioner for New Ontario. It is believed that the location will be in the neighborhood of Hearst. Premier Hearst stated last evening that the establishment of this farm

had been urged upon the federal authorities as part of a development and settlement project for the lands tributary to the railway. The federal government has at the present time a large number of prisoners of war and arrangements are being made to set these at work on the new farm, clearing up the land for cultivation in the spring. Some will go from Kingston next week, and others from Fort Arthur and other points later on. The premier points out that instead of being an unproductive charge upon the state they will be doing work otherwise left undone, and thus will increase the productivity of the north. The section in which they will settle is largely undeveloped. The establishment of the farm will bring no expense to Ontario and will not interfere with the progress of the provincial development scheme.

**REORGANIZE SYSTEM OF SCHOOL MED. INSPECTION**

Scheme Drafted by Special Subcommittee Suggests Three Big Districts.

A plan for the complete reorganization of the Toronto public school medical inspection system will be considered at a special meeting of the committee this afternoon.

The following is the proposed new system:

That the city, for the purpose of medical, dental and nursing work and supervision, be divided into three field districts, namely: West, comprising the schools west of Bathurst street, except Palmerston, Clinton, Givens, Crawford, Manning and Niagara; east, comprising the schools east of Yonge and south of Eglar and Danforth; and Wellesley; and centre, the remaining schools. It provides for the following staff, schools and children for each:

West division: 7 medical officers, 5 dentists, 11 nurses, 27 schools and 1 home; 20,894 children.

East division: 6 medical officers, 4 dentists, 12 nurses, 25 schools and 3 homes; 18,742 children.

Centre division: 6 medical officers, 4 dentists, 12 nurses, 25 schools and 1 home; 15,559 children.

That three field nurses be appointed; one to take charge of each district, at a salary of \$1000, with a yearly increase of \$50 up to a maximum of \$1200. That the following be appointed field nurses: Miss E. M. Paul, Miss E. J. Jamieson, Miss M. MacKay, and that Miss Paul's salary remain as it is at the present, that is, the maximum \$1200. The duties of field nurses are to be as follows: To see that all orders for the direction and efficient carrying out of school medical inspection work are diligently and intelligently performed. To report to the chief medical officer. To help a nurse whose work has been unduly increased.

The plan has already been approved by the sub-committee, but they will hear suggestions from their fellow-trustees today.

**CHEQUE CAME BACK "N.S.F." NOW MAKER FACES JURY**

Donald S. Williamson was found guilty in the general sessions court yesterday on two charges of obtaining goods by false pretences. It was alleged that he made false representation to the Ontario Produce Co., 642 East Queen street, in purchasing two and one-half tons of hay, valued at \$50. The case was tried by a jury. On the second charge, tried by Judge Coatsworth, it was stated that in payment of an account to Elder O. Gamsby the accused tendered a cheque for more than the required amount and received the balance in cash. When the cheque was presented at the bank it was returned marked "Not sufficient funds."

Williamson was let out on bail until the 17th, when he will appear for sentence, and in the meantime he will endeavor to make restitution.

Pleading guilty to stealing a bicycle, the property of Thomas Bird, Philip Rubanovich was sentenced to one year in the Ontario Reformatory, and Morris Rosenthal to one month in jail.

**STUDYING CANADIAN FISH.**

On Saturday night at the Canadian Institute Dr. Hjort, the marine fishery expert for Norway, will address the members on his work and investigations around the coast of that country. Premier Hearst will act as chairman. At the invitation of the Canadian Biological Society he has come over to study the fisheries in this country.

**LICENSE COMMISSION WARNS HOTELKEEPERS**

The Toronto Municipalities Club applied to the license commissioners for a license yesterday, but it was left over for a week. If it is granted there will be twenty-one club licenses, which is the full number that can be allowed. The musicians have quarters at 197-9 Simcoe street, and have a membership of 400. They guarantee to live strictly to the rules, and only wanted a beer and wine license.

Hotel keepers were warned against giving soldiers who showed signs of having enough any more.

**AMERICANS HANKERING TO DAM ST. LAWRENCE**

Commission Now Here Intimates Further Schemes for Getting More Power.

Still another New York State commission has journeyed to Ontario to seek ideas in the economic carrying out of a hydro-electric system. This visit is inspired by the idea that the province is getting much more value from its power and transmission equipment than is being realized across the border, and the American officials are in consequence making trips thru the different power houses of the Niagara district.

One thing claimed by Senator Simpson of New York is that the Americans are not getting enough power to fulfill all their demands. He states that there is much planning now under way in New York to increase the amount of water which the American plants draw from the Niagara River. The limit allowed is 20,000 feet per second and already they are using 15,000. They will negotiate with the federal government for the right to increase this limit, and will also seek rights along the St. Lawrence River. He suggests a system of international dam for this region.

One suggestion of the Americans is that water pipes could be laid on a rapid incline from the foot of the falls and that the water being twice utilized would attain great power, and double the service granted. Officials of the provincial commission are extending their hospitality to the visitors and endeavoring to make their visit profitable.

**PEACE COMMISSIONERS DINED AT YORK CLUB**

No General Celebration Will Be Held Till War is Over.

The New York State Peace Commission, organized to promote ways and means of a feasible celebration of the 100 years of good will which have existed between Canada and the United States, were yesterday entertained at a formal luncheon in the York Club by the Ontario Government. The occasion was purely felicitous and although the delegates presented the ideas and suggestions as to the cooperation of Ontario in a general expression of appreciation, no formal declaration was expected or given by the premier. It was made clear when the discussion began that matters were purely in a tentative shape and that no arrangements could be made beyond those arrived at in Ottawa on Wednesday. Thus any idea of a general celebration will be abandoned until the war is over but churches, schools, and other organizations may feel free to hold Christmas demonstrations as they see fit.

In addition to the leading city dignitaries were represented at the luncheon. The American commission is composed as follows: Chairman, G. Reick, Senators W. R. Herrick and J. E. Townner, and Hon. Messrs. David Nelson, R. W. Karutz, J. W. Williams and J. S. Sutherland.

**BIG PRISONER WEPT DECLARING INNOCENCE**

Holding the Bible in uplifted hand, William Smith, a negro, stood in the witness box in the general sessions yesterday and earnestly appealed to Judge Coatsworth to reduce the sentence of one year in prison imposed on him for an indecent assault.

With tears rolling down his face, the big West Indian presented a sorry picture, and facing the judge, he declared solemnly: "Before God, I am innocent of the charge, and may I never leave this box alive if I am guilty."

His honor was noticeably moved by the declaration, but he made no reply. On account of the previous good character of Smith and the fact that his wife, who gave evidence against him, testified that he was an excellent husband, it is probable that the sentence may be considerably reduced.

**BRITISH EXPOSED MACHINE GUN TRAP**

Incident at Ypres Described in Letter to H. S. Watts—Relic Forwarded.

Being part of a letter received by H. S. Watts, sales manager of the United Cigar Stores, Limited, from Company Sergeant-Major U. Evason, No. 100990, 3rd Battalion, first Canadian contingent, is as follows:

"I am sending you a relic from the front, with its history.

"The relic is a small pocket pouch which was made from the covering of a German officer's traveling kit, who was captured at Louvain. It was made by Private J. Devine, No. 1554, of the First Irish Guards, who was later shot at Ypres. He got two bullets thru his left arm, but still insisted on staying in the firing line, until ordered to the hospital by his officer.

"The description of the fight which he gives when he got his wounds is very brief, but I will tell you the main facts.

"It was at Ypres and the Germans had left their trenches in the night, and at daybreak were in the open. The guards were behind and in a wood with right and left flanks advanced, forming a half circle. They advanced in this formation until discovered by the enemy, who immediately ran, expecting a charge, but it was only a bluff of the guards, for if the officers had lost their heads and ordered a charge they would have been wiped out, as the enemy, under cover of darkness had lined their trenches with quick firing guns and had sent this battalion out as a bait. They were soon dislodged by the artillery and the trenches were filled by the dead, which were covered over, to be forgotten forever."

**TWENTY-THREE TURKS WERE TAKEN PRISONERS**

Detachment Which Landed Near Odessa Had Inglorious Record.

Canadian Press Despatch, JESSABA, via Petrograd, Dec. 10.—A Turkish detachment of twenty-three men landed with horses at Bouras, a small port on the Black Sea, near Odessa. The Turks struck inland and were captured four miles from Tarutino, Bessarabia. They were disarmed and taken to Tarutino.

The province of Bessarabia is in southeastern Russia. It was a Rumanian colony of about 4000 inhabitants.

**PRZEMYSL DESERTED FOOD IS ALL GONE**

Canadian Press Despatch, LEMBERG, Dec. 10, 2:30 p.m.—(Via Petrograd.) London.—Prisoners who were taken in a sortie made by the garrison of the Austrian fortress of Przemyel were brought here yesterday. They declare all the inhabitants of Przemyel have deserted the city and it is fast becoming uninhabitable.

Food stores have become exhausted, they say, and few cattle are left.

**SIR FREDERICK STURDEE GIVEN WARM PRAISE**

LONDON, Dec. 10.—King George today sent a message of congratulation to Vice-Admiral Sir Frederick Sturdee and the men of his fleet for their victory over the Germans.

Gen. Sir John French, commander-in-chief of the British land forces, also sent a message to Admiral Sturdee on behalf of the army. In the message he said: "I congratulate you and the admiralty on having practically swept the seas clear of the enemy's ships."

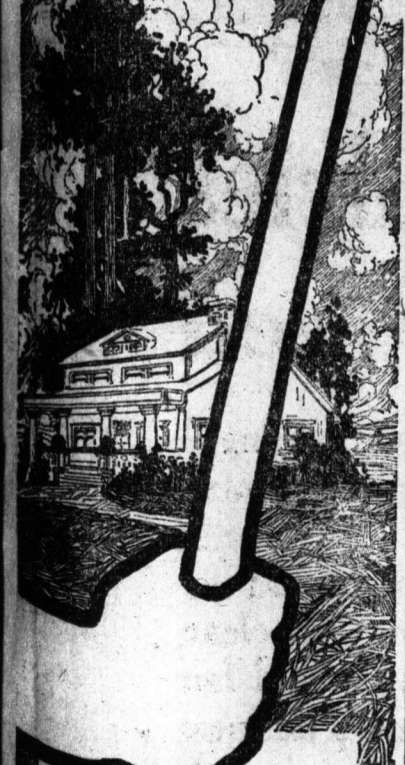

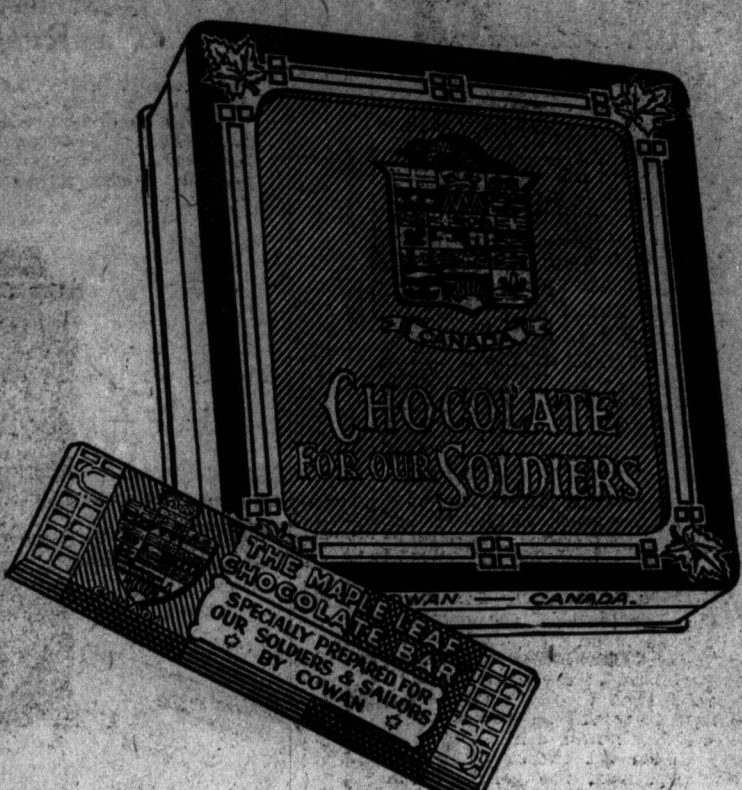

Trustee Fairbairn Proposes it Management Committee Busy Yesterday.

Trustee Fairbairn gave notice at the school management committee yesterday that he would move at the next meeting for the appointment of "an advisory agriculture committee" with the object of introducing an agricultural course in the Toronto high schools.

The board of high school principals reported, with respect to the proposed extension of high school work into the public schools curriculum as follows: "If the object of the proposed addition to the equipment and program and studies is to give to those pupils who enter the fifth form of these schools, and who will complete their education there, some knowledge of the languages, it would seem to be a step in the right direction. But as a short cut to the middle of the high school the proposal was 'open to serious objection.' The matter was referred to a sub-committee.

### RED CROSS MAKES APPEAL FOR HELP

Money, Motor Ambulances, Socks and Clothing Are Urgently Needed.

The Canadian Red Cross Society is renewing its appeal for contributions of money, clothing and conveniences, to be used in caring for the men at the front. A circular letter issued yesterday, says:

"We need funds to purchase regular surgical and medical supplies of all sorts, including the motor ambulances which are doing such noble work in carrying the wounded as quickly and painlessly as possible to the hospitals. Each of them costs about \$2000, according to the approved war office pattern. Money is also needed to fill the requests for blankets, underwear, sweaters and overcoats, which are coming in from our commissioners in London. These are garments which cannot be made by the women of the front. Subscriptions will be gratefully received by treasurers of local and provincial branches, or at 77 East King street, Toronto.

"But from the women we ask, in practically unlimited quantities, good woolen socks, in sizes 10 1/2, 11 and 11 1/2; flannel shirts, pyjamas, dressing gowns, cotton nightshirts, and all the garments specified in 'Suggestions for Work' issued by the head office and applied to all applicants free of charge. Such supplies should be sent to local or provincial branches, or to the Canadian headquarters, 77 East King street, Toronto.

#### TO PREVENT OVERLAPPING OF CHARITY WORKERS.

The Neighborhood Workers' Association has opened its Christmas Exchange again this year and hopes to assist in the prevention of the overlapping of charity work this year. The idea is to keep a family from being helped by several people unknown of each other, and to give them the assistance. Last year the exchange handled over a thousand names and they are now opened at Room 63, 15 Toronto street, Toronto.

### FIFTY-DOLLAR TRIAL; FIFTEEN-CENT CRIME!

Judge Asks Prisoner to Pay Half if Given His Liberty.

When Joseph Calitz appeared in the general sessions yesterday to receive sentence for stealing two bottles of milk from John Holland, 21 Phoenix street, Judge Coatsworth said that in view of the accused's family and business, he would make a slight deviation. He asked him to pay \$25 towards the expenses of the trial and let him on suspended sentence. It was estimated that the trial over two bottles of milk cost the crown almost \$50.

### CANDY CONCERN WON LAWSUIT OVER SUGAR

Price Went Up When War Began—Osgoode Hall Intelligence.

At Osgoode Hall yesterday the Milk Candy Company were awarded \$457.4 damages for loss of a shipment of 230,000 pounds of sugar from Browns, Ltd. The Milk Candy Company purchased the candy business of Browns, Limited, at 460-2 Wilton avenue, Toronto, which company had, on Jan. 25, made a contract with the Dominion Sugar Co. for the purchase of 300,000 of sugar at \$3.95 per cwt. At the outbreak of war sugar advanced considerably in price, and Browns claimed that the contract with the Dominion Sugar Company was not included in the agreement to purchase. The price and scarcity of sugar had such a serious effect on their former candy business that Browns, Ltd., resumed possession from the Milk Co., and the plaintiffs suffered. It is alleged, considerable loss in consequence.

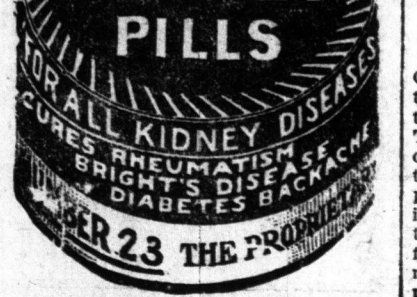

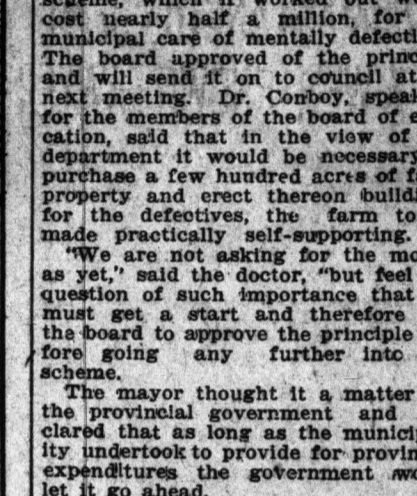

TORONTO'S LIVE STOCK TRADE BIG

Yards Here Now Rank With Those of American Cities MUCH MANUFACTURING Various Abattoirs and Packing Plants Constitute a Big Industry.

Toronto as a live stock centre develops year by year and has now become recognized as one of the really important markets on the North American continent.

The great importance of Toronto as a live stock market is shown by the fact that all engaged in the business and buyers are attracted from as far distant as Chicago, Buffalo, Montreal, New York, Winnipeg and Boston.

Previous to the establishment of the Union Stock Yards the chief business at the old Toronto market was receiving and shipping of live stock.

One of the best packing plants in the city is that of the Davies Company, which also has a branch with the live stock market.

The increasing demand for space in stock yards here being met by the Union Stock Yards one large pen having been added this year.
