A MONSTER VESSEL.

The Largest Merchant Steamer Afloat Just Launched at Belfast.

Belfast, Sept. 10.—The Hamburg-American Steamship Company's new twin screw steamer Pennsylvania was suc cessfully launched from the Harland & Wolff shipyards this morning. The new vessel is the largest merchant steamer afloat, being of 30,000 tons dis-placement and 20,000 tons carrying capacity. She is 585 feet long, 62 feet beam, and 42 feet deep. The Pennsyl-vania is designed to make an aver-age speed of fourteen knots an hour and to have a passenger capacity of 200 first cabin, 150 second cabin and 2000 steerage.


