Four Seamen Rowed 25 Miles-Blown Out of Course-Nearly Dead When Shore Reached. Vancouver, B.C., May 12.-A special from

Nanaimo, B.C., this afternoon says that the steamer Princess Louise from Vancouver for Northern British Columbia ports is ashore at Thormanby Island, just south of Texada.

The wreck occurred about midnight last night and the news of the disaster was

night and the news of the disaster was brought here to-day by Capt. John Irving and four seamen, who had rowed 25 miles in a small boat. The wind had blown them out of their course and the members of this little party who had come for assistance were nearly dead from cold and exposure when they arrived. They were followed to Nanaimo this afternoon by the passengers, 35 in number, brought down by the tug Falcon, which had been hailed as she was passing the wreek.


