LABOR MEMBERS TO REMAIN IN BRITISH CABINET

Commonion Parliament Opens

UNUSUAL TOUCH
WAS GIVEN THE
HOUSE OPENING

Speaker Sproule's Removal
to Senate Necessitated
Changes in Ritual.
REPLACED BY SEVIGNY
Laurier's Comments Tinged
With Irony—Nine Vac-
ancies in Parliament.

By a Staff Reporter.
OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 12.—When the
house of commons assembled at 3
o'clock this afternoon the speaker's
chair was vacant. During the recess
Mr. Speaker Sproule had been called to
the senate thereby relinquishing his
place in the lower house. Prayers
were, therefore, dispensed with as
there was no speaker to read them.

The two clerks in their black gowns
took their places at the long table and
the sergeant-at-arms took up his
usual position. Then came the three
knocks on the outer door and a mo-
ment later the Gentleman Usher of
the Black Rod was admitted. Instead
of advancing slowly and making three
obsequious bows to the speaker, he bowed
first to the members on the govern-
ment side and then to the members
on the other side of the house.

"Gentlemen," he said, "the deputy
of His Royal Highness, the govern-
ment, desires the attendance of this
honorable House in the chamber
of the senate."
The members thus addressed at once
made their way to the senate cham-
ber, but no speaker, of course, pre-
ceded. This fact was duly observed
by Sir Charles Fitzpatrick, who was
acting as deputy for the govern-
ment. Therefore, according to im-
memorial custom, the clerk of the
senate announced that his honor the
deputy governor-general did not see
fit to address the commons until they
had elected a speaker, but that if

COULD MUSTER BUT 39 VOTES

LABORITES ARE SATISFIED
WITH PLEDGE OF ASQUITH
Henderson, Brace and Roberts Withdraw Resigna-
tions From Cabinet Pending Labor Conference
at End of Month.

LONDON, Jan. 12.—(7.05 p.m.)—The resignations from the ministry
of Labor members, Arthur Henderson, president of the board of
education; William Brace and George H. Roberts, respectively
parliamentary under-secretary for home affairs, and lord commis-
sioner of the treasury, have been withdrawn.
The Labor leaders had a long conference with Premier Asquith, when
he assured them the government was hiding no ulterior motives behind
the military service bill.

It was later officially announced that "in view of the fact that the
whole matter is considered at the party's annual conference at
Bristol, the end of January, it has been decided to withhold the resigna-
tions of Messrs. Henderson, Brace and Roberts for the time being."

FRENCH DETACHMENT LANDED
ON GREEK ISLAND OF CORFU

Fleet of Unknown Nationality Cruising Around Island—
Serbian Troops Are Expected To Arrive.

LONDON, Jan. 12.—(11.57 p.m.)—A French detachment has been landed on
the Greek Island of Corfu, according to a Reuters Telegram Company. Fourteen ships of un-
known nationality are cruising around Corfu.
A Rome despatch to the Stefani Bureau says that Corfu advises report that
a French warship landed a detachment of troops on Tuesday evening, in order
to prepare for the arrival of Serbian troops.

CHANGES IN BRIGADING
ANNOUNCED AT OTTAWA

Cameron Highlanders Replace
Montreal Regiment in Third
Battalion.

By a Staff Reporter.
OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 12.—The brig-
ading of the various battalions at the
front after the recent reorganization
has been announced. The first divi-
sion includes the first, second and
third brigades, the second division the
fourth, fifth and sixth brigades, and
the third division the seventh, eighth
and ninth brigades.
The first and second brigades re-
main the same. The 14th Royal Mont-
real Regiment is transferred from the
3rd Brigade to the 5th Brigade, under
General Watson, and it is replaced by
the 43rd Cameron Highlanders of
Winnipeg. There is no change in the
4th Brigade.
The 14th and 60th "Montreal" Bat-
talions are added to the 5th Brigade.
The 6th Brigade includes the R.C.R.,
P. C. L. L., Royal Highlanders of
Montreal and 49th of Edmonton.
The 8th Brigade includes two bri-
gades of Canadian Mounted Rifles, be-
sides 1200 other infantrymen.
The 9th Brigade is made up of the
25th Battalion (Nova Scotia), 26th
(New Brunswick), 52nd (Fort Arthur),
and 58th (St. Catharines).

ATTACK IN REICHSTAG
ON FIRM CENSORSHIP

German Controlling of Press and
News Service Abroad Much
Objected to.

BERLIN, Jan. 12, via London, 11.40
p.m.—The debate on the censorship
is being continued with unabated
vigor in the budget committee of the
Reichstag. The present system of
controlling the home press and the
news service to foreign countries is
being energetically attacked by re-
presentatives of all parties, who are
virtually unanimous in demanding
greater liberty to discuss questions of
internal politics, and who insist that
the German people has shown itself
cool headed, mature and patriotic en-
ough to be permitted to look the sit-
uation in the face and form its own
judgments on the events and on the
nation's problems.
A Socialist speaker expressed belief
that the time had come when discus-
sion of the aims of the war could
be permitted with advantage both at
home and abroad. The censorship,
said the Socialist speaker, acted one-
sidedly and passed attacks upon the
executive committee of the Socialists,
but suppressed the committee's re-
joinders.
A national Liberal speaker lamented
that the press had been forbidden to
mention that crowds had gathered in
front of the butter stores, and other
developments in the food situation.
The Socialists demanded that news-
papers be suppressed only with the
consent of the chancellor in each
particular case.

FORMER U. S. OFFICER
WOUNDED SECOND TIME

Capt. Stanley W. Wood, in To-
day's Casualty List, Was
Shot Last September.

OTTAWA, Jan. 12.—Capt. Stanley
W. Wood of the 16th Battalion, Van-
couver Highlanders, given as wounded
in the midnight casualty list, was an
officer of the United States regular
army and was in charge of a com-
pany at the landing by United States
forces at Vera Cruz, Mexico.
On Sept. 4 last he was wounded in
the left side, but returned to duty on
Oct. 2. The minister of militia sent
a telegram of sympathy to Capt.
Wood's mother, who lives in Kansas
City, Mo., and also complimented her
on her son's distinguished service.

Second Reading Passed
Without Division After
Test Vote on Motion to
Reject—House of Com-
mons Stirred to Great
Enthusiasm.

LONDON, Jan. 12, 11.45 p.m.—
Amid scenes of uproarious enthu-
siasm the house of commons at 11
o'clock tonight defeated a motion to
reject the military service bill by a
vote of 431 to 39. Immediately after-
ward the house acceded to the pre-
mier's request by passing the second
reading of the bill without division.
The vote was chiefly interesting on
account of the changed attitude of
many of the 105 members who op-
posed it on the first reading.
The debate was closed by Arthur
Henderson, president of the board of
education, in a much applauded
speech. He said it was a great satis-
faction to him that because of definite
assurances given his friends and
himself by the premier, in the name
of the whole cabinet, he was able to
remain for the present in the coalition
ministry. This fact would be regard-
ed at home and abroad as a symbol
of the nation's unity. He closed with
the statement:
"Taken Kitchener's Word.
I have the authority of Earl Kit-
chener and the general staff that we
require at once not only the unmar-
ried men enrolled under the Derby
scheme, not only the married men
who are waiting to be called, but also
the whole available part of the 650,000
men with whom this measure
deals."

TWO ITALIAN VESSELS
ARE SUNK IN ADRIATIC

Only Half Passengers on Board
Brindisi Are Reported
Rescued.

ROME, Jan. 12.—Two Italian steam-
ers, the Brindisi and the Citta di
Palermo, have been sunk by mines in the
Adriatic Sea.
Half of the passengers on board the
Brindisi were lost. The crew was
saved. Nearly all on board the
Citta di Palermo which was an armed
vessel was saved.
The Brindisi was a vessel of 863 tons
and was owned at Bari.
The Citta di Palermo was built in
1919 and was of 2415 tons gross. She
was a turbine vessel and was owned
by the Italian State Railway of Pal-
ermo. This vessel should not be con-
fused with the vessel of the same
name which is owned by W. F. Beck-
er of Messina and which sailed from
Galveston Jan. 4, for Barcelona by way
of Norfolk.

BRITISH MADE A RAID
EAST OF ARMENTIERES

Score of Germans Disposed of
and Emplacement
Blown Up.

LONDON, Jan. 12.—The British of-
ficial statement reads:
"Last night a raid was carried out
by our troops on hostile trenches east
of Armentieres. About twenty of the
enemy were disposed of and a ma-
chine gun emplacement in their lines
was blown up. The party then re-
turned to our trenches, bringing back
two prisoners.
"The artillery on both sides was
active today about Vermelles, Wietjts
and Pillem."

RAISE IN SALARY FOR

BRITAIN NOT TO FORCE
POLICY ON DOMINIONS
Sir Edward Carson Discusses
Trade Problems to Follow
War.

Canadian Associated Press Cable.
LONDON, Jan. 12.—Speaking at the
Institute of Industry lunch today, Sir
Edward Carson said the policy after
the war would have to be considered
as a whole. They did not desire to
force any of their ideals on their kin-
men beyond the sea, who must for-
ward their own proposals, which must
be incorporated in our imperial council,
while the commercial policy must be
run for mutual benefit.

HIDES DISASTER
TO LILLE DEPOT

Cautious Wording of German
Communique Conceals
Serious Loss.

LONDON, Jan. 12, 10.22 p.m.—
Cettinje, the old capital of Montene-
gro, now seems likely to suffer the
fate of Belgium, and British observers
are already asking anxiously what
menace the Austrian conquest of
Montenegro is likely to hold over the
allies at Saloniki.
Fighting is going on all around
Cettinje, the small town which nearly
a year ago ceased to be the seat of
the Montenegrin Government. Never
before in the long history of the little
Montenegrin kingdom has it been
compelled to bow to a foreign con-
queror, but there seems little hope
that it can long withstand the over-
whelming strength of Gen. Keyess in
men and guns.
Italy's Aid Withheld.
As in Serbia's case, the entente
press finds it inexplicable why Italian
assistance was not sent long ago to
Lovcen, which, it is said, could have
been rendered impregnable with a
comparatively small number of rein-
forcements and a few heavy guns.
The reduction of Montenegro, the
press points out, will enable Austria
not only to command the Adriatic, but
also threaten the flank of any advance
from Saloniki and prevent any ef-
fective move by the entente forces
toward Albania.
For Italy the new Austrian success
has a most serious aspect. The long
narrow Italian peninsula is peculiarly
vulnerable to an attack from the sea.
Any really great Austrian naval base
in the magnificent harbor of Cattaro
would have been impossible without
the Germans, but under the new cir-
cumstances Austrian possession of Cattaro
is almost as great a menace to Italy
as the German.
On the Russian front, the Austrian of-
ficial communication records renewed
desperate attacks on the Russians on
the Bessarabian frontier, but insists
that the attacks everywhere were re-
pulsed. The Petrograd communica-
tion is silent on a statement but the
Russians usually withhold mention
of their movements until they are
well on the road to completion.

Today's Events Reviewed

GREAT confidence in the future of the allies on the western front
is expressed in despatches from London. A prominent British
staff officer is quoted as saying that Germans are everywhere
outnumbered in men and guns, that the allies can fire five shells to
their one without depleting their munitions, and, while it is rubbish to
say that the allies have the enemy beaten, it is true that they have
him ready for a beating. The allies can take the first line of German
trenches whenever they wish.

Much comment is evoked in London by the cautious wording of
the blowing up of a large German munitions depot near Lille, and it
is believed that the Germans have suffered a disaster of considerable
magnitude. The British official communique records nothing of the
wrecking of the depot, and it may have been the work of French or
Belgians pressed into employment by the Germans. Indications, which
have leaked thru the iron censorship of Germany, point to the proba-
bility that the Germans have been greatly suffering of late from the
destruction of munitions manufacturing. The pinch of the British
blockade is causing a great deal of discontent in Germany.

After the report had been read the Vice-President addressed the meeting as follows: Gentlemen: I am sure we all regret that our President is not able to be with us today...

It is hardly necessary for me to say that the conditions under which the business of the Bank has been carried on since the outbreak of war have been such an unforeseen and unusual character that we had no precedent to guide us...

Increased taxation, to make subscriptions to the special funds arising out of the war, and to do this out of the earnings of the year without being obliged to resort to our Reserves or Profit and Loss account for special appropriations for any of these purposes.

It is not necessary to do more than refer in a word or two to the general financial conditions in the Motherland and on the Continent. Loans by the different Governments abroad have been and are being issued on an unprecedented scale, and the waste of war material and supplies is so enormous that new loans follow upon the old at very short intervals.

In the address delivered at our last annual meeting the expectation was expressed that Canada's trade relations with the United States were so important to that country, and we were such good customers, that we might reasonably expect they would be readjusted to over \$145,000,000, divided as follows: Dominion and Provincial Government Loans, \$85,475,000.

The immediate outlook is encouraging, but conditions are so abnormal, and there are such possibilities of unpleasant surprises, that no predictions can be made beyond the very nearest future. In the West, the total value of the grain provinces and Saskatchewan and Alberta being estimated at \$450,000,000, the crop in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta being estimated at \$450,000,000.

Had anyone a year ago predicted that it would have been possible to have reversed our debit trade balance into such a large credit one, to have taken up an issue of Dominion Government bonds to the extent of \$100,000,000, to have provided the funds necessary for all the other requirements of legitimate business enterprises, the author of such a prophecy would have been regarded as extremely visionary and his predictions would have been derided.

But the war and the conditions existing in this country, and one feeling amongst the stockholders of the Bank, that we are prepared to support the Government to the fullest extent of our power in aiding the Empire in this crisis. As before stated, it is not possible to make any prediction as to the results of the effects upon our financial position by the increased indebtedness that will be created.

We believe our duty to the country and to our shareholders is to use the resources at our disposal to the best of our ability to assist both the Dominion and Imperial Governments in the heavy burden of financing that has been laid upon them.

This country has, in a very large degree, potential sources of wealth. Productive lands, forest mines and fisheries, well-equipped manufacturing establishments, a good system of railways, canals, and other means of transportation, and an industrious and economical population, are factors in the production of the basis of national prosperity.

Our next most important duty as bankers is to aid the Government in its financial needs. There is a limit, of course, beyond which we cannot go. Our resources are limited. We must not only lend the surplus that depositors provide, and for this we must look to the individuals composing our population. The Bank's capital that is required for the development of our natural resources. The amount of money that must be required for future development. Our banking deposits are not equal to so great a task, and they must not be unduly depleted so as to lessen our working capital.

Neither can we weaken our financial standing by relying upon increased issues of Dominion Government currency. Our currency, whether of Bank or Dominion Government notes, should in its practical working be limited to what the country requires for its daily needs in enabling transfers of commodities to be easily and conveniently carried out.

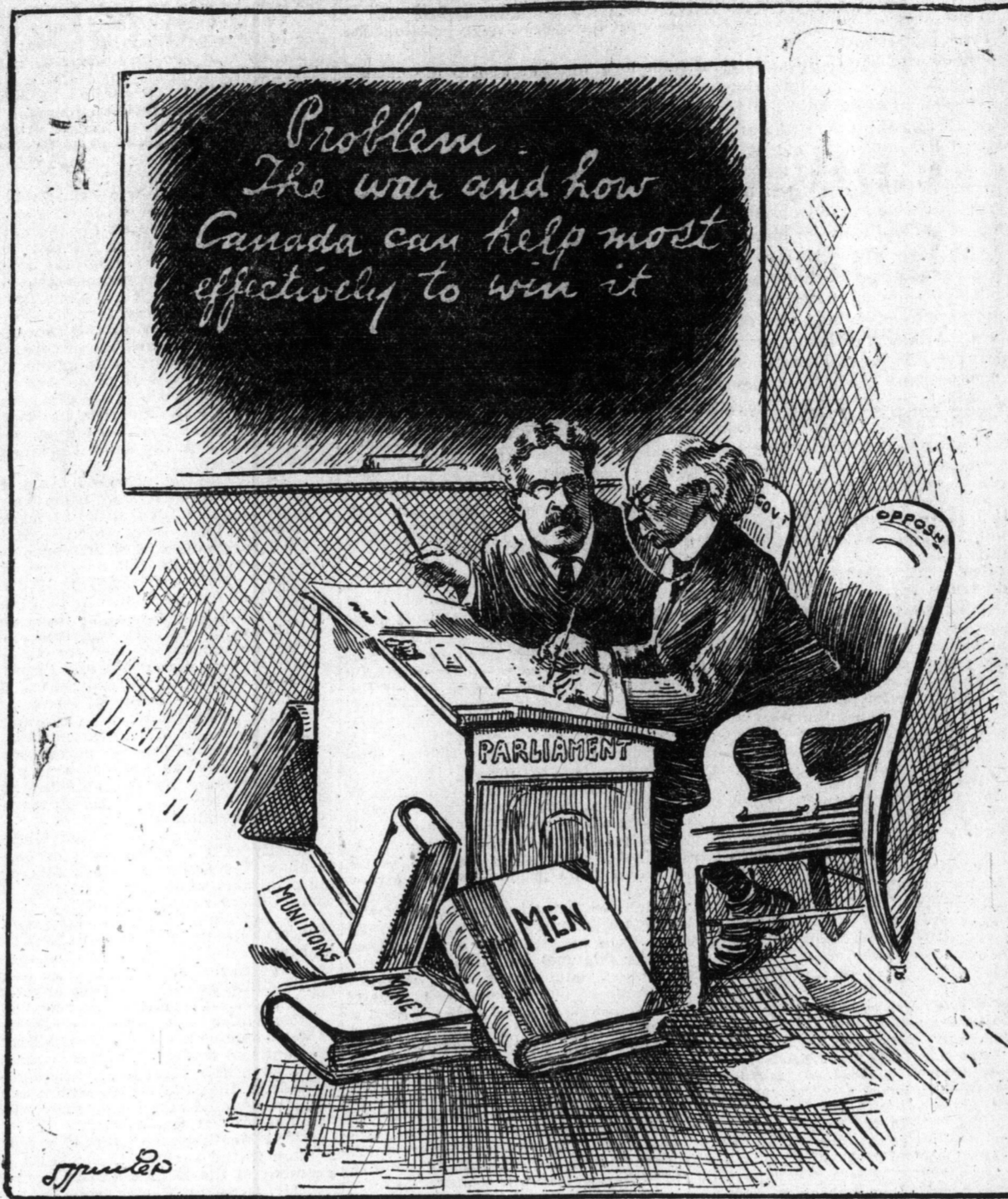
