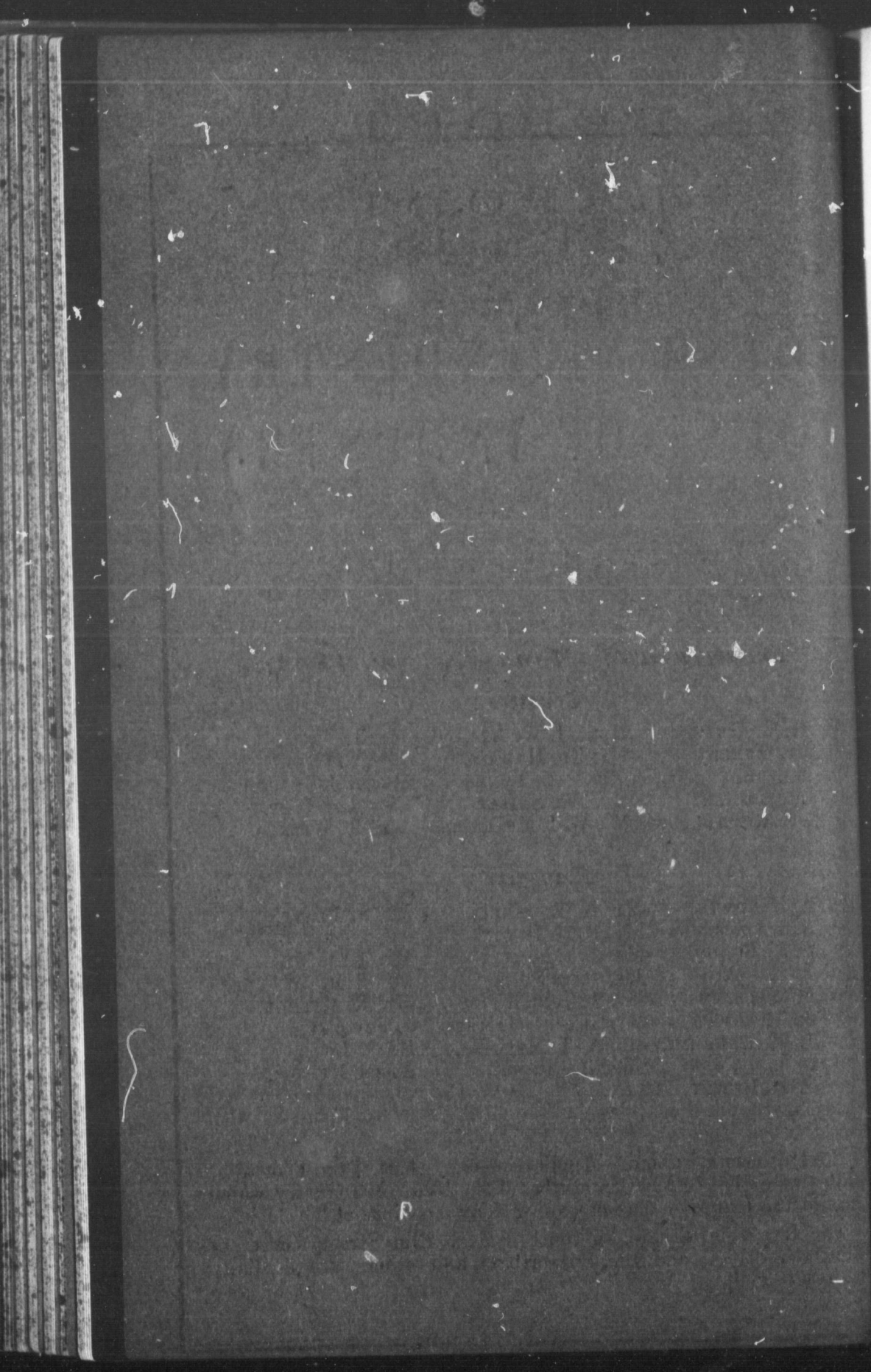

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

The Trustees and Managers of the Toronto House of Industry, in accordance with the Act of Incorporation, beg to submit the following Report of the affairs of the charity for the past year to the subscribers and the general public.

The various objects of the Institution have been carefully kept in view by the Board of Management, and in all its branches of usefulness the affairs of the House have been strictly attended to, and continue to progress satisfactorily.

The *modus operandi*, the care taken in visiting and reporting on each case, and the discrimination exercised in granting aid of any description to applicants are now too well known to require any lengthened explanation. And it will only be necessary to refer to the Report of the Superintendent to learn the great amount of relief which is given to the poor and sick of the city. Attention is likewise directed to the accompanying Report of the Medical Officer, and the Treasurer's statement of the receipts and disbursements on account of the charity.

It is again in the power of the Board to put on record their high appreciation of the faithfulness and efficiency with which the Superintendent has discharged his duties during the past year.

TREASURER'S REPORT.

The Treasurer, HENRY ROWSELL, Esq., then submitted the Annual Statement of Cash Account, shewing the whole Receipts for the year, from all sources, including the balance on hand from previous year, as \$16,084.49, and the Gross Expenditure (per vouchers) as \$12,427.01, leaving a balance in hand 1st January, 1873, of \$3,657.48, of which \$684.14 belongs to the Investment Fund.

The above accounts were compared with vouchers, duly audited and found correct.

It will be noted that the balance on hand appears large, but the expenditure for the three winter months of January, February, and March, will more than absorb that amount.

MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT.

Many emigrants, and persons from other Municipalities have received medical treatment in the House of Industry during the past year.

Many of the poor of the city, while applying to the Committee for food and fuel, have likewise sought and obtained relief from disease which so often follows in the wake of poverty.

There has been a good deal of sickness in the House during the year, and fourteen of the inmates have died, viz, eight men, three women and three children, whose ages ranged from six weeks to one hundred and six years.

All the deaths resulted from chronic diseases incident to old age, or destitution.
