INLAND MAILS.

The Inland Mails leave Charlotte-Town for Prince-Town, Traveller's Rest, Bedeque and Tryon, once a week, on Wednesday, at 12 o'clock, noon, during Summer, and the same day of the week, once a fortnight, during the Winter.

For Mount Pleasant, St. Peter's, St. Margaret's, East Point and Bay Fortune, the same day as the Western Mail.

For Vernon River and Three Rivers, on Monday morning at 9 o'clock, during Summer, (once a week,) and once a fortnight during Winter.

Rates of Postage; 2d. on a single Letter—so in proportion for double, treble, &c. ½d. on Newspapers.

MAILS FOR BRITAIN, &c.

The Mails for the adjacent Colonies, the United States, Britain, &c. are dispatched weekly during Summer, (Tuesday Evening,) by a Packet to Pictou. In Winter a Courier is employed to cross the Strait with an Ice Boat, once a fortnight, from Cape Traverse to Cape Tormentine, by which route the Mails are forwarded during that season.

ECLIPSES.

Of each of the two great LUMINARIES in the heavenly system, there will be two Eclipses this year, as follows—

I. The first will be of the moon on Friday March 20th, at 9h. 29m. morning, invisible. On the N. W. Coast of North America, and the N. E. of Asia, it will be visible, about 4½ digits eclipsed on the Moon's northern limb.

II. The second will be of the Sun on Friday April 3d. at 5h 50m afternoon; yet by reason of the Moon's south latitude it will not be visible in North America. But in the South Pacific Ocean, lat. 32° 15' S. long. 149° 6' 3" W. of London it will be visible, central and total, on the meridian. Also, at the Three King's Islands, and the North of New Holland, it will be visible and very great, nearly total. ☾'s lat. 35' 15" S.

III. The third will be of the Moon, on Sunday, Sept. 13th, visible, as follows :

Digits eclipsed 6° 5' on the ☾'s southern limb, in the north side of the Earth's shadow.

IV. The fourth and last will be of the Sun, on Sunday, Sept 27, at 9h 32m. evening; Sun below the horizon, of course invisible. But in the North Pacific Ocean, lat. 39° 22' 45" north, longitude 157° 5' 30" E. of London, it will be visible, central, and annular on the meridian. It will also be visible and annular at the City of Jeddo, in the island of Nippon, in the forenoon; at the City of Pekin, in China, the sun will rise with about 8 digits eclipsed; and in the Gulf of Japan, the Yellow Sea, the peninsula of Corea, and the western part of China, in those places, this will be a great and visible eclipse. ☾'s lat 33' 45" N.

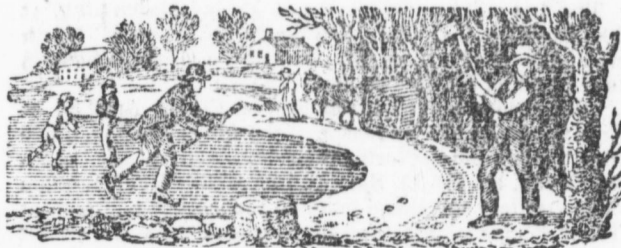

Eleventh, high water at Halifax. Twelfth, Sun slow or fast.

RIGHT HAND PAGE.—First column, days of the month.—Second, Miscellaneous Phenomena, Holidays, Weather, &c. Third, Farmer's Calendar.

The top of the columns on each page shows the Moon's phases, or the times of new and full moon, and of the first and last quarter or two quadratures with the sun.

He that has health has little else to wish for; and if you want it, rise early.

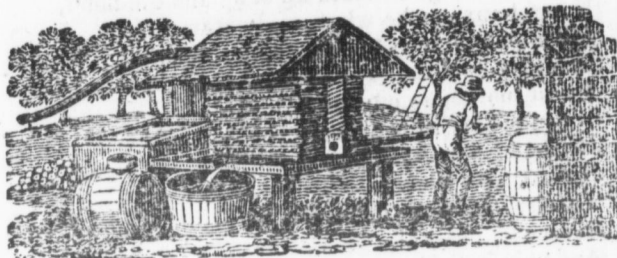

The mill clean; and clean, sweet straw with the pumace, and do not suffer water to come near it in any shape whatever. The casks too, should be chosen and prepared with care, and look with a nice eye to its fermentation. All this costs but a little more time or labour than it does the sloven to prepare his dirty, watery stuff, which he finally spoils by putting it into musty casks, or by neglecting to watch and regulate its fermentation. Inspect your implements of husbandry, and let such as have defects or are damaged or broken, be repaired in the season of leisure, that there may be no loss of time when you wish to use them. AGRICULTURAL, RECIPES, &c.

Smut in Wheat.—The following miscellaneous particulars respecting smut, and the means of preventing it, merit attention:—1. The same water should never be used but once in washing wheat; even when brine is employed, it is safest to have fresh liquor to each parcel. 2. Lime is not only of service to dry the seed, but by its caustic and antiseptic qualities, tends to destroy putridity and animalculæ of every description. 3. If smutty grain is not threshed till the June or July succeeding the year it was reaped, the dust, it is said, will become too volatile to attach itself to the grain when threshed, particularly by a mill; nor is old seed wheat so liable to occasion smut, which by age loses the power of reproduction.—4. Notwithstanding the violence of threshing mills, they do not bruise the smut balls so much as the flail. 5. Great care must be taken not to thresh wheat on a floor where smutty wheat has been threshed, nor to convey the seed in a sack in which smutty wheat has been formerly put.

On the subject of steeping, it may be proper to add, that it would be well to extend that operation to other grains besides wheat. Every sort of seed should be steeped enough to promote a quick vegetation, and to secure a more uniform growth, which would greatly im-

prove both the quantity and quality of the grain: and both old Burt the seed of barley and oats, as well as of wheat, would, it will be clothed with saline and caustic particles, it would either markable," preserve it entirely from the attacks of vermin, or drinking spirituous troy such as may venture to eat of it. We have been hereditary informed that unslacked lime answers an excellent purpose for preparing wheat for seed. A gentleman states that he put four or five pounds of quick lime into a bushel of wheat; a sufficient quantity of water to soak a bushel of wheat insensible then added the wheat, and permitted it to remain about even 12 hours. The lime by slacking raised the temperature of the water to about blood heat, and the wheat became so soft and parboiled. On sowing it, however, it sprouted much sooner than usual, flourished remarkably, and produced an excellent crop, entirely free from any appearance of smut. The following has been recommended by a Farmer at Vermont:—"My method is this: I take three quarts of slacked lime to each bushel of wheat, put them into a barrel, a layer of wheat, and a layer of lime, alternately. Then pour in water, till it is all covered. Pickle for Beef and Pork.—The following recipe for making pickle for beef or pork is strongly recommended for the adoption of those who pickle beef and pork for family use. It is familiarly known by the name of *Knickerbocker Pickle*. Take six gallons water, 9 lbs. salting room, coarse and fine, 3 lbs. brown sugar, 3 ounces of saltpetres, 1 ounce pearl ash, 1 gallon of molasses to every six gallons of water.

A PERPETUAL WEATHER TABLE

By DOCTOR HERSCHEL.

The following table constructed by the celebrated Doctor Herschel upon a philosophical consideration of the attraction of the sun and moon in their several positions as to the earth, and confirmed by the experience of many years actual observation, may, without doubt suggest to the observer, what kind of weather will probably follow the moon's entrance into any one of her quarters, and so near the truth, that it will be very seldom found to fail.

From the above Table it will be seen that the nearer to either the moon's periodical changes (i. e. within two hours before or after it) the more fair the weather is in summer; and nearer to noon that the changes take place, the reverse is expected. Fair weather may also follow when either of the periodical changes occur during the afternoon six hours, viz. from ten, but this is mostly dependant on the wind.--The moon's entrance during all the hours after midnight except the two is unfavourable to fair weather. The like may nearly be observed in winter. Every farmer ought to preserve a copy of this table carefully to regulate his pursuits, by its indications. Such a conduct might materially promote his comforts and his success, while in no case would it disturb his prospects, or destroy his
