BACKGROUND OF STRIKE BROKEN

All the Vessels in Port are Being Very Successfully Worked Today by Outside Labor.

THE SITUATION TODAY. Seventy-five more men arrived today and went to work on the steamers. Both the C. P. R. and Donaldson people announce that they will have more men from Montreal here tomorrow.

Seventy-five more men arrived from Montreal at noon today to work on the steamers. All were safely put aboard the steamers Sicilian and Montezuma, not one deserting. The four winter steamers now in port are all being worked by outside labor, and according to those in authority the work is going along all right.

There were very few of the Longshoremen in St. John today. When the two gangs of men from Montreal arrived, the cold weather had evidently cooled their ardor, for only about 30 or 40 men were gathered about the cars when they were brought to a standstill at the depot. A few shouts and calls were heard from the men in the cars, as the windows had been secured, to guard against any getting out in that way.

SERIOUS LANDSLIDE OCCURRED IN WEST END EARLY TODAY

A big landslide occurred on Union St. at the head of Rodney slip, Carleton Place, this morning and caused much excitement in the west end. A large wooden building occupied by Israel E. Smith and owned by the city is a dangerous condition and another time may carry it away completely. There are large fissures in Union street between the building and the New Brunswick Southern station and there is much anxiety for the safety of the railway property.

DAVID RUSSELL'S OFFER.

Following here is a copy of a telegram sent by David Russell to Secretary Gillespie on Sunday night last:--

Montreal, November 26, 1905. W. J. Gillespie, Secretary Longshoremen's Association, St. John, N. B. It is generally admitted that the railway and steamship lines are sure to win out, and when they do your men will be at their mercy.

STUDENTS GO OUT ON STRIKE

TORONTO, Nov. 28.—(Special.)—The most serious combined lockout and strike in years is now in progress at the School of Theology in Toronto. Immediately upon the suspension of five students yesterday afternoon, the first and second years men met and passed resolutions to the effect that they would not attend lectures until the suspended men were allowed to return to the school.

PROMINENT MASON DEAD

OTTAWA, Nov. 28.—(Special.)—W. B. McArthur, a native of Carleton Place, died suddenly this morning. The deceased was apparently in the best of health. He was for many years a resident of Ottawa and for a time lived in Winnipeg. He was prominent in Masonic circles here and was an active member in the supreme council of the Scottish rite. He was 57 years old.

THEY NEED WORK

The following incident gives some indication of the feeling among some of the men in the Longshoremen's Association: A longshoreman called at the house of a well known citizen last evening and asked for some assistance. He had been standing here about a week, and was suffering from cold. He was with many other members of his association, who were willing and anxious to go to work at the old rate. It was the men at the head of the union with money and property behind them who were to go with them. It may be added that money was given him to assist him over the present crisis.

NO MYSTERY AT ALL. Some curiosity was aroused about town today by the sudden appearance and disappearance of persons whose actions seemed to indicate that they wished to see without being seen. There were many conjectures as to their identity. Some thought they were strike breakers. A policeman ventured the opinion that they were members of a band of thieves and burglars who were spying out the land. All these assumptions were entirely wrong. The persons mentioned were merely alert and business men, looking around to see whether it would be safe for them yet to come out and express an honest opinion on the strike question. Besides, after over a week's close confinement they needed a little fresh air.

Seventy-Five Good Men Arrived From Montreal Today and More are Coming Tomorrow.

A LONGSHOREMAN PROTESTS. Editor of the Times:—After considering and taking in the situation of the strike of the longshoremen, there are a number of men, yes, the majority of them, who think that the business was not done in the right way. I for one think that this business should have been done a month ago. They should have sent a delegation to Montreal and had an understanding with the steamboat people, and come back and reported to the Union and everything would have been all right today.

NEWS FROM FREDERICTON

FREDERICTON N. B., Nov. 28.—(Special.)—A wedding which has been looked forward to with great interest will take place in the Methodist church at 2:45 o'clock tomorrow afternoon, when Miss Sadie Thompson, second daughter of Senator Thompson, will be led to the altar by H. E. Levy Shaw, secretary of the Imperial Insurance Company, of Montreal. Rev. T. B. Blair, of St. John, will be the best man and the bride will be attended by her sister, Miss Nan Thompson and her cousin, Miss Laura Snowball. The young couple will leave by the evening train for New York.

MISS FAWCETT DIED TODAY

SACKVILLE, N.B., Nov. 28.—(Special.)—Charlotte Fawcett of Upper Sackville, who attempted to commit suicide last Friday night by shooting herself through the breast, died of her injuries at nine o'clock last night. The funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon. The deceased was a daughter of Wm. B. Fawcett, a prominent farmer.

WANT EIGHTY CENT GAS

NEW-YORK, Nov. 27.—The effort to reduce the price of gas in New York city was begun today before the recently appointed state commission of gas. The petition signed by one hundred citizens before the commission requesting a reduction of the price of gas from the present rate of 84 cents per thousand feet to 82 cents.

FAMOUS OLD HOTEL AT DALHOUSIE, N. B. BURNED TO GROUND

MONCTON, N.B., Nov. 28.—(Special.)—Murphy's well known hotel at Dalhousie, was destroyed by fire between two and three o'clock this morning. It is supposed that the fire originated from a gas jet, and when it was noticed, the inmates of the house had just time to save themselves. The few boarders who happened to be at the hotel lost nearly all their clothing, and very little of the contents of the hotel was saved. The barn and outbuildings also went, but the horses were saved. The total loss is about \$12,000, partially insured. Thomas Murphy, the proprietor, is in the woods hunting, and it is not known whether he will rebuild. The impression is that he will not, and that a joint stock company may be formed in Dalhousie to erect a modern hotel that would carry on business the whole year and also cater to tourists.

KIERSHANOFF, Russia, Nov. 28.—The Agrarian demonstrators here have ceased and the peasants are returning the property appropriated by them. Many of the leaders of the peasants have been arrested. Horrible Outrages. BRISTOL, Va., Nov. 27.—At a mass meeting of citizens held here tonight at the Opera House to protest against the massacre of the Jews in Russia, a letter received by Abraham McFar, a prominent Jewish merchant of this city, from a brother in Odessa, was read. It is dated Odessa, October 24, and is in part as follows: "Oh God, what I saw on that street makes me shudder."





The town owns and operates its own gas and electric system, and the statement of account for the year ended September 30th, shows that after deducting \$2,440 for depreciation on plant, paying for all other expenses, the profits were \$8,508, making a total of \$23,288 to credit the profit and loss account. Of this \$23,288, the sum of \$23,288 has been applied to reducing the debt. The showing is one which, as the town auditor points out, "speaks well for the management of the department."

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ARRESTING CONSUMPTION Successful Open Air Treatment in England.

The open air treatment for consumptives has been established at Nottingham, England, with successful results, according to United States Consul Mahan, of that district, who reports to the state department that three years ago a sanatorium was established in that country on elevated ground, with southern aspect, at the edge of a forest.

About 200 patients have passed through the Nottingham sanatorium since it was founded. Of these the disease was arrested in about 25 per cent, great improvement was reported in 50 per cent, and some improvement in 25 per cent; "stationary" was reported for 10 per cent, while the remainder grew worse.

The sanatorium is a long one-story frame building with a central part of two stories, a roofed veranda, facing southward extends the full length of the one-story wings. Extensions can be made as desired.

LOOKS BAD FOR DR. McLEOD
Crawford and Howard Turn State's Evidence in Dress Suit Case Trial—Crawford Swears McLeod Dismembered Susan Geary's Body.

Boston, Nov. 27—(Special)—Judge Stevens and a jury started, this morning, upon the formal judicial inquiry into the death of Susan Agnes Geary, the victim of the so-called "dress suit case mystery" for the purpose of placing the responsibility thereon, and made such rapid progress in the investigation that, before the day's work ended, a jury had been impaneled, two of the three defendants at the bar, Louis W. Crawford and William E. Hunt, alias Howard, had pleaded guilty to being accessories after the fact, and Dr. Percy D. McLeod, formerly of Kings county (N. B.), was the sole defendant at the bar.

Dr. McLeod is also charged with being an accessory, the principal in the case, according to the indictment, being Mary S. Dean, alias Dana, alias Gillespie, who has not yet been apprehended. Dr. McLeod is represented by Valere Lussier & Mansfield who defended Charles L. Tucker at his murder trial.

Dr. McLeod, being out on bail, had a seat outside the bar enclosure, and near him sat his wife, who came into court with him. Before adjournment was taken for the day, twenty-five witnesses had been examined. Among these were Crawford, one of the defendants, and Dr. McLeod, who was delivered to him at 88 Windup street, where the girl died, the suit cases containing her dismembered body.

ST. JOHN VERY WELL EQUIPPED
Dr. Bryce Says Immigration Building Here is Best in the Service.

Dr. P. H. Bryce, immigration inspector for the eastern ports, was in the city yesterday to inspect the immigration station here. Dr. Bryce has just returned from a tour of inspection at Montreal, Quebec and Halifax. He says that in the immigration season just closed at Quebec there was an increase of 15,000 immigrants over any previous year. Of these only some 15,000 were destined for the United States, the number who arrived at Quebec 1,300 were detained on account of sickness and the majority of these were deported.

During the summer steamer have arrived occasionally at Halifax and until the year ended June 30, 31,000 immigrants arrived there, of which several hundred were detained on account of sickness. At St. John during the year ended June 30, 11,000 immigrants arrived. This season immigration business, he said, has begun with two ships loaded with immigrants for St. John—one of the Allan line steamers with eighty and a C. P. R. steamer with 300 immigrants. The immigration hospital here has begun its work and Dr. Bryce said that he thought it was doing excellent work and is sufficiently large for the immigration business and that the immigration building here was the best of its kind in the service.

Dr. Bryce also visited detention stations now placed at Vancouver for the steamers that cross the Pacific and also at Victoria and that detention stations are being placed in Montreal, New Westminster and numerous other cities.

In concluding his conversation, Dr. Bryce said that the class of immigrants were very much improved and that out of the number of immigrants who arrived last year there were 45,000 Englishmen.

FATAL ACCIDENT

Halifax, Dec. 27—(Special)—A sad accident occurred at the works of the Nova Scotia Steel Company, at New Glasgow, this morning, by which Daniel McRae lost his life. He was employed making repairs to a iron bridge at the abutment and was kneeling down under it when by some accident a train of buggies were started down the track towards the one upon which he was working. McRae did not notice them approach and his head was caught between colliding buggies and he was instantly killed. He was about fifty years old, highly respected and leaves a wife and small children.

THE BREACH WIDENS

Sir Edward Grey Repudiates Leader of British Liberal Party on Home Rule Question.

London, Nov. 27—Lord Rosebery's emphatic repudiation, in his speech at Bolton, Cornwall, of the home rule policy of Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, leader of the Liberal party, as outlined by that statesman when speaking at Stirling (Scotland), Nov. 22, which seems to have widened the breach in the party at the moment when a dissolution of parliament is threatened owing to the split in the Unionist party over the fiscal question, is the latest session in the political circles of the United Kingdom.

Sir Edward Grey, who was under Secretary for foreign affairs in the Liberal administration of 1890, speaking at Newcastle tonight attempted to dissipate the wide-spread impression that the positions taken by Lord Rosebery and Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman are irreconcilable. He said he thought Lord Rosebery had put a wrong meaning on Sir Henry's speech at Stirling and that undoubtedly an explanation from the latter would prove there had been a misunderstanding.

Sir Edward said the policy of the Liberal government should be along the lines followed by Premier Balfour, George Wyndham, former chief secretary for Ireland, and Sir Anthony F. MacDonnell, under secretary to the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, in giving Ireland the widest possible scope for the development of her local institutions. He declared, however, that he distinctly repudiated the idea of home rule for Ireland as part of the Liberal policy.

Austen Chamberlain, chancellor of the exchequer, speaking at Redditch tonight, said that the crisis in the cabinet existed solely in the imagination of the newspapers.

QUARTERS FOR SALVAGE CORPS

Enlargement and Improvement of No. 3 Engine House Considered by Safety Board—The Question of a Place for the Lunch Wagon.

Improvements in the quarters of No. 1 salvage corps were discussed by the safety board yesterday on the report of a committee recommending certain changes in No. 3 engine house. A written report embodying the proposed alterations was ordered. The case of the lunch wagon came up on application of the proprietor for leave to use North or South Market streets. No action was taken. A report on the cost of a public lavatory in the vicinity of the Market Street building was presented by J. L. Gallivan. He recommended as permanent drivers in the fire department, in the absence of Ald. MacRae, Ald. Bullock, Lewis, Sprout, older, Hamm and MacRae were present with the director, Chief Kerr and common clerk.

A tender from D. B. Pidgeon to supply thirteen police overcoats at \$25 was accepted. This was the only tender received and on motion of Ald. Holder it was recommended accepted.

The director mentioned he would require an additional coat making fourteen in all.

Ald. Holder reported for the sub-committee appointed to secure suitable quarters for No. 1 salvage corps. He said they examined No. 3 engine house and with certain alterations recommended the upper floor for the corps. There was a suggestion at the back of the building, and it was said, to the vibration of the engines and the committee, after consultation with the building inspector, advised that six columns be added at a cost of \$200 or \$300. With regard to the salvage corps, Ald. Bullock has prepared plans of alterations which answered the purpose and gave if anything better accommodations to the firemen. A plan for drying the covers was provided in the barn, to which an extra story would be added. The estimated cost was \$1,200.

The matter was left on the table for the attendance of the building inspector who, however, failed to appear. When the subject was again taken up Ald. MacRae moved that the columns and repairs be proceeded with.

The director, in reply to a question, said he did not think the repairs were necessary before the spring.

Ald. MacRae therefore withdrew his motion until the building inspector had been heard from.

Chief Kerr said he did not believe the vibration of the engine had caused any damage.

On motion of Ald. Bullock a written report on the present condition of No. 3 including the proposed changes was ordered.

The city engineer submitted a plan for lavatories for men and women for \$1,000, including lighting and painting.

Ald. Sprout moved the work be proceeded with.

Ald. Hamm urged that a caretaker work be necessary, at considerable extra expense.

Ald. Bullock favored a public lavatory under South Market street to be available when the market was closed.
