TORONTO, July 14 (Special)--The Ontario cabinet has decided that the four normal schools for which provision was made at the last session of the legislature should be located at Peterboro, Hamilton, Stratford and North Bay, conditional in each case upon a proper site being situated by the municipality.

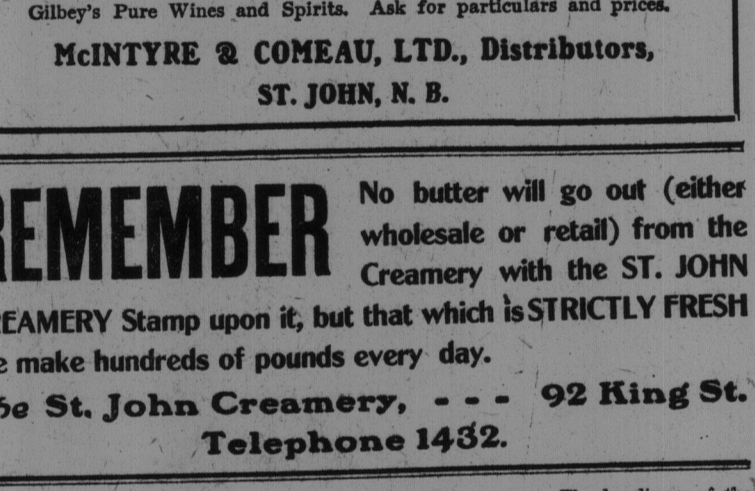

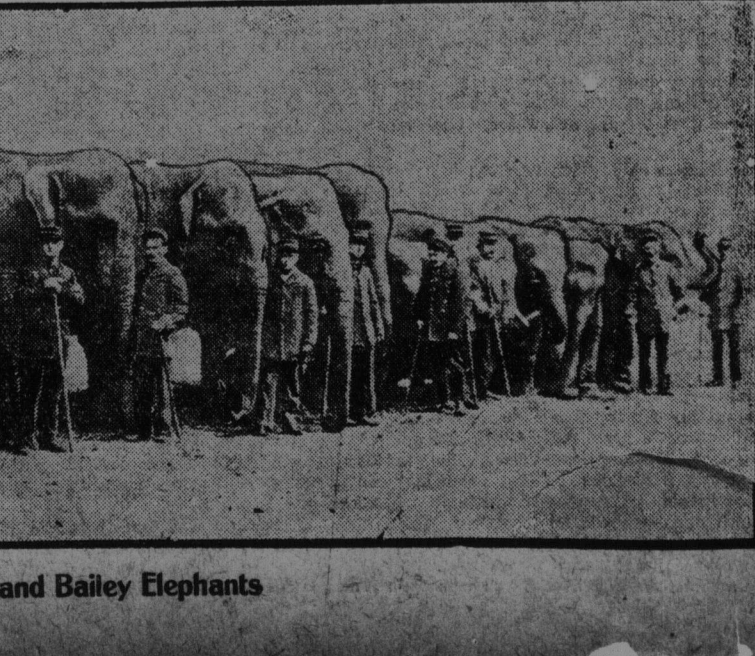

CITY IMPROVEMENTS

No concerted effort is made in St. John by private citizens to improve the appearance of the city. There may be individual efforts, but the people do not get together and discuss plans to make the city more beautiful. All such matters are left to the city officials. This is to be regretted.

IN RUSSIA

Regarding the demand of the peasant members of the Russian Duma for a distribution of the crown and church lands and landlords' estates, the New York Journal of Commerce says: "To appreciate the intensity of the interest which the peasant deputy carries with him to the Duma in regard to the land problem, it must be remembered that the condition of the peasantry throughout the empire has already reached a point where it is unbearable."

Atlantic Fish Companies Take Over Whitman Business. A Halifax despatch says:—The Atlantic Fish Companies have purchased a controlling interest in the fish business of A. N. Whitman & Son, Carleton Place, N. S., and have organized a new concern to be known as the Whitman Fish Co., which will continue the business carried on by Whitman & Son during the past.

among the peasants is given in a recent St. Petersburg cable: "A correspondent of the Associated Press has just completed a tour of the Provinces of Samara and Saratov. He reports that the drought is finally broken, but the rains have come too late to save the crop and help the peasants, who are in a pitiable condition. Their cattle have either been sold or are starving in the fields. The government relief granaries were completely emptied during last year's famine. The present agrarian disorders, which can be expected steadily to grow worse, are due largely to the necessity of the peasants seizing food and forage to preserve their lives and save from starvation the remainder of their cattle. These disorders have reached the highest pitch in the province of Voronezh, where the troops and Cossacks, although in considerable force, are practically helpless and on the defensive. Many peasants have been killed or wounded in desperate attacks on the military patrols and the rural guards."

THE YACHTSMEN

Today the fleet of the R. K. Y. Club will set out on its annual cruise on the St. John river and tributary lakes. Many will almost envy the yachtsmen their eight days of pleasure sojourn, and wish that it were possible for them also to lay aside their work and their cares, to get close to nature in her charming moods along the peerless river.

The St. John river and its lake system afford cruising waters of unrivalled beauty, and it seldom happens that there is not breeze enough for the sailing yachts to make way. Should the wind fall for a time, there are the steam yachts and the tow line.

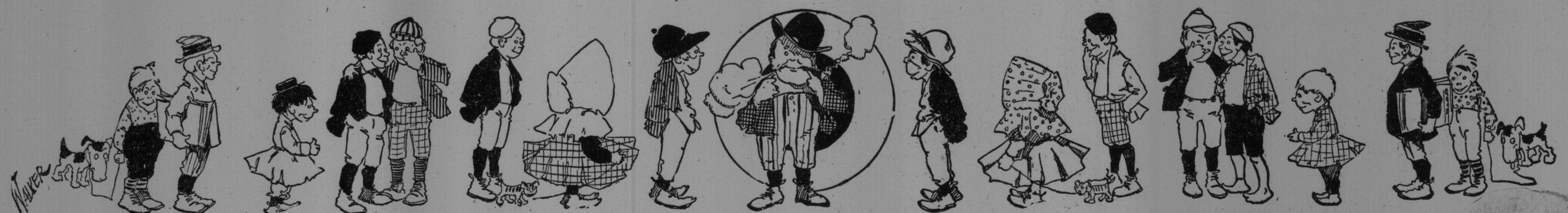
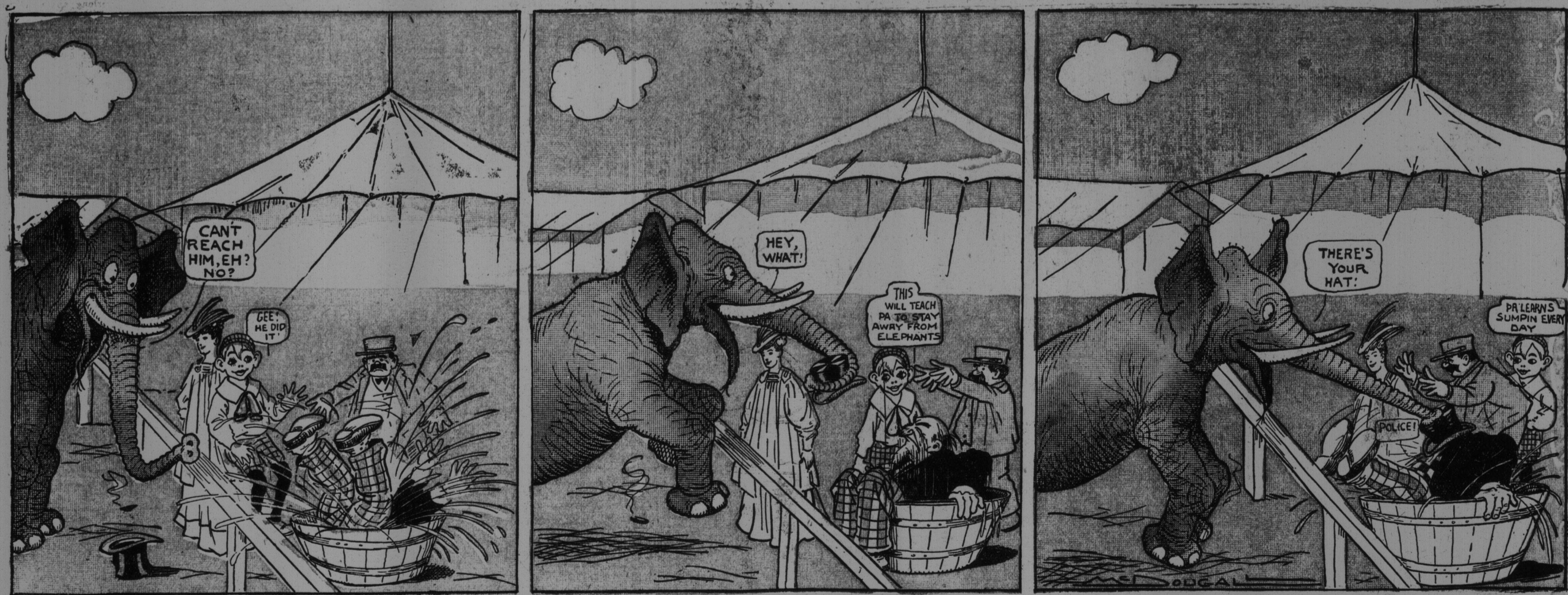

In the World of Labor.

India has no labor unions. The immigration into Cuba during 1905 was 54,219 persons. Of these, 47,902 came from Spain, and only 1,861 from North America.

The United Garment Workers of America have won their strike against the J. Eisner Co. at Brownville, N. Y., which has been on for four months. Eight hundred men have returned to work under union rules.

The New Zealand conference of Trades and Labor Councils has resolved that the police on Chinamen be increased to 8000 a head.

Keir Hardie, the English labor leader, is organizing an Agricultural Labor League on the lines of the National Agricultural Union founded by Joseph Arch in 1872.

In a sweeping injunction Judge J. V. Quarles of Milwaukee, Wis. has enjoined four judges of the Iron Molders' Union and sixty one individual members from interfering in any way with the employees.

Incomplete official returns in connection with the New South Wales Arbitration Act for this year show that the number of unions registered increased by 1,615, and the total number of unions registered was 140.

The Iron Molders' Union of North America gained 4611 members last year. A German investigator has been examining the relation between the prevailing rate of wages in various sections of the country and the amount of crime since 1870. He has reached some very important conclusions, which are published in the Berlin Neue Zeit.

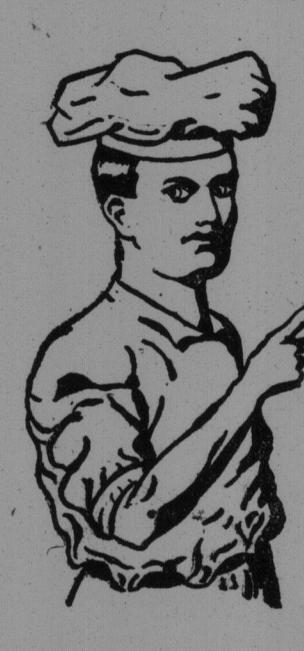

BEULAH HAS A BUILDING BOOM

Pretty River Resort has Grown Greatly in Last Year.

Probably no suburban resort has enjoyed more rapid growth in point of popularity than has Beulah-on-the-St. John—hereabouts known as Brown's Flats. Many pretty cottages have been erected there within the past year or two, and city folk who summer at the picturesque suburb are unanimous in proclaiming it to be an ideal spot in which to spend the vacation season.
Charles G. Brown, of the west end, has purchased a summer house on what is being known as River avenue. The property is being renovated and put in first class shape, and when completed will rank among the prettiest villas at Beulah-on-the-St. John.
Mr. and Mrs. F. S. Thomas and their family are spending the summer months at their beautiful villa, which bears the name of "Bele-a-see."
R. A. Sinclair is at "Rose Haven" and among the other residents are Thomas Gushinski, Brazilian Vanward, Samuel Bell and C. Jarvis Worden.
The Rockdale Hotel, mounted high on the hillside, and commanding a splendid view of the river and surrounding country, offers hospitality to the visiting tourist, or to tourists who have not yet been so fortunate as to secure summer cottages.
F. S. Thomas, chatting with a Times reporter, said, "Beulah-on-the-St. John is, in my opinion, one of the prettiest places along the river St. John. It seems to me that the river steamers have three passengers there to every one they set off at most of the other stopping places. It may be well to mention that among other advantages we are blessed with an abundant supply of cool, sparkling spring water."
"As to pastimes," continued Mr. Thomas, "we while away the hours with fishing, rowing, visiting and long, delightful drives, but, like the feathered tribes of the woodlands, we retire early."
"Now that the camp-meetings are about over, social events will be more numerous than heretofore, and parties and ice-cream socials will be the order of the day."
"I must not forget," Mr. Thomas went on to say, "that our summer folk would rejoice to see a new wharf at Beulah-on-the-St. John, as landing is not always very desirable under existing conditions. On the 24th of May fifteen boat-loads of people had to be taken from the steamer as the wharf was under water, and much time might have been saved had it been possible to make a direct shore landing."
Mr. Thomas expressed the hope that it would not be long before an effort would be made in the direction of procuring a suitable wharf.

BIG LAND PURCHASE BY RAILWAY CO.

Grand Trunk Pacific Has Nearly a Thousand Acres Adjoining Saskatoon.

SASKATOON, July 7.—(Special).—It has leaked out here that the Grand Trunk Pacific has secured 900 acres of land on the Nisus side of the river, adjoining the town site, and there are many rumors as to the outcome.
"There has been much speculation going on lately as to who owned this property, and now that it is known to belong to the transcontinental railway company many interesting developments are looked for in the very near future."
The majority of the property is within the mile and a half circle from the site of the new post-office, and it is much desired by the city that that purchased by the same company as Edmonton.
The people of Saskatoon are jubilant over the prospects. It is also believed here that the C. N. R. will get control of the Qu'Appelle and Long Lake road, and with three transcontinental lines all running into the city within a radius of two miles, Saskatoon is expected to get forward with a rush.
A number of local investors have been fortunate in securing land adjoining the above mentioned property. The purchase through the Northwestern Land and Investment Co., Canada Life Building, city, will help, and intending buyers will find it to their advantage to secure building lots now, before another advance takes place. Terms of payment can be arranged if required on the monthly plan, \$10 down and \$5 per month.
