Workmen Seized and Transported to Germany, Says Polish Mem ber of Reichstag


Paris, Dec. 11.—Evidence that the inhabitants of Russian Poland have been subjected to a policy of forced labor and deportation similar to that invoked against the Belgians is contained in a speech recently reflivered in the Reichstag by a Polish deputy, Tronpezynski, which, with the debate to which it gave rise, was suppressed by the German censorship. It was published, however, in the Polish newspaper, Dzienik Poznanski, from which the following extracts are taken:

HAD BOILS Giant Guns Roar in Thick Fog

Persistently Shelled Through the Mist

War Zone is Drab World-Fireing Done Largely by What is Termed "Dead Reckoning"-With the Army on Western

With the British Army in France, Dec. 4—Winter, cold, grey and bleak, has held the western battlefronts in its icy grasp for more than a week now and has temporarily checked any attempt on either side at operations on a large scale. There has been the usual daily 'strafing' or exchange of artillery fire, but the shelling has been largely done by what mariners would call "dead reckoning."

Low hanging, damp, leaden skies have shrouded the land in gloomy darkness, and observation has been almost wholly impossible. For seven days there has been a thick mist, while on two occasions the war zone has been completely curtained in by a mantle of heavy fog. But through this grey murk the guns kept hammering away—firing at the unseen enemy—harassing post roads and railheads or any other "registered" place, where he was likely to be busy with the multitudinous affairs of war behind the lines.

Battle in the Fog.

A battle in the fog—and nearly every detached engagement in this struggle on the Somme could be classed as a battle by ordinary standards—is a weirdly mysterious and uncanny affair. A roar, a flash of red flame and out into the leaden mist shricks a shell on its well intended mission of death and destruction

"This is where it should fall," remarks the gunner, as he points to a map with a pair of compasses. "We will put another just over here," and bang goes the gun again. In the deepness of the fog the battery seems to shoot into a little drab world all its own.

Germans, however, have been bombarding one of their recently lost positions. It is a favorite occupation of the Citman gunners—this shelling of a position they know so well, after they have been driven from it. And such "strafing" calls for a reply, even if the enveloping fog permits one to see scarce-it ybeyond the grim muzzle of the giant gun itself.





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
