FREDERICTON, Sept. 18—With a banking career extending over a period of 41 years, during 14 of which he has been manager of the Fredericton branch of the Royal Bank of Canada, George A. Taylor has received notice of superannuation, and will retire at the end of the present month. His successor is H. S. Murray, a native of Sussex, who arrived here yesterday from Calgary. Having served as teller some years ago in the local branch of the Royal Bank, Mr. Murray does not come here a stranger.

Mr. Taylor entered the employ of the old Merchants' Bank of Halifax (now the Royal Bank of Canada) in 1884. After serving a lengthy apprenticeship at Halifax, he was appointed manager of the branch at Woodstock, remaining there several years. From Woodstock he was sent to Victoria, B. 



LONDON, Sept. 18.—The borough surveyor of Northwich, Cheshire, has reported to the town council the completion of the lifting of the centre of the town an average of five feet, an operation which has taken three years. Shell is Erected in 30 Hours Approved by Ministry of Health.
