



Paris, April 29.—(A. P., by mail.)—Charges that the French government usually suffers a loss in its business ventures were made in recent debates in parliament. It was asserted that the government's operation of the state railroad, post office, telephone and telegraph lines, the gasoline monopoly and its sales of American and French supplies left over from the war, were all unbusiness-like, and the cause of heavy balances on the wrong side of the ledger. The state railroad's estimated deficit for 1921 is given in the budget as the equivalent of \$59,450,000. "Every time the state railway received 100 francs," says the senate public works commission, "the taxpayer must take fifty-seven francs out of his pocket to balance the railroad's accounts."
