German Retreat General on All Three Faces of Marne Salient

Allies Driving Germans Back And Are Pressing Close on Their Heels

Complete Collapse of German **Defensive in The Marne Salient**

Reports of Captured Towns Come In With Almost Monotonous Regularity-Allies Pushing in Both Flanks of Soissons-Rheims Salient-Enemy Taken By Surprise and Plans Rudely Upset as Allies Sweep Forward Victoriously

London, Aug. 3—The German retreat is general on all the three faces of the salient conquered by the Germans in May, and the Allies are pressing close on the heels of the re-

treating enemy, says Reuter's correspondent at French head-quarters, telegraphing at eleven o'clock Friday night.

With the French Army in France, Aug. 2—(By the Associated Press, 11.30 p.m.)—Soissons has been retaken and the valley of the Crise has been crossed.

The Allied line this evening runs from Pommiers to Soissons, thence to Belleau, the valley of the Crise, Chacrise and Arcy St. Restitute, through the centre of the forest of Nesles to the village of the same name, and through the centre of the forest of Rheims to Lagery, Lhery and Tramoy. North of the last named three places, French cavalry has advanced about another mile to the Bois Le Merne and Treslon. Bruillet is still in the enemy's hands, in flames, and further east, near Rheims, Thillois has been retaken. The day was one of continued success for the armies of General Mangin, Degoutte and Bertheleo. All along the line the Germans have been forced to hurry their retreat on the west and centre of the salient. The enemy is completely devastating the country as he retires, carrying out the German settled policy.

The French are now on the edge of the plateau between the Crise and Vesle, after an advance which at some places was three miles does within seven miles of Figures. The

Washington, Aug. 3—Recruiting of unskilled labor was taken over by the federal government Thursday as a war measure under an agency of the department of labor designated as the United States employment service. Shortages of unskilled labor reported from many sections of the country are expected to be alleviated by the plan put into operation Thursday whereby non-essential industries will be required to contribute certain quotas of labor for the industries engaged in war work.








A mid-summer scene on a typical Ontario farm.

Farther north the British troops crossed the Soissons-Chateau Thierry road and, pressing through the Concrois Wood, were soon more than a mile east of Ville-Montoire."

Allied Forces Send Germans Reeling Backwards From The Line In Precipitate Retreat

The crisis in the Allied offensive on the Soissons-Rheims salient apparently has been reached. French troops have entered the town of Soissons, the western anchor point of what remains of the famous salient, and all along the thirty-six miles of curving battle line from Soissons to Thillois, which lies about three miles west of Rheims, French, American and British troops have pushed in the entire enemy front and sent the Germans reeling backwards everywhere in precipitate retreat.

Over the battle front the Allies by quick and forcible methods of onslaught have deeply indented the German

defence line for splendid gains, which seemingly foreshadow the necessity of eventual retirement of the forces of the German Crown Prince to more tenable grounds in the north,

The plains behind the northwestern portion of the battle front now are entirely dominated by the Allied big guns; in the south the French and Americans have negotiated almost all the hill and forest country and are encroaching perceptibly toward the Fismes railway, while on the east the British and French are almost astride the Rheimsons railway and have their guns now s oplaced that the enemy is sure to be sorely tried as he endeavors to press back and gain a haven of refuge along the Vesle River. RETIREMENT MAY GO NORTH TO AISNE

Just how far the retreat of the Germans will go cannot at present be forecast, but with the southern line swingthward in conjunction with that on the east toward the Vesle, and with the French dominating the Aisne eastward from Soissons, it is not improbable that the Germans may be compelled to take refuge north of the Aisne. Numerous towns and hamlets have been captured by the Allied troops during the latest fighting, and at some they have advanced from two to three miles. South of Soissons the entire Crise River has been forded by the

Allied troops. Northeast of Fere-En-Tardenois the Allied line has been pushed well to the west of the region of Grand Rozoy and the town of Saponay has been taken. In the centre the Nesles Wood is being swept clean of Germans by the French cavalry and American and French troops are pressing the Germans hard north of Sergy and the hamlet of Farther eastward, almost to the gates of Rheims, combined forces of British and French everywhere are sorely harassing the enemy. In this latter region, in addition to Thillois, the village of Ville-En-Tardenois is in Allied hands and the French now are on the heels of the Germans two and a half miles north of the Dormans-Rheims high road over

Altogether, viewed from the war maps, the situation for the Allied troops at present is a most promising one for plete success in ridding the Soissons-Rheims salient entirely of the enemy.

GERMANS NOT SHOWING SAME STAMINA

Throughout the latter phases of the battles the Germans have not shown their stamina of previous days, and at virtually no opposition being imposed.

All behind the battle line the smoke of burning towns is visible, which seemingly would give weight to the pre-

vailing belief in the Allied capitals that the Germans at present are nowhere near the end of their retreat. Aside from the Soissons-Rheims salient there has been little fighting in any of the war theatres. The British are continuing their raids on the Germans in France and Flanders, and the Germans at last accounts were heavily be ing the British south of the Somme and near Ypres.





Canada entered the war with a regular army of 3,000 men. At the beginning of last month she had sent overseas 390,000 while there were being trained 60,000 in the country. 43,000 have been killed; 113,007 have appeared in casualty lists as wounded or sick, 2,224 are prisoners of war and 384 are set down as missing. Of the wounded, between 30,000 and 40,000 have been sent back to Canada certified unfit for further service, 10,000 soldiers have received distinctions of one kind or another, of whom there are thirty with the Victoria Cross.

Harden in the latest issue of Zukunft, tells a few bitter truths to Hertling and to Germany generally. The famous editor flatly accused the chancellor of lying when he said that Bulfour and President Wilson showed they were bent on annihilating the German people. He publishes a translation of their last speeches, and says: "Where on earth can one find a trace of our enemy's will to destroy us? On the contrary President Wilson has always been most fair to the German government. Balfour, in his latest Belgian speech, termed Hertling's offer an insult: Why, because he called Germany's violation of Belgium neutrality a crime. Bismarck used the same word when Louis Napoleon only planned the same violation, but what about Count Hertlings accusing the Eentente without a shadow of proof of murdering Count Mirbach? Where then is the insult?"
