





Allied Forces Send Germans Reeling Backwards From The Line In Precipitate Retreat

(Undated War Lead by The Associated Press.) The crisis in the Allied offensive on the Soissons-Rheims salient apparently has been reached. French troops have entered the town of Soissons, the western anchor point of what remains of the famous salient...

Just how far the retreat of the Germans will go cannot at present be forecast, but with the southern line swinging northward in conjunction with that on the east toward the Vesle, and with the French dominating the Aisne eastward from Soissons, it is not improbable that the Germans may be compelled to take refuge north of the Aisne.

Throughout the latter phases of the battles the Germans have not shown their stamina of previous days, and at some points the Allied troops, particularly the Americans, were able to make their way into German positions with virtually no opposition being imposed.

AGREE ON U. S. AUTO TAX

A federal graduated excise tax on the use of automobiles, running from \$10 a year on cars originally retailed at \$500, to a \$60 tax on \$8,000 cars, and \$20 additional for each \$500 above \$3,000, was agreed to Wednesday by the ways and means committee at Washington.

tax on used cars is based on the original retail listed price of the cars, regardless of the year of manufacture. The committee also agreed to a tax of two cents per gallon on the production of gasoline and a federal excise tax of \$5 a year on the use of motorcycles.

NEWS OF VICTORY.

"French troops have entered Soissons." This brief sentence flashed over the cable last night brought the most heartening news of the week. It meant that one of the German anchor points of the Marne salient had given way before the tremendous pressure of the Allies, and that the enemy must now retreat more hastily.

THE STANDARD'S IDOLS.

The Standard gleefully publishes this from the Woodstock Press: "To be a whole of a fellow with the (Liberal) party as a whole all that was necessary was to invent some crime against the wicked Tories of Carleton. The log stealing charges, the patriotic potato charges, the Indian Reserve charges, the Valley Railway charges, etc., followed in rapid succession. The thicker the charges came, the larger grew the majorities of Hon. Mr. Fleming and Hon. Mr. Smith."

The confidence of the Allies in Gen. Foch has not been misplaced. Patiently, no doubt often with bitter discontent, but knowing it to be the right course to pursue, he has bided his time until his reserves had reached a point where he could afford to strike back and follow up the advantage. If he has surprised his friends what must be the feeling at German headquarters when they see their armies in retreat instead of advancing toward Paris?

Ottawa Journal-Press: Only those who grow their own fruit or who can conveniently gather wild fruit or who are rich enough to disregard cost can give much heed to the advice of the Food Board to preserve fruit extensively now so that it may take the place of butter next winter. Prices are too high. Strawberries remained expensive throughout the season. Raspberries are now in and very high. Can the war be blamed for such extraordinary prices for fruit?

THE STUDY OF COMMERCE. Bradstreet's is much interested in a recent speech by Mr. Balfour on commerce as a university study. The commercial journal regards it as a striking fact that a man who received the traditional education of a future English statesman, and one who "not only reached the highest posts in the public service of his country, but also earned distinction as a writer on philosophic subjects unconnected with politics should lend his powerful advocacy to a proposal to institute a special study of commerce, leading to degrees therein, in London University."

The Foster government is proceeding steadily with its policy to conserve our forest wealth and make the crown timber lands a more profitable source of revenue. In this the government will have the co-operation of the lumbermen, for they also have a large interest in saving the forests from destruction. The Valley Railway will cost about \$7,000,000. A lot of this was wasted. The people know where at least one-quarter of a million went, and the government wants it back.

By their conduct last night a mob of returned soldiers in Toronto put themselves in a class that disgraces any city. They of all men should be upholders of law and order. The British destroyed seventy German airplanes last week and sent eleven down out of control. That is a fine record. The great offensive of the German Crown Prince has completely collapsed. Willie is running away. The Germans are burning towns and villages as they retreat from the Marne salient. The Hun is always a Hun. Gen. Mangin is another commander who is making a brilliant record in the war. The Kaiser's men who went "forward with God" are now going backward "as if the devil was after them."

WHAT CANADA HAS DONE IN FOUR YEARS

Ottawa, Aug. 2—Canada's achievements in the four years of the war are reviewed in a statement given out tonight by the director of public information. Canada entered the war with a regular army of 5,000 men. At the beginning of last month she had sent overseas 890,000 while there were being trained 60,000 in the country. 48,000 have been killed; 118,000 have appeared in casualty lists as wounded or sick, 2,224 are prisoners of war and 384 are set down as missing. Of the wounded, between 80,000 and 40,000 have returned to duty and 50,000 have been sent back to Canada certified unfit for further service, 10,000 soldiers have received distinctions of one kind or another of whom there are thirty with the Victoria Cross.

We have taken up again our policy of continually worrying the Boche, and we have put on quite a number of raids with success. We have taken a number of prisoners and machine guns and have killed quite a lot of Germans. So active have we been that the Boche has considerably reinforced his line opposite to us, so that if we are not actively feeling we are keeping a fair share of his men from taking part in the battle. Prisoners tell us that they suffered quite a lot from our fire and are moving their line somewhat."

EXPERTS TALK TO THE LADIES

Demonstrations Yesterday on Use of Brown Sugar, Fireless Cookers, Milk and Other Matters in Calvin Hall

Talks by experts on the how and why of using brown sugar, the cash and carry system of selling groceries and the value of milk as a food for children and demonstrations of a fireless cooker, the manufacture of cottage cheese and a new and most economical method of canning fruit, all these were on the programme provided by the Housewives' League yesterday afternoon in Calvin Hall.

Mrs. Richard Hooper, who with Mrs. W. E. Raymond is responsible for the carrying out of the demonstrations explained and demonstrated the new fireless cooker which can be made by any housewife or any moderately handy person by using an old packing case, filling it with excelsior or other insulating material and placing linoleum round the pot or pan in which the food is cooked. The fireless cooker is to be on view at the Hall and the chart of times for the cooking of different dishes to be found on the wall.

Mrs. W. R. Raymond described graphically the value of milk as a diet for children and made a strong plea that children should be given plenty of milk and butter. She spoke in a very interesting way and her hearers were made to realize the seriousness of the subject of which she spoke.

James Jeffrey, who has for the past six months carried on with unqualified success a cash and carry grocery business in the city had been asked to address the League and he said the merits of his new system of doing business appeared to him to be that he had no bad debts and no expense connected with his goods, and this expense included breakage in delivery.

That the cash and carry system was profitable to him he had proved conclusively in six months as his present trade was now four times what it had been. From the point of view of the purchaser there seemed to be some doubt as to whether it would always be convenient to carry bulky parcels, but it was agreed that the lower prices at which a cash and carry business could afford to sell were very attractive to all housekeepers.

L. J. Seidensticker, manager of the Atlantic Square Refineries, brought to the meeting samples of the three grades of soft or brown sugar which are manufactured at the Refineries. He explained the process of refining and said that by

making more brown sugar the total quantity of refined sugar obtained from a given amount of raw sugar was increased from 93 to 98 per cent. of the raw sugar used and thus the total yield of sugar was stretched. The darker grades of sugar he recommended for use where the cane flavor would not detract from the flavor of the product it was added to, but for delicately flavored dishes he advised the use of the lightest grade of soft sugar or granulated sugar. For keeping soft sugar in good condition Mr. Seidensticker recommended that it be placed in an earthenware crock and if necessary kept moist by placing a damp cloth over it.

Yesterday's meeting was the second public demonstration held in the Calvin Hall since it was opened as the headquarters of the Housewives' League, and every item of the carefully thought-out programme was appreciated by the audience. The hall itself has been hung with charts and posters that contain information on knotty problems with which the war-time housekeeper is faced and the League is to be congratulated on the splendid use which it is making of its headquarters.

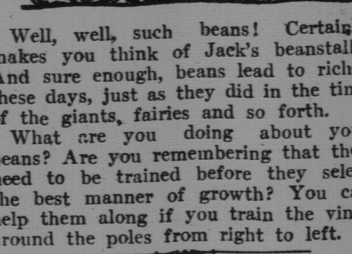

The Germans still allow food that is sent to Belgium to be distributed there in order to save themselves the expense and trouble of feeding their captives.

Housing for 1,500 Men

At Thursday's meeting of the Halifax board of control there was read a letter from the Bedford Construction Company stating that in connection with the new shipbuilding plant, it would be necessary to provide housing accommodation for from 1,000 to 1,500 men, and as there was not at present accommodation available in the city, the company asked permission to use for a year part of Mulgrave Park for temporary housing for employees or contractors. The place would be kept clean, and returned in as good condition as at present, any buildings erected to be removed. The application was granted.

G. W. V. A. Split May Be Healed

Negotiations in Progress—To Meet Next Year on Pacific Coast—"O Canada" To Be More Prominent Toronto, Aug. 2.—W. J. Dyson, of Calgary, delegate to the G. W. V. A. convention headed a peace deputation which waited on Lieut.-Colonel Pidgeon, of Ottawa, and Delegate Maxwell, of Winnipeg, at the Carle-Rite Hotel this morning, when after a three hour discussion the delegates who withdrew from the convention agreed to re-open diplomatic relations with the dominion government. A statement embodying the conditions on which they are prepared to resume attendance at the convention was drawn up and came before the convention this afternoon.

On Pacific Coast Toronto, Aug. 2.—Decision was made today that the next year's meeting of the Great War Veterans' Association would be on the Pacific coast. On the request for endorsement by the convention of a resolution that returned soldiers should be given the preference, other things being equal, for government posts, Major Powers, M. P., for Quebec South, stated that this involved the government not abolishing the patronage system they could have stood by their promises to returned soldiers.

Toronto, Aug. 2.—The Great War Veterans' Association of Canada have decided to replace the British national anthem "God Save the King" with "O Canada" at the close of branch meetings. It was moved by an English clergyman, Rev. J. C. Davidson, now an adopted son of Canada, and carried at the convention this morning.

It seems to be a very serious omission not to sing "O Canada" at our branch meetings," Mr. Davidson said. "We are Britain's and British subjects, but we are all Canadians, and are here to further the interest of our own country." After their excursion yesterday to Niagara Falls the G. W. V. A. delegates

DOUBLE LAUNCHING AT ALMA NEXT WEEK

Sussex Record—On Wednesday and Thursday of next week, August 7 and 8, history will be made at Alma, when the launching of the two splendid vessels, the Meredith A. White and the Vincent A. White will take place from the shipyards of the C. T. White & Son, Ltd., the owners. One will be launched on Wednesday and the other on Thursday. They are three masted schooners; their dimensions being 114 feet in length, 34 ft. beam and 12 ft. hold, and registering in the vicinity of five hundred tons. It is between eight and nine months since the keels were laid, they will do so equipped with sails and full rigging ready to put to sea at once as soon as the cargoes are stored. Both are chartered to load lumber for South Africa.

Capt James Graham had charge of the construction of one and Herbert Campbell the other. The yards will not be idle a moment, for just as soon as the launching is over the keels will at once be laid of two four masted schooners of much greater dimensions than those just finished.

FORTIFICATIONS OF ALAND ISLANDS ARE DYNAMITED

Washington, Aug. 2.—Incensed at the German control of Finland, the inhabitants of the Aland Islands, in the Baltic Sea, have dynamited the fortification on the islands to prevent them becoming a menace to Sweden through German control, according to advices received today through official channels. The same advices said the Finnish government had ordered the immediate dismantling of all fortifications on the Baltic Coast of Finland except those at Viborg and Hangö. This is in accord with the demands made by Germany in its agreement with Finland.

OFFERS SUGGESTIONS AS RESULT OF HIS VISIT TO 'SISTER CITY'

R. E. Armstrong, Secretary of Board of Trade, Finds Ideas for Betterment of Local Conditions—Some Comparisons

At the meeting of the council of the board of trade, yesterday afternoon, the secretary, R. E. Armstrong, reported that the matter of double income tax had been brought to the attention of the tax authorities at Washington and the information respecting the matter had also been conveyed through the proper diplomatic channels. The matter was further taken up by American citizens in Canada and negotiations were in progress.

The matter of increased freight rates for certain bay services were referred to the traffic committee to report upon. The secretary, who at a previous meeting of council had been instructed to visit Halifax and report as to the manner in which various city problems were being dealt with, submitted a report covering reconstruction, shipbuilding, coastal steamer service, railway enterprises, harbor work, civic activities, troop demobilization and embarkation, and the safety methods that were being employed.

He reported in substance that the sister city was enjoying a period of great prosperity, that reconstruction under the administration of the relief commission was proceeding as rapidly as the conditions of labor would permit; that the commission with twenty millions at its disposal needed five millions more to complete its program of restoration, relief and restitution; that \$500,000 were being expended in the city for the reconstruction of the city under a thorough system; and that the plans of the commission contemplated the laying out of the northern area of the city which, as yet, remains undeveloped, along modern town planning lines, providing for detached dwellings, with front garden spaces, and a roadway twenty-four feet wide, with the rear service lanes; and that as a result a bigger and more beautiful Halifax would be the result.

He also mentioned the fact that the Halifax merchants were backing coastal steamer enterprises in order to give their customers along the coast a satisfactory freight service. In the vicinity of fifteen boats were employed, which would be an effective service.

Work of clearing the ground for the new steel ship plant north of and including the drydock had begun, about 250 laborers were engaged. The people of Halifax were reported well satisfied with the shipbuilding company and looked forward to a prosperous industry which would ultimately give employment to several thousand people. The lack of proper housing was an element that would be receiving consideration and that would have to be solved.

CANADIAN AIR FORCE FORMED MORE PEOPLE SAVE DISCOUNT

Aviators From Dominion to Be Grouped in Special Section—Leave for Soldiers to Gather Harvest

The Canadian Air Force has become a working reality, according to a recent announcement by the military authorities. It is announced that the new organization, to be known as the Canadian Air Force, will be formed by the grouping of Dominion aviators in a special section, the wearing of a Canadian distinguishing mark on badges and crests which will be recognized as Canadian airmen were some of the results of the early negotiations.

It is understood that the Imperial Air Ministry ever since he arrived in England in December, 1917, has been the focal point for negotiations and his final object the avowing of a Canadian air force, various recognitions of the prominent part Canadian aviators were taking in the war were conceded by the air ministry.

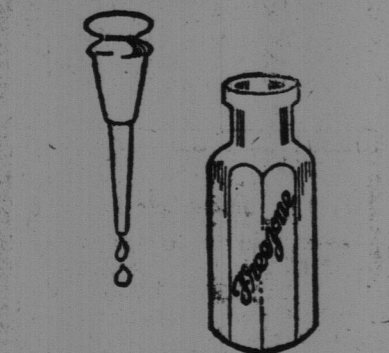

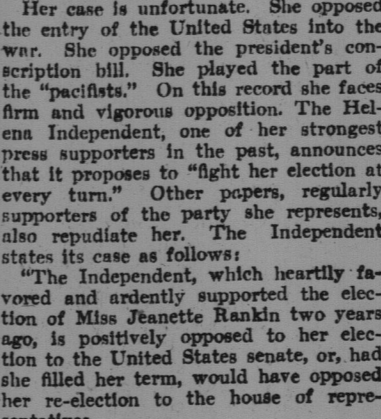

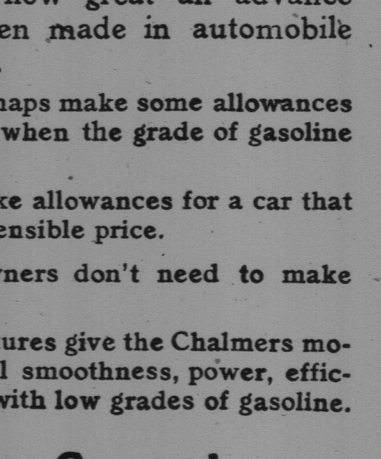

What The Canada Food Board Has Accomplished In Half Year

Organization of Food Resources of Dominion Has Advanced Far and Practical Results Are Seen in Increased Exports to Old Country and Our Allies

August 11, will mark the completion of the first half year of the work of the Canada Food Board. In this connection it is interesting to recall that the late Baron Routhven in his last public message to Henry B. Thomson, chairman of the Canada Food Board, expressed appreciation of and gratitude for the food production and food conservation efforts of the Canadian people.

The use of substitutes at an earlier date, owing to the fact that the same were not available for two reasons: The United States could not supply corn, the mills in Canada had not been equipped for milling the same, and in Canada only a few of the grains that could be used as substitutes were grown.

Candy manufacturers are permitted to use not more than 50 per cent of the sugar used in the corresponding period last year. Limitations on the use of fats and sugar are prohibited from making French pastries and like products. All other persons using sugar in the manufacture of any articles made by them are under license.

regulations and orders of the Canada Food Board have the same force and effect as an act of the parliament of Canada and are enforceable throughout Canada and are enforceable throughout the administration of justice. What has been accomplished up to the present time will be dealt with under the various branches of trade as divided for the purpose of licensing.

Dealers Licensed. All dealers in meats, lard, cheese, butter, oleomargarine, eggs and poultry are now under a license and subject to all regulations that have been passed by the board governing such articles of food. The returns received from licensees showed conclusively that in many places large stocks of the above articles were held in storage and at a time approaching the end of the season of scant production. An order was made by the board limiting the holdings of these articles, with the result that considerable quantities were put on the market, sold to the British and Allied purchasing agents and shipped overseas. The same order prescribes the holdings any dealer may have throughout the year, with the result that the waste which has occurred from storage in recent years will be eliminated, the surplus made available for export and a demand created, which will be an incentive for further production.

It is hoped that this will result in decreasing the cost of distribution and preventing in many cases unnecessary transportation as well as curtail the holdings for speculation. With the object of further reducing the cost of distribution of eggs, it has been made illegal for any dealer to pay for bad eggs over and above a margin of 1 per cent, with the result that dealers will no doubt take care not to hold eggs in storage beyond a limited time. The Flour Mills. At the beginning of the year all flour mills were placed under license, and in the regulations standards of extraction and branding of flour were fixed. The extraction of flour from wheat is now 78 per cent. The price of bran and shorts has been fixed, and the margin of profit to the dealer has also been regulated. All dealers in flour and feeds, both wholesale and retail, are under license, and the board is now in a position to follow all grain products from the mill to the consumer and to direct and control the distribution. The quantity of wheat flour that may be held by any wholesale or retail dealer or individual is limited, and this, along with other methods taken has enabled the mills, in almost every instance, to supply the British and Allied purchasing agents with a quantity of flour greatly in excess of the allotment fixed for export, and the amount anticipated.

openly said, without the government even  
protecting, that Germany needed Bel-  
gium for its mines and for its horse  
breeding, France for this, Poland for  
that, and Russia for the other thing."

Harden comes to the conclusion that  
all this will never do. He invites Ger-  
many to an "inner battle" against  
wrong-doers who do not see that the  
world outside Germany is merely bent  
on trying to restore countries which  
Germany has conquered, but for which  
she has no need.



SWITZERLAND AS A NEUTRAL Oasis of Peace in Europe Seems Too Good To Be True Tranquillity Resented When One Gets Beneath Surface, However, It Is Learned Swiss Are Doing Their Share to End Conflict

Geneva, July 1.—(Correspondence)—For anyone who comes to Switzerland direct from London and Paris it takes some time to become acclimated to the idea of neutrality and to some of its immediate effects upon one's daily life. This pleasant oasis of peace and pastoral industry, surrounded on all sides by the tide of war, this uninvaded place of refuge for all its foots and jetsam, seems at first too good to be true. One first few days at Geneva, in particular, are obsessed by a haunting sense of unreality. One almost resents the tranquillity of the splendid mise-en-scene, the even tenor of the neutral's day, the cheerful social amenities of his evenings, when the festooned lights twinkle gaily over the Karsaal and along the Pont du Mont Blanc, and all the world and his wife, overflowing the wide pavement, take their beer and ices at the Cafe du Nord.

NEW BILL OPENED AT THE OPERA HOUSE

That the programme of vaudeville acts, which changed the Opera House last evening, is not quite up to the usual standard, was the opinion of the majority of patrons who were in attendance at the two performances. Chester Kingston, a contentionsist, appeared, after an episode of "The Lion's Claws," and twisted his body in many shapes. His work was clever, but it did not seem to appeal to many. Mildred Haywood followed and sang a few songs, her patriotic numbers received considerable applause. Boston and Vaughan gave an offering, which evoked some laughter, due principally to the rather ridiculous nature of the performers. Denny and Lynn then came on the stage. The male member cracked a few jokes about the way women in St. John dress and about the ability of local ball players, and a certain element seemed to appreciate the knocks and loudly applauded his utterances. One of his numbers, which was constructed so as to fit the Fighting 25th Battalion, met with general approval and the audience warmly applauded. The last number on the programme was "The Girl in the Moon." This act was quite novel and was appreciated.

The part which the Swiss government had had to play has frequently been misunderstood, because of failure to appreciate the risks and penalties involved in the maintenance of that neutrality, as well as its vital importance to Europe and to the future of civilization in its work of reconstruction. The more closely one looks at the actual situation in Switzerland and the forces which there determine public opinion (which has for many years been the actual basis of a national policy in most modern democracies) the more devoutly must one hope that the Swiss people will be able to remain neutral to the end and eventually, in a reconstructed Europe, to achieve their complete independence from all political interference and hence from all political and military considerations.

tion has by this time been made clear, and should not have caused such surprise; "where a man's treasure is, there doth his heart also be also." In the regions within reach of German aid wealth is pro-German, as in Finland, the Baltic provinces, and the Ukraine. In Siberia it is as strongly pro-Allies, while in Great Russia the division is not yet quite clear, as the uncertainty in regard to the tentacles of some of the cadets shows. In those succeeding parts of Russia where the upper classes dominate, the tendency is to shape foreign policies by expediency, and it would probably be unjust to suppose that all the prominent men who have gone over to the German side have done so for mercenary or selfish reasons; no doubt in some cases despair as to the future of Russia has been a factor. The victory of the allies in the west, and their plans for helping Russia should help to offset this tendency of "the better sort" to go over to the worse side.

Just as they were mounting the doctor's steps, however, the child opened its big blue eyes and smiled, so with this reassurance the gladdened young couple hastened home. Singularly enough the accident Thursday occurred on one of the city's smoothest pavements.
