# List of Dead In Empress Tragedy Now Is Given As 964; Doctor Tells How Disaster Happened

Montreal, May 30 — Basing a most careful compilation on the official figures of the number of passengers and crew aboard the Empress, as given out by the C. P. R., it would appear that out of the total of 1,367 passengers and crew aboard, 964 were lost and 403 saved. Of the saved, one-half were of the crew, 202 being saved out of a total of 413, the remaining 201 saved were made up of 150 from the steerage out of a total of 151, 21 from the second-class, out of a total of 153, and 30 of the first-class, out of a total of 87.

Following is the summary:
Passengers lost, 753.
Saloon passengers lost—Men, thirty-one; women, eight; one child.
Second-class passengers lost — Men, fifty-two; women, sixty-three; children, saved—Men, fifteen; women, five, and one child.
Third-class passengers lost—564, no details. Saved—Men, 146; women, four; children, none.
Crew—Lost 211; saved 202.







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## LITERARY LETTER

Identity of "Victo: a Cross" at Last Established — Cuss Words in

(Times Special Correspondence) London, May 20—Who in reality is "Victoria Cross" who wrote "Anna Lombard" and "Life's Shop Window," and who numbers her readers by the hundreds of thousands? So far as the present writer knows, the actual identity of this successful authoress, whose sales cannot be far behind those of Marie Corelli, and who now, it seems, is about to woo the favor of the high gods, not to mention the gallery ones, as a playwright, never yet has been disclosed in print.

It is satisfactory, accordingly to be able to supply the answer to a literary riddle that has puzzled many, as well as to tell the story of this writer's curiously interesting fight for recognition exactly as one heard it, the other day, from her own lips.
"Victoria Cross" is the pen-name of

Miss Vivien Cory Griffin, and this writter is a sister of "Laurence Hope," poetess, who wrote the "Indian Love Lyrics" and the "Garden of Karma," What is more Miss Griffin, who lives in Hamp-stead, London's "literary suburb," is a B. A. of London University, a classic-al student, and the mistress of many tongues. Whenever she visits a new country, in fact, which is pretty often, as she is a great traveler, she learns the language as a matter of course, and she has studied Sanskrit, Persian and Hin-dustan as well as the modern European

anguages.

"I began to write," she said "at an early age, five to be exact. My father and mother were both of literary tastes. My father, who was an officer in the Bengal cavalry, spent much of his spare time in writing and cavalry. writings, and contributed articles to the 'Civil and Military Gazette' of Lahore, the journal where Kipling's first work appeared. He encouraged me in my childish attempts, and it was not very long before some of the pureary record. childish attempts, and it was not very long before some of the nursery romances were committed to paper. I used to spend my pocket money on foolscap instead of on sweets, for I was very much in earnest about writing even then. Writing has always been as natural to me as talking or walking. "My first appearance in any magazine of note was in the 'Yellow Book,' for which I wrote, 'Theodora.' Then Mr. Lane, who published that famous quarterly, issued for me 'The Woman Who Didn't.' I followed this up with 'Paula' and then came 'A Girl of the Klondyke'.

# C.P.R. Asks For More Berths Here For Next Season

### Indication of Plans For Increased Business at St. John Seen In Application

That the C. P. R. is planning for increased business for their ocean steamers at this port for the season of 1914-15 is believed to be indicated by their anxiety to see the new wharves completed by the opening of the season.
