ARCTIC RESCUE TRIP

New York Party Travel Across Icefields and Haul Sick Man Two Miles-Vessel Was From Parrsboro

New York, Jan. 3-Frozen solid in the ice of Long Island Sound, off Hardy's Island, the lumber schooner Davis, from St. John, N. B., was the goal today of a rescue party which made a perilous St. John, N. B., was the goal today of a rescue party which made a perilous journey across icefields that held all the terrors of the Arctic. The schooner, which had on board a man suffering from diphtheria and possibly pneumonia, ran up distress signals three days ago, but they were not observed until today, when a United States naval patrol boat sighted her.

Both the patrol boat and a police launch were unable to break through

Both the patrol boat and a police launch were unable to break through the ice, and they communicated with police headquarters. Then started the mission of rescue which ended when the stricken seaman, Captain John Gunnerson, was hauled more than two miles across the ice on a stretcher that had been rigged up as a sled.

A physician from Fordham hospital, an ambulance driver and a patrolman set out from the Bronx shore across ronx Hills to reach the schooner. 



Simms and occupied by him as a residence, fruit store and the town treasurer's office. The flames were seen first about 4 o'clock this morning and had gained considerable headway by the time the first water was turned on. He carried insurance. T. B. Thistle, jeweler, also in the Taylor building, claims loss of \$250 with no insurance. Other losers are C. H. Taylor and R. A. Hall, household effects, and T. G. Simms' household effects and stock of fruit and confectionery. He was insured. The probable total loss is \$18,000.

INCREASING OVERSEAS COMMERCE OF BRITAIN

London, Jan. 8, via Reuter's Ottawa gency—Sir Albert Stanley, president of the board of trade, in a foreword to the current issue of the Board of Trade ournal, outlines the programme of the oard's extended activities toward in reasing overseas commerce. Including ion from all parts of the world. 



The fight has got to go on for long, but that the long run the Allies can win, that the spirit that animates France and fingland and that will animate us when we are fully awake to the reality of this wer, is one which in the long run will bring victory. I do not for a moment doubt. I saw many Frenchmen who have suffered keenly. I saw many Halifax, on Monday night, December 31.



THE HARD ROAD

A correspondent of the Toronto Star writes:—

"It is a long road from the old Temperance Society to a dry Canada. The pioneers of the cause have long since gone behind the hill-top of time. Many thought that they were a queer people but in their hope and zeal they sowed the seed and awaited a better day.

"In looking back over the hard road of prohibition we notice the beginnings of temperance legislation in New Brunswick. A good, live spot, that was for the cause. Notice, that it produced men like Sir Leonard Tilley, Dr. Joseph McLeod, and Sir George E. Foster, all men of great service. One reason for the activity of that part of Canada was that Maine, with its prohibition leaders was just across the line. Hence when that state went dry in 1851, the friends inspired by the success of their neighbors urged the legislature to follow the example.






