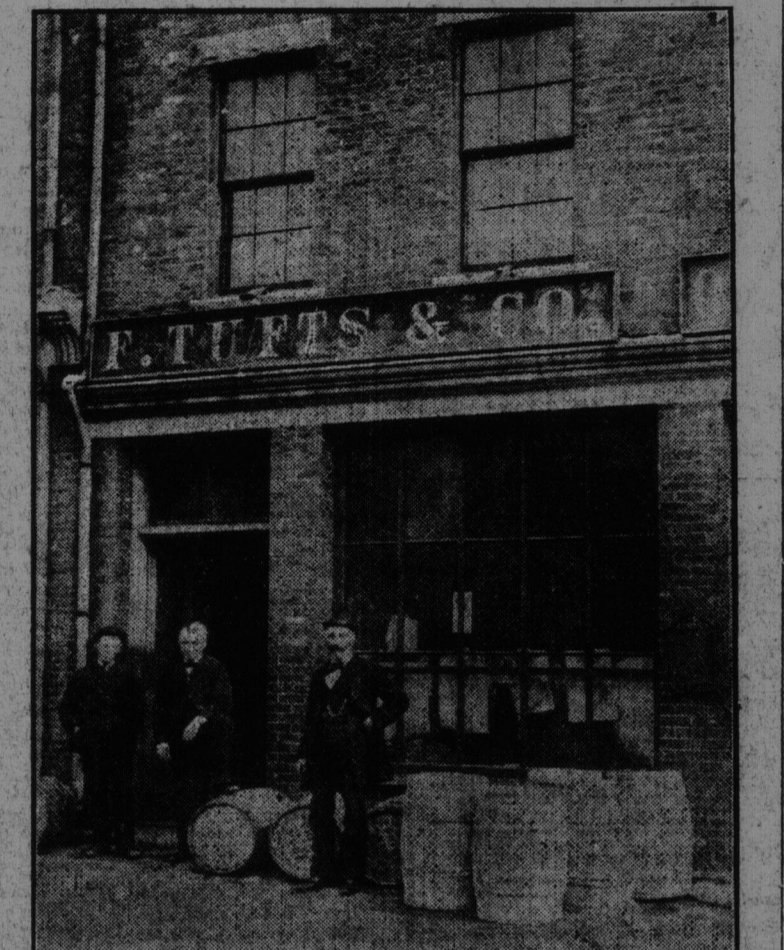

Unsuccessful Attempt to Sell Bethy Hall Recalls Grim Tragedy of Ye Olden Tyme - New Baronet Gained Royal Favor by Princely Gift

Lord Carnarvon's unsuccessful attempt to sell Bethy Hall in Staffordshire, the ancestral home of the Stanhope Earls of Chesterfield, serves to recall the fact that it was at Bethy Hall that the tragedy that has served to inspire poets, playwrights and novelists, took place in connection with the death of the lovely wife of the second Earl of Chesterfield.

Concealing his anger, he induced his wife to accompany him from London to his ancestral home at Bethy Hall. On arriving there, he taxed her, for the first time, with unfaithfulness, and declared that he proposed to keep her at Bethy Hall as a prisoner, for the remainder of her life.

Lord Chesterfield proposed to see in this evidence of her guilt, and a Divine punishment for her wickedness in perjury herself over the sacraments, and estimated as much to his relatives and friends, though ascribing her death, as far as the general public were concerned, to the plague, notwithstanding the fact that Bethy escaped any visitation thereof.

Canada's revenue continues to grow at a remarkable rate. The country enjoys a high degree of prosperity under Liberal rule.

CABINET CHANGES MADE NEXT WEEK

Hon. Roderic Lemieux Will Take Place of Hon. L. P. Brodeur, While Dr. Beland is New Postmaster General—Financial Statement

Ottawa, Aug. 4.—The cabinet change foreshadowed some time ago in connection with the retirement of Hon. L. P. Brodeur, minister of marine and fisheries and of naval affairs, to take the position in the supreme court bench rendered vacant by the death of Justice Girouard, will take place next week.

Hon. Mr. Brodeur is now winding up pending matters of departmental administration in connection with his portfolio, so as to have things in good shape for his successor, Hon. Roderic Lemieux, the present postmaster-general.

Dr. Beland, the young, able and popular member for Beauce, will enter the cabinet as postmaster-general and will be sworn in within a few days at Murray Bay (Que.), where Earl Grey now is.

The new minister will address meetings both in Ontario and Quebec during the campaign.

Hon. Mr. Lemieux will go to Simcoe with Sir Wilfrid for the premier's opening meeting of the campaign on August 15. The other ministers to accompany Sir Wilfrid to Simcoe will be Hon. Geo. P. Graham and Hon. W. L. MacKenzie King.

The cabinet council today succeeded in clearing up most of the arrears of departmental business, and it is not likely there will be any more full meetings of the cabinet. Most of the ministers are leaving either this week or next for their respective districts to plunge at once into active organizing and campaign work.

Hon. Mr. King left Ottawa tonight, and Hon. Mr. Templeman for Victoria.

Hon. Dr. Pugsley goes to St. John tonight and Hon. Frank Oliver will leave for the west on Sunday night.

Sir Frederick Borden, who will again contest Kings county, Nova Scotia, goes to Quebec tomorrow to meet Lady Borden, who is returning from England in company with her mother-in-law, Mrs. Leslie McCoun. The latter is convalescent from the serious injuries sustained through being thrown from a horse in London during the coronation ceremonies.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier will spend tomorrow in Montreal in consultation with the party leaders in Quebec relative to organization work, the selection of candidates and plans of campaign. He will return to the capital at night and spend next week here.

CANADIAN AFFAIRS CLAIM ATTENTION IN GREAT BRITAIN

Results at Bisley Great Triumph for Ross Rifle—Manitoba School Teachers Enjoying Trip—Vice-President McNichol Talks of Western Crop and C. P. R. Prospects—G. T. R. President to Come on Visit to Canada

(Times Special Correspondence.) London, July 25.—The most noticeable feature of the Bisley meeting has been the success of the Ross rifle in the hands of other than Canadians. Neither Sir Charles Ross nor Sir Frederick Borden could wish for a better testimonial to the value of the Canadian service rifle than that given by the redoubtable Irish shot Maurice Blood, who won seven centones with it, and says it is one point better than the British weapon at short range, and more still at the longer distances.

Mr. and Mrs. Fayal Clarke of New York are in Switzerland. Then again we have been steadily adding to our rolling stock. Altogether you may safely assume that there will be no hitch in the transport of grain after the harvest as far as the C. P. R. is concerned."

ANARCHY MAKING STRIDES IN FRANCE

Interesting Facts Concerning Women

Members of Chamber of Deputies Willing to Lead Forces

THE GERMAN MENACE

Some Parisians Think Aggression in Africa is Revenge for French Flirtation With Alsace-Lorraine

(Times Special Correspondence)

Paris, Aug. 5.—The anarchistic tendencies of those high in authority have created a very bad impression throughout the country and revolution is openly talked of among the staid and conservative farmers and others the impression is growing that the Republican form of government is a failure. The conduct of the government in dealing with strikes and strikers is the main cause of discontent.

A disgraceful scene occurred in the Chamber of Deputies the other day over the question of the reinstatement of dismissed railway strikers, and it was one of the most dramatic and most important indications of the tyranny of the trade unions. At a meeting held in the Salle Wagram, the anarchist branch of the labor confederation demanded for the presidency to be given to their leader, Leguennic, who finally was allowed to sit on the platform side by side with M. Bidegaray, a Reform Socialist, and M. Jaures, member of the chamber of deputies. Leguennic insisted on the use of force instead of parliamentary methods, and then M. Jaures declared that his party would demand disciplinary courts for the railway employees' question, and until these were established every day before the chamber for reinstating the dismissed men. They (the government) must drain the cup to the dregs. To save itself from dying, suffocated by the shame of its treason, the majority of the chamber, which promised them weapons to defend themselves, must renege on its promise; otherwise it was condemned to perish.

It is a sad spectacle to watch a man of M. Jaures' talent and character so completely placing himself at the head of the troupe of anarchy, and the columns of the newspapers show that if France is to be saved from a return to anarchy, it is no time to lose. In this week's papers four or five attempts at "sabotage" on the railways are reported, and all most carefully nature and calculated if they had succeeded to cause the loss of scores of innocent lives. And the strike of the salted trades whose syndicates contain all the most revolutionary and brutal elements, is spreading with its usual swiftness. The ill-treatment of all respectable workers who support their families attempt to carry on their work.

I caught a deputy going into the Palais Bourbon with white shoes, and looking quite ill with himself. The ordinary Parisian, if you produce a hot sun, becomes playful and mischievous. A serious looker, a deep-sea appearance; a serious khaki cloth, very tight and very shiny. SPRUCE BUDDWORM IS INJURING THE FOREST
Considerable uneasiness and even alarm has been felt by lumbermen and others interested in forest products, over the depredations in different parts of Canada, of the spruce budworm, (*Lytria fumiferana*). It was feared that the spruce might suffer a fate similar to that of the canary which was killed by the larch sawfly about twenty-five years ago. As a result, however, of careful investigations begun by the Dominion Department of Agriculture during 1929 and still in progress, the situation appears to be much more satisfactory and reassuring than was at first considered possible.

HEARD IN A PULLMAN ABOUT RECIPROcity

American Business Men Say Benefit Will be All For Canadians—Nova Scotian Agrees Fact Will Help His Province

In the smoker of a pullman coming up from Boston yesterday, three gentlemen fell into conversation. Two of them were Americans. One of them was interested in a coal mine in Nova Scotia. Another was a merchant, who has an interest in financial affairs. The third was a Nova Scotia gentleman returning home after an absence of quite a number of years.

One of the American gentlemen mentioned reciprocity. Said the other: "I think the Canadians have all the best of the bargain."

"Then they spoke of the conditions down here, and the one who is interested in coal declared that the province of Nova Scotia would witness a very rapid progress during the next twenty years. He and his friend agreed that reciprocity would be of great benefit in helping to develop these provinces."

"What is the matter with your people here?" one of them asked of the Nova Scotia gentleman.

"Well," said the latter, "Nova Scotia has great resources, but capital has been lacking for their development; and it is a curious fact, that, if a Nova Scotia man puts up a proposition, the chances are it will not be received with favor by other Nova Scotians. Our people seem to me to lack confidence in themselves and in each other."

Then one of the American gentlemen told this story:

"I knew an old Nova Scotia farmer, with whom I stayed at different times, and became very well acquainted. He had one thousand acres of land, with a good house and barn on it, and was quite comfortable. Of course, much of his land was covered with timber. I said to him once that he must feel very comfortable, and that he was much better off than many men who had perhaps a good deal more ready money to beget with."

"Well," he said, "I don't know, I have a mortgage of seven hundred and fifty dollars on this property, and I have had it for thirty years, and it has been quite a trouble to me." I asked him why he did not sell enough of his land and pay that mortgage. He said he would rather hold the land. I asked him why he did not cut or sell enough timber to wipe out the mortgage. He said he did not cut some timber every year. "Well," I said, "why not cut some more?" His reply was that he hadn't the money. "But," I said, "you could get it at any bank." He said he had never thought of doing that, and so for thirty years he had carried this mortgage and allowed it to worry him, when he might easily have made arrangements to pay it off."

The substance of the conversation of these three gentlemen was that Nova Scotia has great resources, and will progress rapidly under reciprocity; and that her own people should display more confidence in their ability to invest capital in home development with success and profit.

VAGRANT GOES TO JAIL FOR THREE MONTHS

NEW Y.M.C.A. SECRETARY TELLS ADVANTAGES OF PUBLIC PLAY GROUNDS

Everywhere Recognized as Necessary Feature of City Life—Cost of Maintenance Small and Wholly Qualified by Results—What Has Been Done Elsewhere

The advantages of having supervised playgrounds in the cities which are habitually crowded with children, unable to enjoy the delights of country or seashore life in the summer, was the topic of an interesting talk by A. R. Piskey, the newly appointed Boys' Work Secretary, of the Y. M. C. A. yesterday. Mr. Piskey entertains some original ideas on the matter and has had considerable experience in the supervision of children on American playgrounds, and therefore knows whereof he speaks.

Mr. Piskey said that in his opinion the outlay for the establishment and maintenance of playgrounds in a city of more than 10,000 population was a worthy one, and statistics proved that in every case much good had resulted from the establishment of supervised playgrounds. In one instance, namely, Somerville, Mass., where he had supervision of the playgrounds last year, an official of the law had told him that the juvenile arrests for petty offenses during the year before the establishment of the playgrounds had been twenty-three, when the children took advantage of the grounds, the number the following summer dwindled to one.

"Certainly," said Mr. Piskey, "it is easy to see that in the summer months, when the little ones living in the heart of the city find time hanging heavily on their hands with little to offer in the way of amusement, mischief is bound to result. But when the youngsters have a fine spacious playground with appealing games to entertain them, the tendency to mischief lessens, and the instinct of respect and obedience is instilled in its place, because the children are free and easy to quite an extent, they are under supervision and are placed on their honor to act as little ladies and gentlemen."

Springfield, Mass., now has six supervised playgrounds, Mr. Piskey said, and the citizens were pleased to have their children so well provided for in the way of diversion and entertainment as they were in these centres of juvenile popularity.

While Springfield alone supports these playgrounds, the city providing for their upkeep, within a radius of ten miles there were twenty-five or thirty more. In fact a city of fair size was considered a "back number" without well conducted supervised playgrounds for its boys and girls.

Everything possible is done to make the play and association pleasant for the young people, and the increasing numbers in attendance daily are ample evidence that the efforts of those interested are appreciated. From 9 o'clock until 12 and from 2 until 4 o'clock each day the supervisors are present to attend to the pleasures of the children, but those who desire are given access to the grounds at any time, although when playing at other than these hours they are not supervised.

Baseball, diamond, basketball courts, and tennis courts are provided, also, slides, heaps, springs, quads, parallel bars, ladders, climbing poles, and other features figure in the up-to-date playgrounds. It is not considered costly to operate these playgrounds, and the initial outlay for a good-sized playplace to accommodate a large number of children seldom is higher than \$100, which is a small sum to be required. To pay two directors, a caretaker and to conduct the grounds for the summer averages about \$300, possibly a little more. In Springfield, Mr. Piskey said the money was granted partly by the city and not so much by private subscription, leading citizens lending active sympathy with the movement, and the aims of the playground association.
