La MARQUISE de FONTENAY

Visit of the Marchioness of Donegal Recalls Her Marriage—Her Son's Many Titles—An Irish Earl's Golden Wedding

Arriving in New York on Tuesday, on board the S. S. Olympic was the widowed Marchioness of Donegal, a Canadian by birth, being a daughter of the late Henry St. George Twining of Halifax. The Marchioness' career is a strange one. When quite a girl, she, as Violet Twining, became engaged to an English officer stationed in Belgium, at Halifax. When the war in South Africa broke out and he was ordered into the field, she and her mother followed him to Cape Town, and when in the early stages of the conflict he was killed in action, it was found that he had made a will at Cape Town just before proceeding to the front, in which he bequeathed to her the whole of his very large fortune.

Two years afterwards, Miss Twining, then twenty-two, married, first before the register in London, and afterwards in St. George's church, Hanover Square, the aged Marquis of Donegal, repeatedly bankrupt and eight years of age at that time, fully three-score years the senior of his bride.

It is said that the marriage was originally brought about through an advertisement inserted by the marquis in the London newspapers in the summer of 1902, in which he offered the title of marquis and a seat in Westminster Abbey for the coronation of Edward VII. in return for a marriage settlement of \$100,000. The union, however, did not take place prior to the coronation. In fact, the matter could not be negotiated in time, and it was only after the coronation that the aged marquis, with his long white side whiskers, of the Dundreary type and his mass of white hair, was introduced to the society of the Isthmian Club in London, by a mutual friend, Colonel A. J. Gordon Kane, of Brooklyn. Miss Twining is reported to have settled, not \$100,000, but \$40,000, upon the marquis, who did not, however, live very long to enjoy it. He died some eighteen months later after being presented with a son and heir a very fine boy.

Lady Donegal and the marquis were not, however, a very united couple for she left England with her mother eight or nine weeks after her wedding for a prolonged tour in the east. Lord Donegal remaining behind on the ground that his age rendered him unable to put up with the fatigues of travel.

Presented at Court

Lady Donegal was presented at court prior to her marriage, by Lord and Lady Bessborough, and her friendship for the Twining family, also gave her away on the occasion of her marriage.

Her boy, the present Marquis of Donegal is now seven years of age and in spite of his being still in pinafores and knickerbockers is a British Lord high admiral. This dignity comes to him by inheritance along with the dukedom of Beaufort, Viscountcy of Chichester and the Barony of Hereford, etc. His naval office is that of hereditary Lord high admiral of Lough Neagh, which is the largest lake, not merely of Ireland, but also of the United Kingdom, covering an area of 63 miles and with a coast line of 63 miles.

The title dates back to the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries when the lake, having occurred.

It was in the wave of the river Bann under way for the draining of the lake, with the object of rendering the land which it covers available for agricultural purposes as its depth averages from thirty to forty feet and as it is about seventy feet above sea level, the more deepening of the river Bann would suffice to drain the lake, the disappearance of which would also tend to dispose of the popular legend as to the existence of an ancient city buried beneath its waters, of which the poet Thomas Moore wrote as follows:

On Lough Neagh's banks as the fisherman strays
When the clear, cold eye's declining,
He sees the round towers of other days
And there he bends beneath him shining.

The Estates

Formerly the estates of the Marquesses of Donegal, who are entitled to wear at court and on state occasions the uniform of a Lord high admiral, were of immense value, comprising nearly all the land around Lough Neagh, as well as the greater part of the city of Belfast. Most of the property was, however, alienated by the third Marquis of Donegal, whose son predeceased him, and who thereupon left everything that he could to his daughter, married to the eighth Earl of Shaftesbury, and there has been some talk in recent years of an attempt to recover possession of these estates.

The present Marquis' lands possess a

are limited to the island of Magree, County Antrim, which he owns, and it may be assumed that he will inherit his mother's large fortune.

It is, by the way, that the "Peagees" of Burke and Debutts refer to the late marquis as having been only twice married. This is a mistake. He was married three times. The dissolution of his first marriage, of which no mention is made, furnished one of the "causes celebres" of the early sixties, the evidence going to show that the respondent had been previously married to one William Murr, her union to whom had been pronounced by the courts null and void on grounds identical with those upon which the marquis based his petition.

The second wife of the marquis was Miss Mary O'By, and an equally impossible personage. The present Marchioness of Donegal, was the late peer's third wife.

Irish Peer's Golden Wedding

Lord Belmont, who has just celebrated his golden wedding at Castle Cook, near Enniskillen, in County Fermanagh, the home of his family since the reign of Queen Elizabeth, is the senior of all the representative peers of Ireland, having been elected to represent the Irish peerage in the House of Lords as far back as in 1837. Forty years ago he was in Australia as governor and commander-in-chief of New South Wales, and it was while staying with him at Sydney that King Edward's sailor brother, the late Duke of Edinburgh and of Saxe-Coburg Gotha, was in danger by an attempt made upon his life by Farrell, Lord Belmont, who in spite of his being an anti-home-ruer, is married to a member of the Gladstone family, has three sons and no fewer than ten daughters, only one of whom is married. As he is obliged to make provision for them all, it is no wonder that he has been taking advantage of the land act to sell off most of his Irish estates.

These, according to the historian Froide, were obtained by his ancestor, James Corry, after the defeat of the cause of James II., on the plea that he had been of great assistance to King William and had suffered for his loyalty; whereas the facts were that he had had his home in Enniskillen (Enniskillen) and King William's adherents for his hostility to the latter. His great-grandson, Armar Corry, was created Baron Belmont in 1781, partly for his services in obstructing the policy of Grattan in the Irish House of Commons, and partly because he was the father of the daughter of the Earl of Buckinghamshire, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland; and sixteen years later he was created Viscount Belmont for his support in the Irish House of Lords, of the administration of Lord Camden, the victory who goaded the Irish people into rebellion in order to carry the union. The present earl is the fourth of his line. A well known member of his family was Lord Belmont's private secretary, Montagu Corry, Lord Rowton.

SAV SCANTY SKIRTS ARE CLOSING MILLS

Paris, Sept. 7—Among the notes in the "Revue des Francais" is a somewhat alarming report of the effect of modish dresses upon commerce. The Chamber of Commerce of Tarare, in a recent report, draws attention to the slump in local manufactures and suggests parliamentary intervention. Tarare is especially celebrated for its cotton linings, but scanty skirts have brought about what is stated to be an agonizing stoppage of work.

Dresses which formerly required from twelve to fourteen metres of lining now need only five, with the result that many mill-wheels do not move, and that numbers of weavers and dyers are thrown out of work altogether, or are put on short time. The hope is expressed that leading dressmakers will come to the rescue, and that another fashion will anticipate sump-tuary laws.

BURGESS WAS VERY NEAR TO GIVING IT UP

Sensational Time Follows Action—Escort Said to Have Been in Plot and Enticed Her to the Place

New York, Sept. 7.—A despatch to the World from Lincoln, Kansas, says: "Sensational testimony is expected at the trial of a number of young men who live in the vicinity of Shady Bend, on the charge of having tarred and feathered Miss Mary Chamberlain, of Berkeley, a pretty 18 year old girl. The country is all worked up over the affair and there has been talk of lynching."

GIRL TARRED AND FEATHERED BY CROWD

The attack on the girl occurred a few nights ago, when she went out for a drive accompanied by her father. As they were driving along a country road they were stopped by a group of men who took the girl out of the buggy and stripped her of her clothing. The men then stood around talking and applying the tar and throwing feathers over her.

After jerking the girl and driving her into hysterics, they repacked her in the buggy and drove her home.

PATRIOTISM DEGRADED

It is necessary to do some plain speaking. Conservative leaders in this province brazenly insincere, and are degrading sacred principles of patriotism.

That Canadians are not as clever citizens of the United States. That the loyalty of the Canadian people is not above suspicion.

That our neighbors are a set of rascals, who cannot be trusted. That is what Mr. Borden, Dr. Daniel, Powell and all the rest of them are saying—and the amazing part of it is that a considerable section of their followers cheer loudly when it is said.

pausing to analyze the reflections made their own leaders upon their own ability and loyalty, they shout whenever the oratoric appeal is made.

It is useless to make a reasonable appeal to that section of the party. When there are no arguments, all the orators do is to expand his chest, wave his arms, and shout in thunder tones:— "Do you want to sell your country?"

With one voice, although nobody has the slightest notion of selling the country, the patriots yell in answer:— "Never! N-o-n-e-v-e-r!"

This sort of thing is very vicious. It is degrading. The Conservative leaders are thoroughly ashamed. They are, however, digging a pit for themselves, for the thinking members of their own party resent as much as Liberals do the mob and the false appeal.

It is the duty of Liberals and self-respecting Conservatives to give these blatant maguogues such an answer on Sept. 21st as will be a warning to their kind for all time to come.

LAST NIGHT'S MEETING

Last night's great meeting at Queen's Park, at which the interest of the vast audience was sustained until eleven o'clock, was in notable contrast to the Borden meeting of the night before.

The whole aim of the Conservative leaders is to create an impression that the trade agreement is something other than really is, and to frighten the people with a picture of results wholly different from the facts.

The Liberal speakers, on the other hand, made a clear presentation of the agreement and what it really means to Canada.

Dr. Powell received a remarkable ovation last night. There can be no doubt that his great personal popularity and the splendid vote he will receive in this election.

The speech of Dr. Silas Alward was one of the most impressive that has been heard in the campaign. He has been Conservative for years, and is now, as he declared last night, following still the policy of the great Conservative leaders.

His reply to Mr. Sifton was crushing and conclusive. His review of the shameful treatment the port of St. John received at the hands of a Conservative government from 1886 until 1896 was a revelation to those who did not remember the history of that period.

His treatment of the loyalty of the kindergarten politicians was as it should shame them into silence.

From Mr. Pugsley has never been more effective than he was last night. He exposed the Borden-Bourassa alliance, and pointed out that Mr. Borden did not lay down a navy programme because he did not wish to alienate his Quebec Nationalist allies.

He explained with great clearness the terms of the trade agreement and how it would stimulate the growth of Canada. Dealing with east and west he proved that it would not be affected by reciprocity, and declared that if people stood by him and by the government the great works at St. John would be carried out, equipping the port

to handle the enormously increased traffic which must come this way. The view of Courtenay Bay as it will appear when all the works are completed roused his audience to great enthusiasm, for the development of St. John is the thing that must appeal to a St. John audience, unless it has lost its reason in listening to the rant of unscrupulous demagogues seeking place and power.

Last night's meeting was a splendid success from every point of view, and presages a great Liberal victory in St. John.

PREMIER BOURASSA?

Would Henri Bourassa be acceptable as the next premier of Canada? Mr. Borden, the present aspirant to the premiership, is too weak a man to keep Mr. Bourassa in order as Sir Wilfrid has done. If Mr. Bourassa revolted from Sir Wilfrid, what would he do with so weak a man as Mr. Borden, who cannot hold his own party? If Mr. Bourassa became virtual or actual premier of Canada, with Mr. Borden as a figure head, would he not then be in a position to decide the whole policy of the Dominion? What then would become of such questions as the building of the navy for the defence of Canada and the Empire? Or what would become of the question of sending help to the rest of the Empire in times of peril? For Mr. Bourassa openly professes to be anti-imperialist and anti-British, and glories in this position.

If Mr. Bourassa became the next premier of Canada with Mr. Borden as a figure head, what would be the effect of Bourassa's fanaticism against English speaking people, which is so notorious? He abuses the idea—he scorns the idea of reciprocity with the United States, partly because the United States is an English speaking country, and Mr. Bourassa does not want English speaking people to rule anywhere. How will the Conservatives of St. John like it if they have to submit to Mr. Bourassa as their next premier, with Mr. Borden as nominal premier? Are they prepared to hold over their shops and homes, Mr. Bourassa's tricolor, and march through the streets of St. John to the music of the Marseillaise, because that seems to be the aim and hope of Borden's friend Bourassa.

Certainly, then, every vote given to Borden's party is a help to carry out Bourassa's anti-British idea, and is in fact a blow at the British connection. Bourassa and his colleagues do not seem to think that Canada should be recognized as an English speaking country, and Borden's party have no words in their mouths to contradict such ideas as given out in Quebec and Montreal by Bourassa and his colleagues.

Mr. Borden is a sort of quiet, ineffective man, over whom Bourassa might easily gain the ascendancy. Sir Wilfrid Laurier could always be trusted by all English speaking people to do his best to conserve their rights, but could Mr. Bourassa as Mr. Borden's master be so trusted?

Mr. Borden humbly saying to Mr. Bourassa, "After you my dear Henri," is a fine spectacle for loyal Canadians.

The Liberals are fighting the enemies of a united Canada. Makes the defeat of the enemies so overwhelming that they will not forget it as long as they live.

Both seats in St. John this time. Perfect an organization that will be invincible on the 21st.

The joy of battle came to Dr. Silas Alward last night as he warmed up to his theme in the Queen's Park. It rang in his voice and flashed in his eye as he gave his opponents thrust after thrust with a vigor that has lost nothing of its effectiveness in his years of retirement from public life. He stands for a more prosperous Canada and a bigger and better St. John. That is the attitude of the really patriotic citizen in the great campaign.

A MILLION FOR PARKS AND PLAYGROUND SITES

Spokane Commissioners Promise a Park Within Ten Minutes Walk of Every Home in City

Spokane, Wash., Sept. 7.—Park commissioners of Spokane, headed by Aubrey Lee White, will have placed at their disposal \$1,000,000 for park sites, playgrounds and improvements as soon as the bonds are issued, the supreme court of the state of Washington having just declared valid the election of May 3, 1910.

The sum of \$300,000 is to be expended in acquiring new park sites, upon which \$200,000 worth of improvements will be made, and \$500,000 has been set aside for playgrounds in various parts of the city. Every foot of improved park area in Spokane was secured through donations, and in the last two years several unimproved tracts have been acquired by purchase.

The park system embraces between 750 and 800 acres. The park commissioners have pledged a park within ten minutes walk of every home in Spokane. Harry J. Gibbon, secretary of the park commission, announces that work may begin before the close of September and will be pushed to completion. It is expected the bonds to be placed on the market in ninety days, will be taken by local banks.

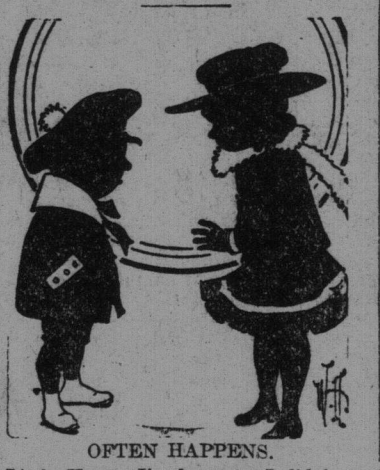

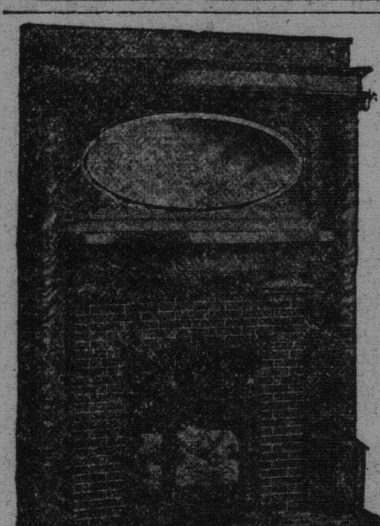

BUILDS AIRSHIP TO FLY WITH WINGS AS DOES THE BIRD

Herr Keller of Zurich Says He Will Be Able to Make Great Speed---The Machine Described

London, Sept. 7---The world is mistaken, it seems, in supposing that the art of flying has been discovered, and that the great aeronauts Blériot, Beaudouin and the rest of them are the masters of the craft. You may travel a thousand miles through the air as fast as a railway train, but if you are not flying, you are not flying. This, at any rate, is the opinion of Herr Emil Keller, who has just written a brochure, published in Zurich, "Artificial Bird-Flight and the Future of Aviation."

The aeroplane, according to Herr Keller, is nothing but a motor-driven kite, and like the balloon is at the mercy of wind and weather. The merit of the aeroplane is to have proved that a structure heavier than air can be used for aerial navigation, but the only true flight is that of the bird, which reveals both a stability and a power to resist and overcome the wind, two things which no kite can acquire.

A MINISTER STRONGLY FOR RECIPROCIITY

Clergyman Sees Nothing But Good From The Trade Agreement

SURPRISED AT OPPOSITION

Rev. Watt Smith of Ottawa Says if Opponents Let Their Heads Get Into Harmony With Their Hearts, They Would all Be Shouting for Reciprocity

"I believe that if the men who are shouting annexation would allow their heads to get into harmony with their hearts they'd all be shouting for reciprocity."

This was the conclusion of an impassioned pro-reciprocity speech delivered by Rev. G. Watt Smith, minister of the First Congregational church, at a Liberal rally held in Wellington ward, Ottawa, last week. Rev. Mr. Smith had merely dropped into the meeting by chance, but he felt moved to express an opinion, and certainly he handled his subject in a way that made his hearers sit up and think. His hits were clean from the shoulder and he had no use for "the let well enough alone" doctrine preached by the Tories.

He explained that he had been on his way to address some old country people who had got wrong ideas about reciprocity. He had found that there was no meeting to address so he concluded that the wrong ideas had disolved.

"A man from free trade England cannot long remain under the misconception, spread by certain agents, that reciprocity is a bad thing unless he is under the influence of the canning or the brewing interests." (Laughter.)

"When reciprocity was brought down I went up into the house of commons to hear about it. Of course I thought that every one would be in favor of reciprocity. I thought that someone would immediately jump up and move that it be ratified; that they would have a discussion as to whether there would be a division and that they would all jump up and say that it wasn't needed they were in favor of reciprocity."

"But then I heard a murmur of this 'let well enough alone' I wasn't sure which party to favor, but that 'let well enough alone' decided me. I haven't been on this side very long but I've met your kind on the other side of the sea."

The "let well enough alone" theorists were the ones who would have kept denominational schools in England, and the old laws in regard to intoxication.

"I have found that the man who says 'let well enough alone' is the man who has his hands and feet tied behind his back," went on Rev. Mr. Smith. "He is not the man who has made the British Empire what it is. I'll never vote for the man who says 'let well enough alone.'"

When he came here Rev. Mr. Smith had found a strange anomaly between Canadians and the United States due to trade relations. After all the people of the United States were of the same blood and color as we are. "The very thing to bring the people on the other side of the line into closer connection with the people on this side of the line is this reciprocity agreement. I believe that every man with the good of his country and the good of the empire at heart will give his vote in favor of reciprocity."

RECIPROCIITY AND EFFECT UPON PRICES

Poultry, Vegetables, Apples, Other Fruits, Meats and Other Edibles Cleared of Duty or Tax Reduced

The Liberal candidate in Ottawa, in their manifesto thus discuss reciprocity and the cost of living:

"Another phase of this reciprocity agreement upon which there has been much wild talk is the effect it will have upon the cost of living. You cannot give the farmer more for his produce without increasing the cost of living to the consumer in the city, is the cry. In a series of speeches in Western Ontario, the minister of labor---whose department has gone deeply into the question of the cost of living---has been dealing with this phase of the question.

"Mr. King points out that this reciprocity pact will bring some measure of relief to the household, the consumer. He gives a list of every day articles upon which the customs duties have been lowered. He further shows how both the producer and the consumer in Canada have been benefited by the reciprocity pact. He points out that the agreement removes, altogether, between two and a half and three million dollars of taxation now paid by the consumers of Canada, and that cannot be done without bringing some relief to the cost of living.

"For instance: It will place poultry on the free list, thereby reducing the duty by 20 per cent. It will reduce the price of fresh vegetables by 20 per cent. by the placing of them on the free list. It will abolish the duties which we now have to pay of 40 cents a barrel on apples, of 50 cents a bushel upon peaches, of \$1 a 100 pounds on peaches, of 2 cents a pound on grapes, and of 25 per cent. on all other edible fruits. There are seasons of the year when it is impossible to get eggs in Canada. Will it not be a benefit at such times to have the duty of 5 cents a dozen taken off? Fish of all kinds are to be put on the free list, such as oysters, upon which we now pay a duty of 10 cents a gallon, and fresh lobsters which are now dutiable at 25 per cent. Bacon and hams are reduced from 2c. per pound to 1 1/4c. Canned meats and poultry from 27 1/2 per cent. to 20 per cent. Lard from 2c. to 1 1/4c. Canned vegetables from 1 1/2c. to 1 1/4c. Cereal foods from 25 per cent. to 17 1/2 per cent.

"The idea that because of the opening of a larger market in the United States for Canadian products there will be a shortage of these products for the Canadian consumer and a consequent rise in prices is founded on no satisfactory evidence. That the Canadian farmer will be content to raise just what he is raising now and no more is ridiculous. Improve the demand for his products and give him markets easily accessible, and he will quickly enough aim to meet that demand. He will be able to employ more men and pay more wages. It will lead to more intensive farming and more farmers, and as the condition of the farmers around Ottawa improves and they are more and more prosperous, it will be reflected in Ottawa by better trade and better opportunities for the people of Ottawa to buy well. And so it goes, all along the line. We are all dependent the one on the other---the city and no branch of the community can be benefited without all the rest of the branches being benefited likewise.

"This reciprocity pact benefits the farmer, but not at the expense of the city dwellers, it benefits the city dwellers but not at the expense of the farmers."
