IMPORTANT TESTIMONY PLACED BEFORE THE SENATE. Military Officers, Railway Officials and Prominent Business Men Give Their Views on all Points of Vital Interest. The Enforcement of Our Northern Boundaries. Washington, D. C., July 21.—Mr. Hear, chairman of the committee on relations of commerce and business with Canada presented to the Senate to-day the testimony which has been taken by that committee. This testimony was not accompanied by a report. It is understood that the committee will make a report of its conclusions at a later period, after additional testimony shall have been taken at Detroit, Buffalo, and some other points. The committee is authorized to continue its investigations during the coming recess and the next session of Congress. The testimony already taken comprises some 1200 printed pages. It consists of testimony of military men, railroad officials, prominent business men of the United States and Canada, men engaged in the fishing industry along the whole extent of our northern boundary from California to Maine. The testimony covers all the points of vital interest to the relations between the United States and the dependencies of Great Britain in North America. The first witness examined was Gen. Nelson A. Miles, in command of the Pacific coast. His testimony is a valuable contribution to the military situation, and one passage of it, at least, will be probably read with starting interest by all Americans. Gen. Miles, commenting upon the deplorable condition of the United States upon our northern boundary, said: "I will state what is well known in regard to Canada. I believe that the railway system of British Columbia could be occupied by American troops, not, however, through Victoria. That is on the island of Vancouver, occupied by British forces, a place where the British government has expended millions in building dry dock and navy yards and had made some surveys for fortifications. They have there at this time a fleet of ships. POLICE ADMINISTRATION.

This Gazette has in the local column, yesterday, called attention to the methods of Chief of Police Clark in dealing with the alleged misconduct of some of his officers.

There is a civil department in the administration which the public have a keen interest in that the police, and in the highly important that the standard of efficiency should be increased.

A few months ago Chief Clark was pleased to announce that Mr. Clark had been appointed chief of police. His predecessor in office had been Chief of Police and the control of the force had passed from his hands into those of his subordinate—some of them now the most capable. A change for the better in the state of affairs was imperative and Chief Clark was of opinion that the gentleman who was placed at the head of the department would make a capable officer.

Before taking office he was given the opportunity of inspecting the workings of the police departments of Boston and other places, and ought to be thoroughly familiar with their methods.

The case brought to the surface yesterday by The Gazette goes to show, however, that unless a change is made by the chief in dealing with his subordinates the usefulness of the force will be interfered with. For years the former chief encouraged a system of pinning, back-biting and tale-bearing which kept the men at each other's heels and each other, and often drove decent men from the force. From present indications some degree of the old system still remains, and unless the present chief has the courage to grapple with the matter at once his administration of the force will be as great a failure as that of his predecessor. A large majority of the citizens of Saint John are now the peculiarities of the police department and are watching the current of events before giving an opinion on the results of the changes already made.

As we have said the great credit of the department has been back-biting and slander. It seems that in the case in point the suspended officer was released from the force, and the chief of police has not even attempted to inquire into the complaint against him, a most unheard of proceeding in a case which involved his reputation and honor. The chief does not know whether the charge was well founded or not, nor does he make the slightest difference in this case. The point we wish to make is that when a charge is made against an officer it should be made in writing, with the name of the informant; that a date should be appointed by the chief for a hearing of the evidence on the merits of the charge; and upon this sworn testimony, the case should be decided.

There are other matters in connection with the police department which The Gazette will give attention to in future articles. For notwithstanding the opinion of the chief that it is not the business of the public to know what the police are doing, The Gazette believes that the public have a lively interest in the proper administration of this department.

THE GRANADER GUARDS DIFFICULTY.

The difficulty with the granader guards seems to have been of a more serious nature than the English papers cared to admit, because the second battalion, the one in which the insubordination existed, had been ordered to Bermuda in consequence of the trouble. It is a very unusual thing for this regiment to be ordered to a foreign station except when actively engaged in foreign service, and therefore we may assume that the intention of the British war office is to show the granader guards that in consequence of their acts they have been degraded to the position of ordinary line regiments.

Military matters are such dangerous affairs that the utmost vigilance is necessary to guard against them, and it is also proper to put them down with the greatest vigor. But in the case of the granader guards it might be well for the authorities to inquire whether they have not a substantial grievance. They seem, at all events, to have the sympathy of the people, who cheered them lustily as they marched from their barracks to the railway station and when they were ordered to march towards the departing soldiers in every possible way. Some strange reports have been told in regard to the treatment of the granader guards. The officers of that regiment are supposed to be more aristocratic in their tone than those of ordinary regiments, and possibly they are more arrogant. It is complained also that the food which is furnished them is insufficient, and that this difficulty exists not only with reference to the granader guards, but also in regard to the punishment of line. If this is the case the punishment of one regiment by way of punishment will by no means put an end to the present difficulty. Strict equity ought to be made as to whether the complaints of the men are well founded or not. It would be well that a regiment whose career on the field has been no glorious should not be degraded without the fullest knowledge that its members are in the wrong. Soldiers can no longer be treated like dogs, as was the case half a century ago. The army opens an honorable career to young men in the British Isles, and has been raised to a considerable degree of respectability. It therefore ought to be the policy of the government to keep it in that favorable position and to
