WHAT WILL HAPPEN WHEN THE WOMEN OF N. B. VOTE?

Speaker at Last Night's Municipal Union Banquet in Moncton Predict Strenuous Times for Legislators When Women Get the Franchise.

Moncton, N. B., March 12.—(Special)—The Union of New Brunswick Municipalities concluded their two days' session here last night with a banquet in the Hotel Brunswick, at which there were a number of speeches, covering various subjects, ranging from the suffrage movement in this province to government ownership of telephone systems and railway construction necessities.

John White, the negro, who on Wednesday last, assaulted Station Master Lutes at Harcourt, was last night arrested by I. C. R. Inspector Noble, between Campbellton and Bathurst, and will be taken to Harcourt today, where he will stand trial on an assault charge which will be preferred by Mr. Lutes.

VIOLATION OF THE GAME LAW

Game Warden Flewelling, of Kings County, Reports the Illegal Killing of Three Deer Near Land's End.

Game Warden A. O. Flewelling, of Kings County, who arrived in the city today, reports that three deer have been illegally killed in the vicinity of Land's End, near Baywater. Two, Mr. Flewelling says, have been killed within the past ten days, and one early this week. He has the heads and hides of two. The game warden is instituting diligent search for the violators of the game law, who on this occasion been enjoying a quiet hunt.

TO PROTECT YOUNG IMMIGRANT GIRLS

Immigration Chaplain at Halifax Wants Law Similar to One Now in Force in United States

Halifax, N. S., March 12.—The immigration chaplain stationed at Fort Halifax will petition the Social and Moral Reform Association of Halifax to interview the Dominion government with a view to securing an act similar to the one in force in the United States to afford immediate protection to young women immigrants entering Canada, and save them from men and women engaged in the white slave traffic. Representatives from different churches met in the office of the Rev. McLean Goldie, the Anglican immigration chaplain, and drafted a resolution to the above effect.

Insurance cover held where young women coming to Canada alone were lured to homes in Montreal, Toronto and in different western cities, whilst others had disappeared altogether.

HONORS FOR A GREAT EDITOR

Alex. Suverin, Editor of the Nova Vremya, of St. Petersburg, Celebrates His Journalistic Jubilee.

St. Petersburg, March 12.—Alex Suverin, the publisher of the Nova Vremya today celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of the beginning of his literary activities. Several thousand persons prominent in Russia, including Emperor Nicholas, the members of the cabinet, high courtiers, a large delegation from the Duma and another from the council of the Empire, and many of the leading writing men, artists and actors of the country, united in honoring the veteran editor, who starting life as the son of a peasant, has won a unique place as an author and dramatist and a founder of public opinion. Mr. Suverin, G. F. Stephenson and Andrew McInnes were then chosen in rotation, with objections, to read the address.

PROFITLESS QUARRELS Religious controversy is not generally profitable. Taking note of the fierce contention and varying opinions expressed by ministers and others on the subject of Biblical inspiration and the interpretation of the Bible, the man of the world, who is making a success of his business, or is deeply interested in political or other affairs, or is finding much pleasure in a life of careless ease, is very likely to say to himself that he probably knows as much about the future life as anybody, and therefore need not take the views of dogmatists and doctrinaires at all seriously. In this he may be wrong, but this is the tendency. As a matter of fact, also, there is a rapidly increasing number of people, to whom the term worldliness in its ordinary sense does not apply, who are nevertheless much more concerned about the problems of the present life than about the basis of ancient creeds. They recognize the value of that principle of sacrifice and service which was emphasized in human life and experience some nineteen hundred years ago; they acknowledge its Divine origin; and they know no higher standard of human conduct. That which must appeal to them is the world's need, and they have no fear that the case of the individual who orders his life in harmony with those principles will be thrown out on a theological technicality. These principles bear a vital relation to matters concerning which the pulpit and theological press are at present engaged in much profitless discussion they do not believe. They do believe that if the brethren would get together and lay proper emphasis upon that concerning which there is no dispute—the need of social and moral reform—the result would be better for the world and more in harmony with the life of the Founder of the Christian religion.

BEEF SUGAR

That Canadian farmers could realize \$10,000,000 from the beef sugar industry if it were properly developed is the conclusion stated in a bulletin from the Census and Statistics Office in Ottawa. It estimates that on 100,000 acres of land the farmers of the country could grow all the beet roots required to produce sugar enough to satisfy the present consumption of the Dominion, and that at the prices now paid for beets in Essex and Kent counties, Ontario, Canadian farmers would realize on their best root crop \$10,000,000, leaving ten million dollars more to be divided among Canadian manufacturers and refiners and the domestic trade. The following summary is quoted from an Ottawa paper: 'The bulletin from the Canadian Census and Statistics Office on the beef sugar industry following statement appears: 'We import practically no lumber, no flour, no butter or cheese. Our forests, wheat fields and herds of milk cows are sufficient for these products. We possess the soil and climate for maturing the best quality of sugar beets, makers of beet sugar say; and no other crop pays as well as a field of sugar beets, farmers who grow these roots say. Yet we import from other countries 96 per cent. of all the sugar consumed in our homes, although sugar is as much a natural product of Canada as lumber or flour, butter or cheese.' This bulletin contains a most interesting review of the best sugar industry in Canada which is now in its eighth year with factories for making and refining sugar in Walkersburg and Berlin, Ontario, and in Raymond, Alberta. Factories have also been built at Waraton, in Bruce county, and at Dresden, in Kent county, but are not at present in operation. The experience of the farmers appears to have been decidedly more satisfactory than that of the manufacturers, especially in localities in which the soil is suitable for beet culture. The manufacturer has a task that calls for capital, technical skill and business capacity and on account of the difficulties of protecting the beets against winter frosts, the factories had to be closed down for a considerable part of the year. This practical difficulty, however, has been overcome by a customs concession whereby the beet sugar manufacturers were enabled to employ their plants during the winter and spring in the refining of imported raw sugars. This plan has worked out very

satisfactorily to the Canadian refiners, whose capital under other conditions would have lain idle for more than six months in each year. 'But it is the farmer's interest in the best sugar industry to which the present bulletin devotes its chief attention and one instance is given of gold-medals farm in the county of York where the value of the root beet crop is usually \$100 per acre. Testimony is given also from other quarters that neither wheat nor any other crop is in it with beets and that the effect of their cultivation is to greatly improve the land for grain and other crops.' General Manager Laird, of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, believes that Canada is on the eve of greater prosperity than it has yet experienced. In an interview in Vancouver a few days ago, he said: 'It is a fortunate circumstance that the return of prosperity is taking place progressively but slowly. It means continued development on a solid foundation. I feel confident conditions are changing to give the Dominion better times than ever before experienced and without the dangers of any boom features. Surveying the country as a whole, my firm conviction is that everything points that way. The immediate outlook is bright, and money is now quite easy. The banks are all prepared to give aid for all legitimate commercial and industrial purposes. Canadians have been going through an educational process during the past two years. After the end of a long period of prosperity, attended by much unwarranted speculation, it was inevitable that reaction would follow. Many profitable businesses have been learned, and these will enable people to avoid certain dangers in future.' In addition to its resolution in favor of government ownership of telephones, the New Brunswick Union of Municipalities has gone on record in favor of such action as will prevent or greatly restrict the export of pulpwood from New Brunswick. The Union has also declared itself against the lease or transfer of the I. C. R. to any individual or company. It also recommends sweeping amendments to the luckless Hazard Highway Act. A resolution in favor of a St. John valley railway was adopted, and on important recommendations made concerning the collection of civil taxes and its relation to the voting power. On the whole, the Union has dealt with matters of provincial importance and has brought out some very interesting and profitable discussion.

The following notice is being posted in I. C. R., Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific railway stations and passenger cars: 'Spitting in cars, waiting rooms or on platforms is prohibited. The company's officials are required to enforce strict observance of this rule. Every person violating this regulation is liable to a fine not exceeding \$40. This rule is approved by the Railway Commission and sanctioned by the Governor-General in Council.' The Railway Commission issued the order in an endeavor to aid in the fight against tuberculosis and other diseases, and to bring about generally a more sanitary condition in railway stations and trains.

The flat refusal of the anthracite coal operators to grant the demand of the miners may be followed by a strike, but this result is less likely than it would have been a couple of years ago. The recent depression in the United States has left workers less able to endure a prolonged struggle, and the number of idle men is very large. Under such conditions a strike would be much less likely to be successful than at a time when the demand for labor of all kinds was very active.

The lure of the west is having the usual springtime effect in Ontario. The Toronto Telegram says: 'Five hundred Ontario citizens left the Union Station this evening in two C. P. R. special trains for the west, to seek new homes. There was a number of women and children in the party. Most of the number came from the northern districts of the province.'

LECTURES YESTERDAY Owing to counter attractions yesterday afternoon the lecture given by Mrs. John H. Thomson at the residence of Mrs. Kilpatrick, 198 Prince street, was not attended by a large number but was greatly enjoyed by all present. The subject was 'Scottish Folk Lore' and it was the first of a series of lectures under the auspices of the ladies' auxiliary of the Seaman's Institute, all of the work of the institution. A synopsis of the paper was published when it was read in the Natural History Society some weeks ago. Previous to the lecture Miss Johnston sang My Ain Folk, and at the close Loch Lomond, both of which were received with hearty applause. The Terecentenary at Quebec was the subject of Mrs. F. Bullock's lecture in the ladies' course in the Natural History Society museum yesterday afternoon. There was a large attendance. The lecture was beautifully illustrated. FLORENCE KIRRADE TELLS STORY OF SISTER'S MURDER

She Shows Remarkable Self Control While on Witness Stand, But Faints When Asked If She Has Any Idea as to the Identity of the Murderer—Mother of Murdered Girl Also Examined.

Hamilton, Ont., March 11.—Miss Florence Kirrade spent a quiet night at the home of her nurse's mother, Mrs. E. Tremwith, Walker, at 128 Hunter street west. She was absent there immediately after cessation of her painful ordeal in the witness box at 2 o'clock this morning. Mr. Blackstock said today he did not intend to call her again.

During the first part of the examination her answers were very deliberate and carefully worded, given after a few seconds' thought in nearly every case. When she replied she looked straight at Mr. Blackstock or kept her eyes fastened on the ceiling. During a rigid and personal inquiry into her movements while in the American cities which she visited, she answered frankly without any sign of embarrassment. Though her demeanor was somewhat nervous, she was given without hesitation. She admitted her engagement to Mr. Wright, and her bearing was cool and serene. After midnight she turned frequently to look back over her shoulder in a hope of seeing Wright or the nurse. Her lips became parched and dry with nervous agitation and she moistened them frequently before replying.

"I do not remember, I was so awfully frightened when I saw the man who shot me during her description of the terrible scene. As Mr. Blackstock, courteous but firm, approached the critical question of the identity of the murderer, her agitation increased.

"Who was he?" she asked Mr. Blackstock at last, bending over and looking directly into the girl's face.

"I do not know," she replied, and faintly. After a few moments she revived and the examination went on. But each time that critical question was repeated she lost her wonderful self-control and brokenly persisted in her statements that she did not know him and had never seen him before.

The exact time occupied in cross-examination was three hours and fifteen minutes. Her answers were left no stone unturned, no clue untouched. He began with Miss Florence in Hamilton and ended with her in St. John. He traced her through Virginia, Syracuse, Rochester and Buffalo, inquiring about her movements and investigating the character and habits of her friends.

Miss Kirrade showed remarkable endurance and courage during the three hours' cross-examination from one of Canada's great criminal lawyers. When she left the stand her original story was practically unshaken.

She described the murderer as a cross between a gentleman and a tramp, aged about forty, five feet six inches tall, and dressed in a dark suit. He had a high forehead, dark hair, and a serious expression. GOVERNMENT WILL HELP TO SAFEGUARD LEVEL CROSSINGS

Will Appropriate \$200,000 Per Year for Five Years to be Used by Railway Commission Who Will Order Safety Devices.

Ottawa, March 11.—The minister of railways today gave a house a statement of the government policy in regard to the protection of level crossings. It speaks well for the plan that it was approved of by such leading Conservative critics as Hon. John Haggart and Houghton Lennox, M. P.

The plan is an appropriation of \$200,000 a year for five years to be used by the railway commission as aid to the railways and the municipalities in providing safety devices at dangerous grade crossings.

The federal aid shall not be more than twenty per cent of the cost of any crossing protection and in no case shall the government contribution be more than \$5,000 for a single crossing.

The commission is given authority to order protection at any crossing if it regards as dangerous and appropriation the cost between the government, the railway and the municipality. The government aid is limited to crossings in one municipality a year.

All crossings made hereafter are to be protected at the expense of the railway. The bill also allows railways to provide fireguards along their tracks.

Mr. Graham said that there had been objection to the dominion providing any aid. There were cases where that argument held and the railway commission had power to recognize such cases. However, as the dominion and the municipalities had helped the railways to create dangerous conditions at crossings it was only equitable that all three should share the expense of removing the dangers. This policy had been followed by every one of the American states, Mr. Graham said that he had communicated the provisions of the bill to each province and had suggested that the municipalities be given authority to enable them to raise the funds to meet the orders of the railway commission, where crossing protection was directed. He had received a favorable reply from Ontario.

Hon. John Haggart congratulated Hon. Mr. Graham on the plan. There might be a question as to the power of parliament to compel the municipalities to contribute.

THE HARD COAL OPERATORS REFUSE MINERS' DEMANDS

They Decline to Make Any Concessions and Will Not Recognize the Union—Offer to Renew Old Agreement for Three Years.

Philadelphia, Pa., March 11.—The anthracite coal operators' committee met the hard coal miners' committee at the Reading terminal here today and flatly refused to grant the demands the men had before them. At the same time they proposed to the mine workers that the present agreement which expires March 31st be renewed for another term of three years. This decision, while not unexpected by the mine workers, was a great disappointment to the men when they were officially informed of it.

When the afternoon session of the conference adjourned shortly after 6 o'clock this evening, Thomas Lewis, national president of the United Mine Workers of America, and his colleagues filed out of President Barr's office and went straight to their hotel with a spirit that was as buoyant as that with which they entered the conference room. Mr. Lewis declined to comment on the developments of the day beyond stating that he and his committee would meet to discuss the situation. The miners will meet the operators again at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

For the benefit of the public, the refusal of the operators to grant the demands of the men was contained in a statement agreed upon by both sides. It follows: "A committee of seven representatives of anthracite mine workers and a com-

Halifax, N. S., March 11.—The Riverside Hotel, on the St. Margaret's Bay road, nine miles from the city, was totally destroyed by fire last night, practically the only thing saved from the building being the safe.

The origin of the fire is unknown. At midnight Angus Bowers, proprietor, was awakened by smoke and he hurriedly gave an alarm, the occupants of the hotel getting out only partly clothed, so quickly did the fire envelope the whole building. The hotel was well furnished and Bowers' loss will be heavy. There was \$2,000 insurance on the building and \$1,000 on the furnishings.

GERMAN DESERTER HERE Mal Kliener, a deserter from the German army, and for whom the Dominion police have been hunting, arrived in the city yesterday in the custody of Inspector James Parkinson, of the Dominion police, to be deported on the Empress of Ireland. He was located near the waterfront, and application was made by the German counsel general for his extradition, and the order was made by Judge Wells, of Moncton. Inspector Parkinson will accompany the man to Liverpool, where he will be handed over to a German police official. It is alleged that when he deserted he stole 490 marks from Sergeant Major Kliener, whose servant he was.

MARINE NEWS Nova Scotia bark C. B. Whidden, sailed from Havana March 6th for Mobile, Ala. British schooner Rosignol, Mathews, from San Blas for New York, is a total loss on San Blas coast, crew saved. A correspondent of the New York Shipping Illustrated writes from Wellington, New Zealand, to ask what was the end of the famous clipper ship Thermopylae and to quote some of the fastest records under sail on San Francisco, Australia and the Pacific. The Thermopylae was an Aberdeen ship, originally a full rigged three-masted ship, which was claimed to be the fastest sailing vessel ever built, covering 7,700 knots in thirty days. She was subsequently put into trans-Pacific trade and changed to a bark rig. The last voyage of her, she was a training ship at the mouth of the River Thames, and is presumed to be there yet. In 1853 the little clipper Archibute, built in Baltimore, was distinguished by plowing her way in London in 107 days from Canton. The days and the Ringleader also made some very smart passages. The record of the Flying Cloud from New York to San Francisco in 61 days was never broken except by the Comet, which claimed a passage of 74 days, but the claim was disputed.

LOGS ARE SMALLER A leading lumber operator said this morning that while the cut of lumber this winter on the St. John would be about the same in number of pieces as the cut of last year, the size of the logs would be smaller. Year by year the size decreases, and the lumberman who looks upon a raft of today signs for the big timber of a quarter of a century ago. It is the same in most parts of New Brunswick where operations are carried on.
