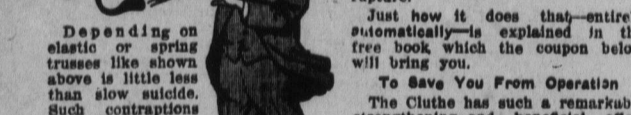

WHITE STAR LINE VESSEL SUNK

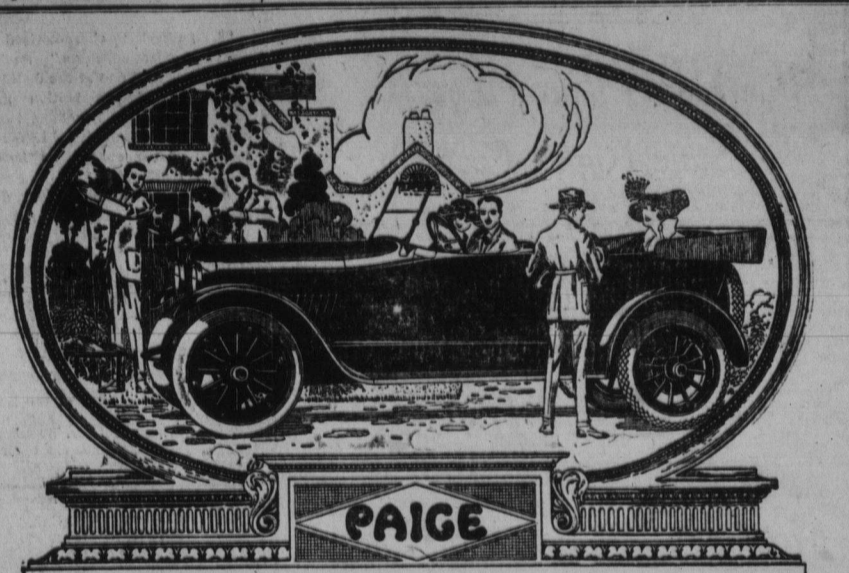
Delphic, Steamer of 8,273 Tons, Sent to Bottom.

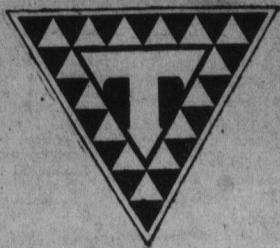

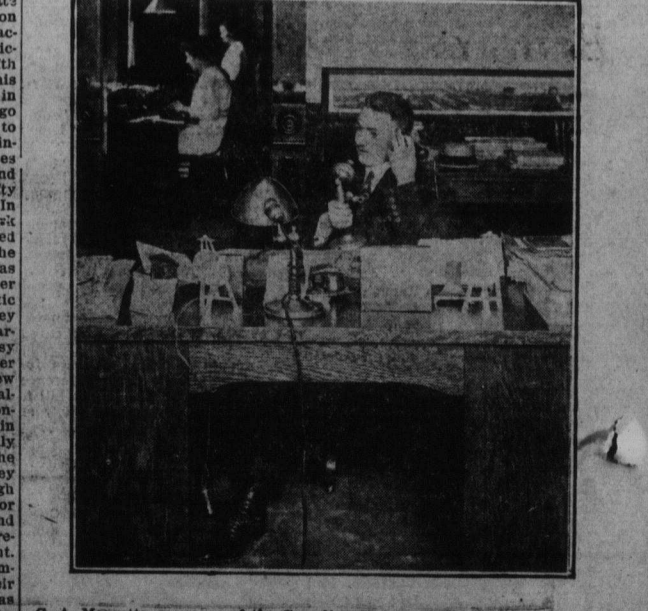
more thoroughly would it perform its functions. Referring to other matters of interest to the industry he made a strong plea for clean films. The immoral or filthy picture, should not be permitted to exist. Such pictures worked an immense injury to the picture industry...

(Continued from page 4) English and the consequent difficulty of preparation work amongst them the success had not been as great as had been wished or as the necessity for such organization demanded. The film business in Canada had made great progress but it was a mistake to imagine that those connected with the operation of theatres had made vast fortunes out of it. Attention expense was very heavy. In closing he indicated ways and means by which exhibitor and exchange manager could work to mutual advantage. The spirit of co-operation between both branches of the industry was absolutely necessary to its success.

Sam Spedon, editorial representative of the Moving Picture World, New York, was the next one to speak. He said that having been engaged in almost every branch of the business he was now trying to give the exhibitor the benefit of his experience. He spoke of organization but pointed out that it is the weight of opinion which carries and that while unity is strength it is the strength you must first have. Mr. Spedon in a humorous way described some old times with Vitagraph in the days of Florence Turner "The Vitagraph Girl" and Maurice Costello. He ended by pointing out that the exhibitor is now so anxious to meet the exhibitor that he comes more than half way and sends Miss Rose Tapley, one of the most estimable of ladies to speak for the producing company.

Mr. Donaldson, proprietor of the Billboard also spoke briefly, expressing his pleasure at attending the sessions of the League, referring to the development and growth of the film industry, and extending his best wishes for the success of the Maritime organization. The gathering then dispersed, all present feeling that the evening had been pleasantly and profitably spent.

Between terms of enlistment in that permanent unit he was color sergeant of "D" company, 71st York Regiment. Prior to coming to Canada he served in the Kent Regiment, England.

Three St. John Boys. A picture has been received showing three St. John boys who recently met in a hospital in England: Pte. W. J. Finlay, of the 26th Battalion, Pte. L. Connell of the 25th Battalion, and Pte. R. J. Short of the 26th Battalion. All three soldiers were wounded at Vimy Ridge and were sent to the Northern General Hospital in Sheffield, England.
