The report of the Corresponding Delegate from the New Brunswick Free Christian Baptist General Conference was called for, when the Rev. A. Taylor, one of the delegates appointed, came forward and gave a verbal and interesting report. Among other things, the following:

I am happy to be here. Régret my co-delegate is not present. I congratulate you on signs of progress indicated in the Quarterly Meeting Reports, and otherwise. He spoke of the prosperity of the cause in New Brunswick; in doing which he referred to their encouragements and discouragements. He said "We in New Brunswick rejoice in your gain in having ministers from our Conference."

He spoke of the education question as it exists among them at present, and said some good things concerning it. He further said, Our Home Mission work prospers.

We are introducing reforms which are working well.

FOREIGN MISSION REPORT.

Of all the enterprises that are being carried forward in the world, that of oreign Missions stands first. It is the echo of the work of redemption by Jesus Christ-of the spirit of that compassion which moved Heaven toward the the cursed earth. It has to do with the highest good of our fellowmen—with sin-cursed earth. It has to do with the highest good of our retiow-men—with time and eternity. God, in his providence, has given us an interest in this enterprise. We are "workers together with Him," and with our brethren of souls. And while we regard this as an exatted privilege, we are also gratified with the assurance that our labour is not in vain.

The last annual report from our Foreign Mission field in India—and which was published through the Mission press at Midnapore—is full of cheering was published through the Mission press at Midnapore—is full of cheering words, and references to interesting incidents, and wonderful successes in the words, one of the most interesting reports One has said that it is one of the most interesting reports Missionary work. One has said that it is one of the most interesting reports ever received. It is true, there has been no wonderful overwhelming flood of ever received. light upon the Mission field, nor upon any one part of it; but all departments of the Missionary work have been prosecuted steadily and carnestly, with a

good degree of success.

Dr. and Mrs. Bachelor were compelled, on account of poor health, to leave the field, and return to America, which was an apparent drawback, but other seemed to put on more energy and zeal to make up the deficiency. The Secretary of the India Report says, that the most chering fact of the year is their creasing prominent of the native agency in the Mission work. He says, "Not only the native preachers, but also the lay element in the Church, are taking hold of the work in hearty dearnest."

We find that from the children taken in hand by the Missionaries during the fearful famine of 1866, and trained in the schools, some have become teacher in other village schools, some have engaged in the Zenana work, and some have married, and have founded a christian settlement.

"At Blugaria, a middle-aged woman listened for some time very attentively, as I tried to show them the folly of idol worship, and point them to Christ, the only Saviour. A few days later, we were at the Doli market, and this same only Saviour. A rew days later, we were at the Doll market, and this same woman came to the tent door, in company with two others, and on seeing me she exclaimed, with a very reverent bow, 'Ma, my mind was made so happy by what I heard you say at Bhugaria, that I have come all this way alone to see you and hear those words again. I wished my sisters to hear also, so I have been from miles beyond this place to call them, and they are here; and now will you please tell us about this new religion."

Mrs. Phillips then instructed them in the things of Christ. She says the woman referred to "listened with close attention, every now and then saying, 'These words are true.' She at length rose up, saying, 'Your words have made my mind very glad, and I wish to hear much more; but the day is far spent, and I have six miles to walk; I left home without telling any one; and it is not get hear the cook we husbandle when the home without telling any one; and if I do not get back to cook my husband's rice in time, he will be very angry, and perhaps beat me."

Mrs. Phillips tells of others who, in like manner, earnestly inquired the way of salvation, and whose faces grew sad when she told them she must bid them good-bye, to tell others about Jesus. One said, "Why do you go so soon? You have been here three or four days, and have just given us a little light; and how are we to learn any more?"

In February, Mr. and Mrs. Smith planned a trip into one of the adjacent terrilories; but on account of his sudden illness, they were obliged to abandon ntones; but on account of ms sudden miness, they were obliged to abandon the undertaking. Consequently, some of the native preachers were sent "to spy out the land," and return with their report. They were gone about a month, and came back wonderfully encouraged. The Kajahgave them a passport through his dominion, and a guide from village to village. Now, while the Society, the interests of which we are now considering, would duly respect and honour those among the pioneers of the Gospel, through our wilderness country, and along our rugged shores, and those who more recently, and at the present, have done and are doing valiant battle and efficient work in the Master's service, who were denied the advantages of a liberal education, it has an eye to the growing demand for an educated ministry.
