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### Inspectors' Annual Report.

To the Toronto Public School Board:

We have the honor to present the following Report regarding the Schools under your charge for the year 1897.

Appended to the Report will be found Statistical Tables which give in detail all important particulars relating to Teachers, Pupils, Attendance, Absenteeism, Tardiness, Studies Pursued, Cost of Maintenance, etc.

#### ATTENDANCE.

The total number of pupils registered during the year was in the Kindergarten 4,773, in the other classes 29,390, of whom 1412 were promoted from the Kindergarten.

The average daily attendance was in the Kindergarten 2,170, in the othes classes 21,196.

The average monthly registered number was 26,747. This shows an increase compared with last year of 176. (See Table A).

The average of Monthly Average Numbers was 23,874. (See Table B).

The average of Monthly Averages was 87.4 per cent. of the Average Monthly Registered Numbers.

The best average for any month in the year was 93 per cent., the average for September.

The largest number, 27,455, was registered in November, and the smallest number, 25,703, in June.

#### TEACHERS.

There were 502 Teachers and 116 Kindergartners employed in the Schools of Toronto, during the past year in addition to the special teachers.

There are two music teachers and one drill instructor engaged in special teaching.

The certificates of the teachers are as follows:—First Class, 78; Second Class, 424.

The certificates of the Kindergartners are as follows:—Directress, 82; Assistant, 34.

#### KINDERGARTENS.

There were two new Kindergartens opened in 1897, viz.: one in Shirley Street, and one in Parliament Street. This makes 44 kindergartens in all. The total number registered in the Kindergartens during the year was 4,707, the average of monthly registered numbers was 2,644, and the average of monthly average numbers was 2,154. 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#### FREE TEXT BOOKS.

The total cost of the Free Text Books issued in 1897 was \$1,761.61. Of this amount \$193.60 was returned for the text books sold, leaving a balance of \$1,568.01 as the cost of free text books during the year. A large amount was saved by repairing books in the schools with bookbinders' paste and strips supplied by the Board. In nearly every school the books have been preserved with great care.

The total cost of supplies including work books, exercise books, book-keeping blanks, dictation books, business forms, drawing books, writing books, slates, paper, etc., was \$4,065,50. \$243.70 were received for supplies during the year, leaving the net cost of supplies \$3,821.80.

The cost per pupil for text books on the basis of total enrolment, omitting Kindergarten pupils, was 5 1/3 cents.

The cost per pupil for text books on the basis of average monthly attendance, omitting Kindergarten pupils, was 6½ cents.

The cost per pupil for supplies on the basis of total enrolment, omitting Kindergarten pupils, was 13\frac{3}{4} cents.

The cost per pupil for supplies on the basis of average monthly attendance, omitting Kindergarten pupils, was 16 cents.

The cost per pupil for both text books and supplies on the basis of average monthly attendance, omitting Kindergarten pupils, was 22 1/3 cents.

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The cost per pupil for text books, supplies and Kindergarten material on the basis of total enrolment, was 20½ cents.

In the above statements the text books and supplies for Night Schools are charged against the day school pupils.

#### CITY MODEL SCHOOL.

The attendance at the Model School for giving professional training for third class teachers was 59.

The following obtained third class certificates in December, 1897. Nearly the whole of the successful candidates held higher than third-class non-professional certificates, so that after teaching for six months they will be eligible for admission to the Normal School for professional training for second-class certificates

#### MANUAL TRAINING.

True progress in manual training dates from the recognition of the fundamental truth that it is truly educational, and not chiefly economic, in its advantages; that it is one of the most perfect school agencies for the thorough development of the physical, mental and moral nature. The most important products of manual training are the invisible, not the visible.

The educational advantages of manual training may be summarized as follows:—

It aids in physical culture. The physical exercise in connection with the work is strengthening to the muscles, but its best influence on the health results from the fact that it provides pleasant and interesting employment, and thus invigorates the nervous system. It is one of the most perfect tonics for the nervous system of both children and adults.

It is a great aid to discipline. Children both at home and in school are often restless and irritable, because they have not sufficient opportunities for interesting, productive occupation. They need occupation to relieve them intellectually and to provide a satisfactory application of their physical energy. Manual training accomplishes both of these most desirable results.

It broadens and varies school work. Education in the past has been too bookish. It has dealt with words too

exclusively and especially in early years. Manual training give the child intellectual occupation beyond the range of words. The more we broaden the opportunities for interested educational effort, the greater will the men and women become who are trained in our schools. Partial development is always weak.

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It aids in the development of the power of concentrating attention. It is not natural for most young children to love books. The power of giving attention is often seriously weakened by the efforts of teachers and parents to compel children to attend to things that are not interesting to them. There can be no developing attention without genuine interest. Real things are interesting to children. Even real things soon lose their interest, however, when they are used in school as objects to be examined or studied. Appropriate things, suitable to the stage of a child's development, never lose their interest, if the child is allowed to use them in construction or in the execution of its own original plans.

It trains the observant powers. Children never look definitely at anything without a definite motive. They examine most definitely when the motive is their own, and especially when the complete accomplishment of their purpose depends on accurate observation. Most of the old school processes develop the power of observing partially in response to the teacher's wish. Manual training aids in definite and independent observation.

It developes the judgment of size, form, and the relationship of parts to wholes, and on this account it forms the best basis for mathematical culture. The development of apperceptive centres of size, form, and relationship in the minds of children is the essential foundation of mathematical power. It helps to form clear conceptions in the minds of children. We really know definitely only those things which we have not merely thought out but wrought out.

It applies knowledge as it is gained. This is a most important principle in education. The productive power of humanity is weakened when knowledge is stored without definite purpose, or when it is communicated to a child before it has power to apply it. Our powers may be classified as receptive, reflective and executive. These powers cannot be thoroughly developed separately. The only perfect training of the receptive powers and the reflective powers is the training they receive as subordinate and essential stages in the achievement of our purposes, especially of original purposes. Executive power is the highest product of education. The application of knowledge as it is gained is the only perfect way of gaining it clearly, and of fixing it in the mind as an available element in mental equipment.

It makes pupils constructive instead of destructive. Man was not intended to be destructive, but to be creative and constructive. If children are destructive, as they too often are, they have been made so by improper training. Every child prefers to be productive, if it is supplied with materials suitable to its stage of development, with which to exercise its creative and constructive powers.

It makes children happy, and happiness is an important element in moral development. All children are happiest when using their highest power. Their highest power is selfhood or individuality. The highest use of this power is creativity, or the production of original work. Childhood uses this power to best advantage in working with the material things of its environment. Manual training systematizes and defines the use of creativity, and

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therefore typifies the ideal condition of human life, which is to have the whole human race happily engaged in productive work. One of the deplorable effects of imperfect training in the past is the wrong attitude of the race towards productive work. Work which should be man's highest source of joy has degenerated into drudgery. All men must be producers in the ideal society of the coming day when education shall have accomplished its perfect work. Manual training is the best school process for laying the true foundation for this ideal condition. Freebel says: "God created man in his own image; therefore man should create and bring forth like God. The spirit of man should hover over the shapeless, and move it that it may take shape and form, a distinct being and life of its own. This is the high meaning, the deep significance, the great purpose of work and industry, of productive and creative activity. We become truly Godlike in diligence and industry, in working and doing, which are accompanied by the clear perception, or even by the vaguest feeling that thereby we represent the inner in the outer; that we give body to spirit and form to thought; that we render visible the invisible."

It increases the opportunities for the discovery of the special power of each individual pupil. It is only by the discovery and development of this special power that the teacher can accomplish the real work of true education. Manual training aids not only in the revelation of the child to its teacher, but, what is still more important, it helps to reveal the child to itself.

It developes habits of accuracy, definiteness and exactness. These are fundamental constituents in character. They are the essential elements in truthfulness. There is no other kind of school work which so completely reveals the importance of accuracy, definiteness and exactness to the child as manual training. Its plans and calculations must be definite, its measurements and drawings must be accurate, and its work with saw, chisel and plane must be exact in order that its finished product may be perfect. The effort to secure definiteness, accuracy, and exactness in material products helps to make them dominant principles in a child's life. When a boy forms a good piece of work he is incidentally aiding in the formation of a good character.

It is one of the best school agencies in the development of the powers of self-expression. True manual training is self-expression in form or in construction. Self-expression is the putting out of the original conceptions of our own inner life, the revelation of the powers of our individual selfhood. In early years the most perfect kind of self-expression in visible form is manual training. All children naturally use the material things of their environment as aids in accomplishing their own designs. Their work with sand, clay, stones, sticks, blocks, paper, cardboard, and other material, is their means of achieving their most complete mental development, and the evolution of their selfhood. The school should take advantage of this clearly defined tendency of childhood, boyhood and girlhood, and continue in a methodical way after the child enters school the educational process which nature led the child to adopt before it went to school. Till the child has reached the age of fourteen, manual training, the rearrangement, re-adjustment, re-construction, re-organization and transformation of suitable material is the best possible process for self-expression. It is true self-activity. All forms of expression are needed for symmetrical development; new forms of expression aid in complete expression; and complete expression leads to greater growth.

The highest intellectual advantages resulting from manual training are the enlargement and co-ordination of the brain and the development of motor brain power. Nearly all the school processes of the past have developed only a one power brain. They have trained the brain to receive knowledge and let it lie in a passive condition. All knowledge should seek expression. It should first demand adaptation to and assimilation with the kindred knowledge already in the mind, and then the enlarged and improved inner life should seek expre-sion in an effort to improve the outer. The child's tendency to execute its plans should never be lost. Every educational process that either communicates knowledge directly to the child or trains the child to acquire knowledge for itself, and stops there, developes the sensor or receiving brain only. It matters little, so far as complete brain development is concerned, whether the knowledge is communicated by words or through real things, whether it is received from the teacher ready-made or is gathered by the pupil himself. If school education stops at receptivity and reflection, at the acquisition of knowledge and the development of the knowledgegathering and reasoning powers, the motor brain remains undeveloped, and the co-ordination of the sensor and motor neurological systems remains practically uninfluenced by school education.

It is of the highest importance that the improvement of the sensor brain should be accompanied by a corresponding development of the motor brain, and by the perfecting of the channels of communication between the sensor brain and the motor brain. Education is necessarily defective at its centre of vital power if it fails to preserve the true harmony of effective development between the receptive and executive parts of the brain, to enlarge the channels of

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communication between them, and to increase what may be termed the battery power of the brain, as its power to acquire knowledge is increased. The young man has less tendency than the child to achieve his purposes. It is a serious charge against educational systems that they render the race less effective by reducing its executive power and tendency. The young child whose predominant tendency was to try to help before it had much power or wisdom, is transformed, so that with increasing wisdom and power it loses the desire to help.

Fortunately the child is not in school all the time or the results would be much worse. There are many opportunities outside of school for developing the motor brain, for co-ordinating the sensor with the motor brain, and for increasing the battery power of the brain to correspond They are, however, with the increase of knowledge. fewer and less stimulating in cities and towns than in rural districts, and men are gathering in increasingly large numbers in cities and towns. Even in the country, however, the schools should leave no important part of the child's development to chance; but there is a much greater need of manual training in cities and towns than in rural districts, not merely to give manual skill as a basis for industrial success, but as an aid in brain development and co-ordination.

Manual training has many moral advantages: It encourages the virtues of neatness, accuracy, diligence, perserverence, order, definiteness and thrift. It is a direct moral force. Swedish statisticians claim that since the introduction of Sloyd in the schools of Sweden the people are more thrifty and less drunken. It increases the respect of men and women for their own powers. Self-reverence is a duty. It makes men more truly practical,

more operative, more executive; and therefore makes religious life more than a soothing dream.

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It not only increases men's faith in themselves, it may be used to develope definite conceptions of unity and cooperation.

While the introduction of material training into schools should rest on its educational, instead of its economic value, it is well to recognize the fact that it has many economic and social advantages.

It preserves the taste for work which all rightly constituted children have naturally.

It increases respect for honest labor.

It gives men power to adapt themselves to altered economic conditions, by enabling them to change from one occupation to another, when circumstances make it necessary to do so. Trade schools make men slaves to a single trade; manual training should qualify head and hand for greater freedom in meeting new conditions.

It gives a careful, special training to those powers required by the majority in their life work.

It lays the foundation for an increase in national wealth by giving men and women the tendency to become producers, and by increasing their skill and intelligence. Mr. J. Scott Russell calculates that an unskilled workman is worth twenty-five pounds, a moderately skilled workman fifty pounds, and a highly skilled workman seventy-five pounds per annum to his country as a wealth producer.

It gives workmen individually greater earning power, and therefore enables them to have happier and more cultured homes, in which the joys and soul stimulation of art, music and literature may influence the family life.

It leads to more originality and greater individuality in the products of labor.

Manual training accomplishes its best work in the early years of a child's life. This is one of the many reasons for the universal introduction of the kindergarten. In recognition of this truth Froebel was two generations in advance of his successors. Froebel gave manual training in many adapted forms to the little children; his successors, most of them, began by giving it to the oldest children in the high schools. Modern development is progressively towards Froebel. Grade by grade downward manual training is forcing its way. In time all will see what Froebel saw so clearly long ago, that the developing influence of material things in productive self-activity and brain making is greatest in the early years of the child's evolution, and that if not begun then it can never by any possibility produce it best effects. Like all other education whose germs have not been developed in the first evolutionary stage, its later development is correspondingly weak and formal. The kindergarten will in time become the universal basis for manual training, because it uses hard work as a means of head and heart growth, and at a period in a child's life when it is most developing to its active nature.


It may be well to explicitly state, what has been assumed throughout, that the girl is entitled to all the advantages of manual training as fully as the boy. This will be admitted without argument when it is clearly

understood that manual training should be given chiefly for educational not economic reasons. Girls are entitled to complete development as fully as boys are. They should not only have manual training, but they should work with the same materials and the same tools as boys in early years. If needle work is good for the development of girls it is also good for the development of boys; if wood work helps to develop and co-ordinate a boy's brain and make him productively self-active, it will do the same for a girl. The ridiculous distinctions that have been made resulted from the blinding effects of utilitarianism They will disappear with the recognition of the broader and truer educational basis.

There are some objections still raised to the introduction of manual training in schools. It may be well to answer them.

- 1. It is sometimes urged that, because great manual skill is occasionally found with a low order of general intelligence, therefore manual training cannot have much educational value. It is unreasonable to base general principles, applicable to race development, on abnormal cases. It would be ridiculous to argue that, because "Blind Tom" possessed great musical genius, although defective in intellect, it is therefore wrong to teach music, or that arithmetic should be banished from the schools because Zera Colburn possessed astounding power to perform arithmetical calculations, and had little-other mental power. It is equally absurd to oppose manual training because manual skill is not always accompanied by great brain power.
- 2. "There is not time for manual training as the program of study is already too crowded." The real question

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that demands the attention of educators is, what is the best use that can be made of time? Manual training has more educational and more economic value than mere memorizing, than listening to instruction by even an able teacher in any subject, than grammar or geography, or history or spelling, or writing, especially as they are generally taught. Too much time has been given to most of these subjects. Too much time is given to arithmetic. Manual training should be correlated with arithmetic, geometry and drawing, and even with geography, when it is properly taught. The proper correlation of the subjects on a school programme will save time and secure more thorough teaching. But, if no time could be saved by better methods of teaching the subjects at present on the programme, some of them should be taken off in order to make room for a subject of such high educational and economic value as manual training.

- 3. "Manual training gives too strong a tendency towards special trades." This is undoubtedly a valid objection to trade schools, but not to manual training. The teaching of drawing in schools has not made too many artists. Manual training is excellent training for those who aim to be lawyers, doctors, ministers or business men. It is invaluable to any man or woman who requires a well developed, co-ordinated brain, trained to use knowledge as well as accumulate it. The superintendent of one of the largest American cities reported recently that nearly all the graduates of the manual training school in his city entered what are called the learned professions after graduating from the manual training school.
- 4. "Manual training will turn out a large number of imperfectly trained tradesmen." This is a baseless charge. Manual training will produce a body of easily trained tradesmen, who will have more knowledge in regard to the

materials they have to use, more skill in using them, and more intelligence in discovering new uses for them.

5. "Teachers have not been prepared to teach manual training, and therefore cannot do it satisfactorily." This objection, if valid, would shut the door against all progress. Teachers have to rise to every new ideal. Manual training must be adopted gradually, step by step, as teachers are prepared for it.

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Few have yet been able to follow Froebel to the mountain top from which he saw in manual training, in the constructive and transforming use of material, the revalation of the complete inner life of the child and the basis of its moral training. To Froebel we owe our limited conception of the educational value of manual training, to him we shall owe our greater enlightenment when in the coming days we shall see beyond the mists and shadows, and understand that the proper use of objects or material things not only reveals new knowledge, widens and strengthers our faculties, developes and co-ordinates our brain power, and cultivates our executive force, but that it is the operative foundation of spiritual evolution.

Manual training must become an element in all the school training of young children, in order that they may be fitly prepared for full development in the later stages of their evolution. It should be introduced into all schools, not to fit men and women for making a living, but to qualify them for higher living; not to teach trades, but to give more power; not to mould material things, but to mould humanity; not to give manual dexterity, but to lead to creative activity; not to make things, but to make better men and women.

#### DEPARTMENTAL EXAMINATIONS.

Pupils from the Public Schools took part in the following Departmental Examinations. The Entrance Examination, the Public School Leaving Examination, and the examinations for Form I and Form II of High Schools.

#### ENTRANCE EXAMINATION.

Four hundred and sixty-one candidates in all wrote at the Entrance Examination in June, 1897. Of these three hundred and seventy-eight were from the Public Schools. Three hundred and thirteen succeeded in passing the examination, of whom two hundred and thirty-nine were Public School pupils.

#### PUBLIC SCHOOL LEAVING EXAMINATION.

There were three hundred and two candidates at the Public School Leaving Examination in June, 1897, of whom two hundred and eighty-nine were from the Public Schools. One hundred and fifty-two passed, of whom one hundred and forty-five were Public School Pupils. One hundred and twenty-six of the Public School pupils who did not succeed in obtaining their Public School Leaving Examination certificates obtained Entrance Standing on their Public School Leaving papers.

#### THE INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

The attendance at the Victoria Industrial School for boys during 1897 was 165. Of these 77 attended during the whole year, 50 were sent from the institution, and 38 were admitted. The principal states that the boys are improving in conduct, and there is less trouble in their management than formerly.

The teachers in the school are doing efficient work, considering the fact that the pupils in all but the lowest class attend school only one-half of each day. It would be desirable to have the hours of teaching lengthened in order that the pupils might be able to give more time to their studies. There seems to be no reason for having the school hours in an Industrial School correspond with those in an ordinary Public School.

The attendance at the Alexandra Industrial School for girls during 1897 was 26. Of these, 6 attended during the whole year, 11 were sent out during the year, and 9 were admitted.

The girls are attentive to their work, and considering the circumstances, they do good work.

#### SCHOOL LIBRARIES.

There are thirty teachers' libraries in the schools. In some instances two schools are united for library purposes.

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#### MUSIC REPORTS.

#### MR. PERRIN'S REPORT.

The teachers as a whole entered upon the year better fitted than formerly to conduct the teaching of this subject. The lessons set with the exception of the songs have been much the same as before with slight changes, principally in the grading for the different classes. By retaining the exercises best adapted to advance the pupils, the teachers have gained greater confidence in using them for that purpose, and thus in the future will the standard of teaching be sustained.

The pupils in various classes have had incidental practice in following the notes mentally, and as a test that they have done so, have resumed the singing of the notes correctly. This, as an exercise, should be more frequently tried.

The training of the pupils to recognize the notes when sung only, has been adhered to, and has as usual brought about good results.

Writing from memory phrases that have been sung, has been, in more advanced classes, another commendable practice, in which both the time and tones have been alike pictured.

All the pupils are taught early the good exercise of of uniformly beating time. To many such an exercise is an advantage in bringing about a more intelligent reading and precise conception of the varied time of the notes. Other means are often employed to help forward this understanding.

The teachers in some few instances can well pride themselves in the progress made, and the heartiness with which their pupils have entered into the work. I should wish that this satisfaction more generally prevailed, as it well repays the teacher for the effort put forth.

A good average standing for the year has been maintained in the classes, as gathered from the monthly reports sent forward.

Some few class-rooms are yet without the roller blackboards, which for musical purposes are much wanted.

#### MR. CRINGAN'S REPORT.

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In previous reports submitted during the past eleven years I have been able to report an improvement in one or more branches of music teaching. The past year has been no exception, as sightsinging has been more thoroughly taught than ever before. At the commencement of the year I supplied all teachers in my divisions with books of graded exercises in sightsinging, which provided material for study in a carefully arranged form. In most classes an average of one exercise daily has been learnt, and the pupils can now read with confidence and definiteness any songs or exercises adapted to their particular grade.

Vocal culture has not been neglected, but the results, while excellent in many classes, are not so generally satisfactory as could be desired. The most noticeable of the bad results are caused by neglecting the use of the tuning fork in pitching the key in starting songs and exercises. When this is done by ear, unaided by an instrument of definite pitch, much injury may result from the singing being confined to the lower registers of the voice, to the exclusion of the upper register, which is the natural and most pleasing register of the child's voice.

The music readers supplied to the third-book classes in January have proved a valuable addition to the classes fortunate enough to receive them. They have aided materially in the improvement of part singing and have largely increased the knowledge of real music. This could not have been accomplished without music books, as their absence tends to confine the music lesson to exercises only

No report of the past year would be complete without mention of the celebration of the Diamond Jubilee of our beloved Sovereign, Queen Victoria. The concert held in Massey Hall on June 19th, was probably the most successful of similar events during recent years. The music sung by the eight hundred children was largely patriotic in character, in keeping with the spirit of the year. The audience was most enthusiastic in showing appreciation of the efforts of the young singers, as was also the press in its comments on the event.

The concert given by the five thousand pupils of the Public and Separate Schools in the Exhibition grounds was apparently enjoyed by the thousands of spectators present. The children acquitted themselves as creditably as could be expected under the conditions, which were not quite so favourable as in Massey Hall.

The concert given by the Public School Chorus on October 25th, to the visiting delegates of the W. C. T. U. World's Convention was well received. Much enthusiasm was manifested by the audience, and some very flattering comments on the children's work were made by Miss Frances E. Willard, Miss Agnes Slack, and other officials of the convention.

The benefits derived by the young choristers from the preparation and performance of their concert programmes are not likely to be soon forgotten. A number of the best of our national songs have been indelibly implanted on their minds, they have added to their own happiness by contributing to the happiness of others, they have been privileged to take a prominent part in the most unique event in the history of any nation, and they have earned the respect of hundreds of visitors for themselves and the schools which they represent.

# REPORT OF THE INSTRUCTOR IN MILITARY DRILL AND PHYSICAL EXERCISES.

I have the honor to submit, for the information of the Chairman and members of the Toronto Public School Board, the following report in connection with the Military Drill and Physical Exercises in the Toronto Public Schools during the year 1897.

#### SENIOR DRILL COMPANIES.

I am again pleased to report that the work of the senior companies has been satisfactory. A strong rivalry exists between the four Batallions for the position of No. 1 Battalion. It will be seen by the efficiency returns that No. 1 Battalion has held first place for three year in succession, and that the present No. 2 Battalion has gained its present position after being No. 4 Battalion for several years, and that No. 3 Battalion retains its former place.

The School Brigade was on parade twice during the year, June 2nd and June 22nd, the Jubilee celebration.

The parade held June 2nd was in connection with the usual commemorative decoration of the monument erected to the memory of the volunteers who fell at Ridgeway, this also being the Annual Inspection and Review of the School Brigades, the parade taking the form of a route march through the principal streets of the City,

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thereby giving the public a better opportunity to see the progress made in drill by the pupils of our schools.

This parade I am pleased to report was the largest parade held during my time as Drill Instructor in the Public Schools. The total strength on parade including the Industrial School, was 1660.

The parade held June 22nd, being the Jubilee celebration, consisted of a march through the principal streets to the Exhibition Park, and I am pleased to have to report that the good conduct and soldierlike bearing of the boys on this occasion was the subject of general comment along the line of march. This parade was not as large as the one held June 2nd, owing to a number of the pupils belonging to the Boys' Brigade, the number of pupils on parade being 1273.

I am very much indebted to Captains Brown, Curran and Gillies of the York Rangers for the able assistance rendered me at the parades.

#### CARE OF ARMS.

The care taken of the rifles supplied to the several companies, I am pleased to report, has very much improved.

#### SENIOR CLASSES (GIRLS).

The physical exercises in connection with the senior classes (girls) is very satisfactory, under the existing circumstances, as very few teachers give the necessary time

to the practice of the exercises as taught by me. I again strongly recommend that in these classes physical exercise with apparatus be taught, as a number of pupils remain from 3.30 to 4 o'clock to receive special instruction in this development.

I also have the honor to report that I gave instruction and prepared two classes which took part in the Jubilee concert, held in the Massey Hall, June 19th, one class of 32 girls in a scarf drill, and one class of 24 boys in the physical exercises with arms. The work of both classes was very much admired.

#### JUNIOR CLASSES.

The work done by the 3rd book classes is steadily improving.

During the year I gave instruction to a class of 60 Model School students, and have to report that at the end of the term they all passed the examination in Drill and Physical Exercise.

I herewith forward a return of comparative efficiency of the several battalions, also parade states June 2nd and 22nd

#### MEMO Re WORKMEN IN REPAIR SHOP.

The following memorandum will show what is accomplished by the workmen engaged in the workshop connected with this department:

The time of the three workmen is occupied with a large variety of matters, both in the shop and at the schools.

Small repairs to the school buildings for the Property Committee are frequently made when the circumstances are such that they can be most satisfactorily done in this way; and the men are sent, when emergency requires, to do the work of caretakers until a temporary caretaker can be secured and placed in charge of the work.

Ink is manufactured for all the schools, and assistance is rendered in receiving and sending out supplies and in fitting up the Board room for special use paying teachers each month.

These workmen attend to preparing and placing in position the furniture, etc., in fitting up all temporary class rooms, ten such rooms having been opened in 1897.

Many changes are made from time to time in exchanging the furniture between different class rooms, re-using the same furniture in order to supply the pupils with desks more suitable to their size. In twenty-three rooms all of the pupils' desks were so exchanged in 1897, besides changing part only of the desks in numerous other class rooms.

New cupboards have been built for text-books, etc., at nine schools. These cupboards are built as permanent fixtures in such locations as are most convenient and available.

An important part of the work done is in making over the older styles of furniture in such manner that it is re-modelled and finished to compare favorably with new goods just purchased. The furniture for fourteen class rooms has been so made over and placed in position in 1897.

In addition to the matters referred to above, all of the ordinary repairs are attended to in connection with the pupils' desks and seats, teachers' desks and tables, cupboards, locks, etc., etc.
