OF THE

Twenty-Ninth Annual Meeting,

OF THE

WESLEYAN METHODIST MISSIONARY

AUXILIARY SOCIETY,

FOR NOVA SCOTIA, CAPE BRETON, AND P. E. ISLAND.

HELD AT LIVERPOOL, ON THE 4th JUNE, 1846.

The Meeting having been opened in the usual way, JOSHUA NEWTON, Esq., was called to preside. The Report of the Committee was then read by the Rev. Wm. Smith, Secretary. After which, the following Resolutions were proposed and unanimously adopted:—

Moved by the Rev. Wm. Crosscombe, seconded by the Rev. Jas. Buckley—

I. That the Report now read be adopted and printed, under the direction of the Committee.

Moved by the Rev. J. B. Strong, seconded by the Rev. Richard Weddall—

II. That the command to evangelize the nations having gone forth, and the Church being summoned to the help of the Lord against the mighty; it is at once our sacred duty and exalted privilege to obey the summons, and seek to promote the universal triumph of his cause.

Moved by the Rev. Charles DeWolfe, seconded by the Rev. John Allison—

III. That this meeting gratefully acknowledges the present prosperous state of our own and kindred missions, and while it gives the glory to Him, by whom alone prosperity can be secured,

it rejoices in *that* prosperity, as affording fresh evidence of the soundness of those great principles, which prompt and regulate the operations of these Institutions.

Moved by the Rev. Wm. *Wilson*, seconded by the Rev. Roland *Morton*—

REPORT.

THE lapse of another year, has brought us again to the period when we are called to meet together in the House of God, in order to join in mutual exercises of devotion, make known the dealings of God with the Society during the year; unite our congratulations or condolences, as existing circumstances may demand, and exhort to renewed exertions in the sacred cause. Certain it is, that in proportion to the acknowledged excellency of the object of Missionary exertions, will be the interest taken in their success, by those who sanction them with their countenance and support. We therefore, are happy to have it in our power to respond to your call, and to furnish a Report replete with interest, and which cannot fail to increase sympathy, and animate to persevering effort. It will indeed be seen, that difficulties demanding the special interposition of Almighty agency, still continue to try the patience of God's servants, and that in order to their successful cultivation of some parts of the great Mission field; strong faith in the promised supply of the Holy Spirit's influence is indispensable. Abundant encouragement, however, arising from positive instances of conversion, increased liberality, and manifest indications of providential superintendency, enable us to rejoice in the assurance that we are warranted still to use the language of our venerable Founder. The best of all is, God is with us! During the year, fresh plots of the vast field have been brought under cultivation; the first fruits of an abundant harvest reaped, immortal souls the reward of Emanuel's passion have passed into the Heavens, and principalities and powers in heavenly places, beholding in the Church, these demonstrations of the wisdom and goodness of God, are looking forward to still more glorious results.

EUROPE.

"During the past year, the exertions of the Society's Missionaries and the operations of the Schools have been rendered instrumental, by the blessing of Almighty God, in the extension of scriptural Christianity in Ireland. Mr. Muller still continues his zealous exertions at Menenden, in Germany; which the Great Head of the Church is pleased to crown with an encouraging measure of success. The review of the work in France and Switzerland,

presents much cause for thankfulness, in the amount of success already realised, and great encouragement to continued exertion."

ASIA.

"The general aspect of the work in the Island of Ceylon is one of great encouragement and hope. The Missionaries and their faithful Assistants are continually employed in communicating Christian instruction to all classes of the inhabitants, by whom, for the most part, their labours are highly valued; while earnest requests are presented for the extension of their regular pastoral care to many villages which they have hitherto been able to visit only occasionally. In the Southern, or *Singhaless* District, the soul-destroying errors of Buddhism are losing their hold on the minds of the natives. Twice the people of Dondra have risen in a body against the Buddhist Priests, and avowed their purpose to renounce them for ever; but some influential men among them produced a reconciliation. The Missionaries are of opinion that the time is not far distant when the whole system will fall. During the year, One Hundred and Forty-five new Members have been added to our Societies in the south of the Island; making the total number of Nine Hundred and Nine—being a net increase of Ninety-six, after filling up the vacancies occasioned by deaths and removals. Three additional Chapels have been completed, at Kallubowilla, Corlewella, and Dikbeddy; and another at Welawatte is to be commenced immediately, all without any expense to the general fund of the Society. An important branch of the Mission in the south of Ceylon, is the very extensive and efficient School-system. The Schools are Sixty-four in number, conducted by Sixty-four Schoolmasters and Eleven Schoolmistresses, who have under their care Two Thousand Two Hundred and Forty-six Boys, and Four Hundred and two Girls,—making a total of Two Thousand Six Hundred and Forty-eight.

"In the northern or Tamul District of the Island of Ceylon, the Mission is sustained in great efficiency in all its departments. In addition to Jaffna, the capital of the province of that name; the Mission embraces Thanarpoone, with a population of 12,000; Puttoon, with a population of 5,000; Catavalla, with a population of 14,000; and Point Pedro, with a population of 11,000; being a total of nearly Fifty Thousand persons, who are solely dependent on the Jaffna Mission for the means of grace and salvation. The total population of the province of Jaffna is Three Hundred Thousand. The congregations at these several places are numerous and attentive, and the diffusion of Christian knowledge appears in many cases to be accompanied by the divine blessing.

"The Batticaloa Mission embraces a district which contains more than fifty towns and villages, some of them very populous.

A blessed work of grace has been in progress among the natives for the last three years ; many have been converted to God ; a great number of persons have renounced idolatry ; several idol-temples have been forsaken and destroyed ; heathenism declines, and an impression prevails that Christianity will speedily abolish it. The people in general consider Christianity as an invisible power at war with the gods of the land, and, from what they have seen, they conclude that their gods are fleeing to other places. The good work has extended into the jungle among the Veddahs, or wild men of the woods, who have forsaken their old haunts and habits, are dwelling in villages, cultivating the grounds, and themselves and their wives and children gratefully receiving religious instruction. May God guard and prosper the work which has been thus begun, and to Him be all the glory and praise !

"By the Missions on the Continent of India, the Society is bearing a testimony against the monstrous idolatries of Eighteen Millions of the inhabitants of the *Madras* Presidency. Great and persevering opposition to the doctrines of Christianity has been awakened amongst the Brahmins, and others who are interested in the continuance of heathenism ; which is a fact showing that the Missionaries are making an impression on the mind of the population ; and this is further confirmed by the progressive increase in the number of professing Christians, and in the eagerness with which the people at large avail themselves of the instruction afforded in the Mission-Schools.

"The endeavours of the Popish emissaries to counteract the influence of our Missions in the Island of Tongataboo, have been unremitting. The Priests, who were reported last year as having established themselves at the Bea, have itinerated to the various places, where the Society's Missions have Stations, and have endeavoured to subvert the faith of our native converts ; in the prosecution of which object every specious of calumnious misrepresentation has been resorted to. The Missionaries, however, gratefully report that, to the best of their knowledge, their traducers have not succeeded in leading astray so much as one of our people.

"The official Returns for the past year from the several Stations in Feejee, not having as yet come to hand, the Committee can only submit a general statement respecting this important District. By a letter recently received, the gratifying intelligence has been communicated, that the Missionary ship "*Triton*," had safely conveyed, to their respective destinations, Messrs. Watsford and Hazlewood, whose appointment to labour in Feejee has been previously announced ; that the endeavours of the Missionaries to spread the Gospel among the barbarous inhabitants of Feejee have been attended with marked success—more than One Thousand of them having become members of our Religious Society ;

and that, although war continued to rage in various places, the prospects of the Mission are very encouraging. The Friends of the Society will not fail to unite with the Committee in thanksgivings to Almighty God for the good which has already been effected in this arduous part of the Mission-Field, and in earnest prayer that He will still graciously preserve his servants who are called to suffer as well as to labour therein, and yet more abundantly crown their exertions with His blessing."

AFRICA.

"The latest communications received from Cape Town, southern Africa, afford a very satisfactory view of the work at that important Station. Much unanimity prevails among our people, the meetings for Christian communion and prayer are seasons of great spiritual refreshing; the congregations are large and attentive, and not a few from time to time, experimentally prove that "the Gospel of Christ is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth."

"At Khamies Berg, the public services in the Chapel are well attended; a gracious influence frequently accompanies the word, and the ministration of the Sacraments; and the spirit of prayer for the prosperity of Zion appears to be poured out upon those who are united together.

"One of the most interesting facts connected with the work at the Nisbett Bath Station is that, a number of the most degraded and wretched of the African race; the outcast Bushmen, are brought under the influence of Missionary teaching. An extract from Mr. Risdale's Journal, will best explain the progress which has been made among these people.

"In western Africa the Society's Missions enjoy a measure of prosperity, sufficiently great to administer encouragement to the Committee to avail themselves of those special openings of Providence which present themselves for further aggressions upon the usurped dominions of Satan, as well as for the sustentation of those agencies which are at present in operation." The following extracts will, we doubt not, be read with interest:—

ASHANTI.—The Mission in Ashanti rises in importance; and presents advancing claims upon the watchful care and attention of the Committee, while it appeals with increasing earnestness to the prayerful sympathies of the friends of the Society. The last Yam-Custom was celebrated in the Capital with the usual barbaric splendour, and riotous excess; but it was distinguished by two remarkable circumstances. Formerly, at this great annual festival literally torrents of human blood were shed; but, on the last occasion, only one person was put to death, and he a criminal who had forfeited his life by his offences against the laws; and on the

principal day of the feast, when the excitement was at the highest pitch, between One and Two Hundred of the Natives withdrew from the scene of temptation, and met together in the Mission-chapel for the public worship of Almighty God. The regular religious services both at *Kumasi* and *Bantama* are well attended; and great interest is created by the preaching of the Gospel, on the occasional visit of the Missionary, in the town of *Jabin*. On a recent occasion, Mr. Chapman took his usual stand in the public street, and on the very spot which the national superstition had frequently saturated with the blood of human victims, directed the attention of a listening multitude to the great Christian sacrifice whose "blood cleanseth from all sin." *Bakwa* also yields much encouragement to Missionary exertion; and several other important towns, within a day's journey from the Capital, demand that attention which a single Missionary cannot possibly afford. Twelve adults have been received into the Christian Church by Baptism during the year. A Day-School has been formed, which is chiefly attended by persons connected with the Fantis who are resident in *Kumasi*. The Evening-School is in useful operation; and the King is so pleased with the visible improvement of the two boys whom he had sent to the Mission-house for instruction in general knowledge, that he is placing others under the Missionary's care. The subject of general education is still under discussion; and hope is entertained that the king will remove the obstacles which retard its progress.

Some events have occurred during the year, which, while they serve to show the difficulties which a Mission in Ashanti has not unfrequently to encounter, at the same time as clearly prove how much the cause of peace and humanity depends upon the presence and influence of the Christian Missionary. One day Mr. Chapman was called upon by a messenger, with a request that he would wait upon the King; and this messenger was immediately followed by a second, and he by a third, who urged the Missionary's prompt attendance. When Mr. Chapman reached the palace, he found the King surrounded by all his principal Chieftains, with their attendants, amounting to Three or Four Thousand persons. They had assembled in consequence of an Ashanti woman having been murdered on the road from Cape-Coast, by a native of the *Asin* country, through which the road passes; and the King wished the Missionary to be present on the occasion. Great excitement was produced by the statement of the case; and two of the principal Chiefs approaching the King, were about to bind themselves by the accustomed oath to take vengeance upon the *Asin* people, and vindicate the insulted honour of the King. The King, however, interposed before the oath passed their lips; he complained that the *Asins* were a worthless and mischief-making people, declaring at the same time with

considerable vehemence, that if the English would cease to protect them, he would go down and punish them according to their deserts; but he wished his Chieftains to restrain their anger until the effect of the Missionary's meditation with the English Government at the Coast should be ascertained. Mr. Chapman visited the Coast; the matter was investigated and settled to the satisfaction of the King; and the gathering storm, which threatened not only the public peace, but the very existence of the Mission itself, happily passed away.

"Thus indirectly, as well as more immediately, do the services of the Missionaries benefit these degraded people, and we are happy to find that amidst considerable difficulties, and frequently in imminent personal danger, these devoted services of God still prosecute their self-denying duties."

AMERICA.

"The annual review of the Society's Missions in the British West Indian Colonies affords great encouragement. Difficulties are still experienced, and patient, persevering exertions are yet urgently necessary in every department of the work; but it is cause of thankfulness to Almighty God that so great an improvement has already been effected among a people who, only some ten years ago, were bowed down under the depressing yoke of slavery; and that Missions, which were then an almost insupportable burden upon the Society's funds, should now be providing so extensively for their own pecuniary support. The time, it may be confidently hoped, is not very remote when our West-Indian Missions will amply repay the care and attention with which they have been favoured, and become important auxiliaries in the great work of evangelising the heathen nations of the world."

Last though not least, the state of the Missions, in the British Dominions of North America invite attention. In this field of operation, as elsewhere, the present times are remarkably ominous; error arrayed in the fascinating garb of truth, seeks to seduce the souls of the simple, and in many instances too successfully; men of corrupt principles, converting the most useful instruments into destructive weapons, wantonly assail the characters both of the directors and agents of venerable institutions; and in many instances bigotry is seen with stern menacing aspect holding a whip of scorpions over those who assert the inalienable rights of conscience, and resolve to worship God in the place and manner, most consistent with its dictates. But the Missionaries happy in the enjoyment of that civil and religious liberty, (for which they constantly thank God, and as devoutly pray for its continuance,) abide with cheering success in the exercise of their ministry, and in the several departments of their sacred work. pleasing proofs they exhibit of the divine sanction to their labours are—the instances of conversion from sin to holiness, both among the Colonists and Aborigines; the Christian order and steadfastness of faith in Christ exemplified by many of the Members;—the numerous congregations, which wait to hear what God the Lord will speak through their instrumentality; the special seasons of refreshing with which it pleases the Lord to bless the faithful in the social means of grace, and in the sacramental ordinances; the sound instruction communicated to the young through the medium of Sabbath School exertions; the disposition manifested by the serious and enquiring to unite themselves to our ranks, that they may fight side by side with us, under the banner of the Captain of our salvation; the loud and urgent call for more labourers, reiterated year by year; the humble confidence with which when called, the members enter the valley of the shadow of death, and aver in that trying hour, their full assurance of the truth of our doctrines, and the scriptural character of the hope that sustains them. These are their answers to them, who will candidly examine them.

Such are the topics, which constitute the subject of our Report, and while they rejoice in these manifold proofs of the Divine blessing, the Committee beg to commend this Institution afresh to your consideration, as worthy of your confidence, your affectionate recognition, and your support. And is there not need? How otherwise shall the Missions be supported? How shall the importunate calls of the destitute heathen for the bread of life be responded to, but through your co-operation? And how shall the claims of Christ, upon the Church be honoured? Surely the Church in proportion as she receives the Holy Spirit, must resent the indignities offered to her Lord, assert his rights with a voice that shall be heard, burn with indignation at the continued usurpation of the foe, and giving place to the irrepressible gush of weeping sensibility, pour rivers of tears over the self-inflicted tortures of degraded mortals. But she has done more! She has drawn her purse strings! Having learned that the success of the work from year to year has almost unavoidably led to an outlay exceeding the amount of income, and compelled the Committee to close their ears against the vehement appeals of the spiritually destitute—to restrain the ardour of those who prepared by grace, stand upon the sea-girt shores of England crying—Here are we, send us! influenced by these considerations, she has maturely considered the demand; and acting in the spirit of deep conviction that all she is, and all she has is the Lord's, she has so answered to the appeal, as to devise liberal things, replenish the treasury of the Lord, and esteem herself happy in the ability and opportunity so to do.

"We are happy, say the general Committee! to have to Report

that the income of the Society for the year 1845, has amounted to the sum of £112,823. This sum has been derived from the ordinary sources of income at home and abroad, in the several items of which there has been generally an increase. The Juvenile Christmas and New-Year's offering, included in the total exceeded £4,400. This financial prosperity has enabled the Committee to defray the Expenditure of 1845, to pay the remaining balance of the year's 1843 and 1844, and the balance of the extraordinary Expenditure on the Gold Coast and Ashanti Missions. The respective outlays thus referred to, were as follows:—

"It thus appears that the Society commences its operations for 1846, not only free from debt, but with a balance of upward of £700 in favour of the General Treasurers, and with the cheering hope that the Income of the year will meet the Expenditure.

"It is due to the interests of the Mission, under the direction of the Society to state, that the relief of the Society from the above causes of embarrassment, has not been obtained without very painful restrictions in the Expenditure of the Society, more particularly in the supply of Missionaries to many of the older and more important Districts. It will be remembered that prior to the last Conference, the Committee had determined, that in order to the efficient supply of the Missions, a considerable number of Missionaries, additional, ought to be sent abroad, of which number, however, they resolved to send only one half, lest they should increase the difficulty, under which they were labouring.

"The interests of the Mission, the honour of Christ, the salvation of souls, require that the Missions be reinforced with the least possible delay. To this important object, the Committee will now direct their care and attention, with the encouraging anticipation that the friends of the Society, will not relax their noble efforts in so good a cause, so that the Missions may be maintained in a state of full and increase efficiency."
